Mr. Nicholie, who scored 16, played carefully and with much skill. The most remarkable feature of this innings was the splendid bowling of Mr. N. Strato, which was very effective and excited great admiration. The Grantham second innings closed for the very respectable total of 103, learning the Northumberland players 43 to get to win.

Grace played an admirable not out innings for 21, and Lieut. Straton made a beautiful hit for 4. Guild, the professional, who ran up such an excellent score on the prerious day, was cleverly caught and bowled by Mr. Brett for 2 runs.
