R.M.L.I. v. K.O.S.B.
 At Mount Wise yesterday, Plymouth Division R.M.L.I. defeated the King's Own Scottish Borderers by 226 runs. The R.M.L.I. elected to bat, and the wicket being in their favour they were in possession for a period of four hours, and scored 226 runs. The first wicket fell in the first over before a run had been made, but by very steady play at the commencement and more vigorous batting later on, Captain Crowther and Lieutenant Godfrey brought the score to 157, when Lieutenant Godfrey was out and he for 63. Soon afterwards Captain Crowther was dismissed by the same bowler. His score, just three short of 100, included a lower boundary hit for C. Corporal Fitzmarsh, who secured 39 runs in a very smart manner, was run out, and Lieutenant Foster, who showed good batting form, was given out lb w, when well set. With the exception of Lieutenant Phillips, who made several pretty strokes, none of the others scored double figures. Several changes in the bowling were made. Fraser bowled 36 overs, and took six wickets for 105 runs. Commencing their innings shortly after four o'clock, the King's Own Scottish Borderers made a poor defence against the bowling of Lieut. Foster, who took seven wickets.

 In consequence of the Exeter eleven being unable to journey to Plymouth yesterday a local match was arranged. The weather in the early part of the day being against cricket, Lieut. Biggie's eleven turned up very short, and consequently the game was played with nine on each side. Plymouth winning the toss elected to bat first, and sent in R. A. Bowers and Hoar to the bowling of Captain Lushington and for 62 runs were scored before Bowers was caught by Leslie off Lushington. Hoar followed and retired at 63. Dickenson then joined Hoar, and these two carried the total to 228 before Hoar was run out for an excellent innings of 117. Dickenson reached his third century for the season, and when he had added another 2 was caught and bowled by Curtis. H. D. Bowers joined Hoar, and the score was carried to 278 before Lezge took Bowers for 14. Plymouth then declared their innings closed: 278 for five wickets. The scratch eleven sent in Captain Lushington and Lieutenant Household to the bowling of Hoar and H. D. Bowers. Only 11 runs had been scored before Household's wicket was secured by Bowers. The other batsmen, with the exception of Lezge 39 and Captain Lushington 23, were unable to do much with the bowling, the side being out for 103, thus leaving the home team victors by 3 wickets and 178 runs.
