The cricket scason of 1891, which was brought to a close last week, has proved the most successful that has been experienced for many years by the Spalding Club, and we are glad to be able to record quite a revival in the cricketing talent of the district. The record of the year is 12 matches won, 6 drawn, 1 lost. Some of the wins were oxceptionelly gratifying to the team, and were only achieved through excellent all round play.
