CRICKET MATCHES.

WORCESTERSHIRE v. BROMSGROVE SCHOOL.

Although the cricket usually witnessed in the annual matches against the Bromsgrovians is not of very high class, it is sufficiently good to prove interesting. On the last occasion, of their visit here the School beat a moderate county eleven by nearly a hundred runs, so that the boys, with last year's experiences before them, had very sanguine hopes a few weeks ago of repeating the feat; but unfortunately for them, several of their first eleven boys at the present time laid aside, owing to slight attacks of the prevailing malady. On the other hand the County combination was a fair one, so that the visiting side had altogether the worst of affairs when they lost the spin for choice of play, as they had to field a large total under a very powerful sun, for nearly four hours. Usually the whole of the scholars hold a picnic under the trees, but this year they were taken by steamer up the river to Holt and Shrawley. Notwithstanding this, there was a good muster of the friends of the boys, including many ladies, whilst the general attendance was a good one.

At 12.35 Messrs. Bromley-Martin and Millington emerged from the Pavilion and opened the batting. Lake and Scott abating the blowing. At 7 the captain of the home team was neatly caught at the wicket, and Mr. E. Carmichael filled the vacancy. The new-comer, who shows signs of improvement each time he plays, was very busy early, and had double figures to his name in quick time, but lost the companionship of Mr. Millington at 30, as the latter had his baile disturbed by a splendid delivery of Scott's. Mr. Foord-Kelcey came next, and immediately increasing the score brought about several changes, and Skelton relieved Scott at 37. This did not meet matters, and the century was hoisted without a separation, after exactly an hour's play. Change after change was tried, until seven bowlers had been put on. Mr. Carmichael had a very narrow squeak at the wicket when he had made 49, he looked

very much like getting a century, until from a bad stroke the wicket keeper easily captured him. The innings was a splendid one, and although not faultless, considering the excellence of the fielding, was full of merit. Nine fours and 4 threes were the chief items, after a stay of an hour and a quarter. Mr. Foord-Kelcey also hit hard with 7 fours and a five to his credit, and ultimately snared from a brilliant catch in the air. With the advent of Mr. Coventry the trundler had a deal of trouble, as he played in dashing style, and made a number of very pretty off cuts, but in attempting one of these he was caught at slip, just as the second century was telegraphed. The last three wickets put on a useful number, and the venture closed at a quarter-past four. With two hours to play there appeared at the first a possibility of the visiting side playing out time, but these hopes were quickly dispelled when the first wicket fell for a "duck" and the second for 6, whilst half a dozen were sent back at 35. Messrs. Bromley-Martin and Foord-Kelcey were most destructive and nearly unplayable. Daigman offered some resistance by a series of capital ones, but his baile were knocked down by a splendid delivery of the slow bowler, and the whole side were dismissed in an hour and ten minutes, Worcestershire thus winning the match by 170 runs. MALVERN COLLEGE v. ROSSALL SCHOOL.—The public school match was played at Malvern on Friday. Higson, the Rossall captain, winning the toss decided to bat, and Phillips and Roberts opened the innings to the bowling of Latham and Mitchell. Both batsmen settled down to work, and scoring freely a double change of bowling was tried, with the result that Neville upset Roberts's stumps. Neville bowled so well that he and Latham dismissed the remaining batsmen in quick succession, the whole side being out in 60. Neville took four wickets for 5 runs, and Latham six for 20. Latham and W. L. Foster opened the batting for Malvern, and put on 58 for the first wicket. Ransome, then joined Latham, and both batsmen hooked the bowling all over the place, adding 95 for the second wicket. On H. K. Foster joining his captain the two put together 103 before they were parted, Foster playing good cricket for his 45. Three runs later Latham scored his hundred amid cheers. Pike and Mitchell gave the bowlers very little trouble, but on Romney joining Latham another long stand was made, 123 being put on before another wicket fell. Latham had played five consecutive fours, his hitting being superb. He was a hard case when he had made 33, and was also twice before he had made his 200. Howill undoubtedly he had in the future. Romney played well for his 23. At the drawing of stumps the total had reached 338 for eight wickets.

This match was concluded on Saturday, and resulted in a remarkably easy win for the College. The selling, having scored 338 for eight wickets, declared the innings at an end, and sent in Rossall for the second time. The play of the visitors was greatly superior to that shown in their first innings, but they were out-matched at all points, and were dismissed for 178 runs, victory thus resting with the College by an innings, two wickets, and 160 runs. It is seven years since the College scored a victory over Rossall. This year the College has many ones suffered defeat, and they are undoubtedly a very strong eleven. In the match under notice the bowling and fielding were admirable throughout, and Ransome kept wicket so well that he allowed not a single ball to pass him to add a "bye" to the visitors' score. MALVERN COLLEGE v. M.C.C.

Perhaps the most important engagement included in the College fixtures is the match annually played against the chief representative club of this country: at any rate, such it undoubtedly is from a cricket point of view, inasmuch as, besides sending a fair team of amateurs, several professionals of well-known repute usually assist the club, and the team which did battle for the metropolitans on Monday will have cause to remember their visit to Malvern this year for some time to come, as the Malvernians kept the visiting side in the field the whole of the day, for the loss of three wickets only. M.C.C. had the misfortune to be deprived of the assistance of Davenport from the first half hour, as the Cheshire professional, whilst keeping wicket had his middle finger of the left hand fractured, and was compelled to retire. Tall scoring was the rule throughout. The collegians, who won the toss, elected to defend, Latham and W. L. Foster facing the attacks of Pickett and Wootton. A separation was not effected until the score stood at 99, when Foster had his balls

distributed and Ransome joined his captain. The second century had just been hoisted when the latter got his leg in front, after having played in brilliant style and patiently defended the attack of five transients. Latham in the meantime had nearly reached a three-figure total, and loud cheering went round the ground when at five o'clock he had achieved his century. The chief scorer only added 16 more, when he returned an easy one to Cartland, who had just taken the ball. Following upon a score of upwards of 200 against Ransome recently, this young cricketer bids fair to be able to take a prominent part in high-class cricket, and, although he had a few narrow escapes, there was little fault to be seen during his stay of four hours and a half. The chief items of his score were 5 (all run out), two 4's, four 3's, and nineteen 2's. H. K. Foster also amassed a large total in quick time, and had every appearance of reaching three figures had time permitted.

The match was continued and concluded on Tuesday. The College declared their innings closed for 350, and the M.C.C. sent in Mr. Evelyn and Mr. Morris to face the bowling of Mitchell and Neville. Runs came slowly considering the perfect wicket. The batsmen played carefully, and the score had reached 47 when Mr. Evelyn was out, a fine catch by Ransome. But 15 had been added to the score when Lowe got the better of Mr. Morris, and Mr. Toppin, who followed, stayed but a few minutes. Mr. Evershed, the Derbyshire captain, partnered Capt. Young, but did not stay long. In the last over previous to luncheon he gave a difficult chance to H. K. Foster, but with the last ball of the over Neville, with a beautiful ball, displaced his off stump, the score standing at 108 for four wickets. Upon resuming Pickett went in bat failed to score. Mr. Cartland followed, and despite several changes of bowling, runs came freely. Captain Young batted in capital style, ultimately falling a victim to Neville, who bowled exceedingly well. The remainder of the play does not call for comment, and the innings closed at a quarter to four for 219, or 131 behind. The excellence of the fielding is testified to by the small number of extras. Neville was most successful with the ball, taking five wickets for 49. After an interval of twenty minutes play was resumed by Mr. Morris and Mr. Toppin, the bowling being shared by Mitchell and Neville. Wickets fell quickly, and Ransome, who displaced Mitchell, took four wickets for 2 runs. With just over an hour to get rid of six batsmen, the Collegians forced the game, and playing all well together they managed to get rid of their opponents within a few minutes of six o'clock for a total of 98, thus winning the match by an innings and 33 runs. The closeness of the finish and the spirited way in which the Collegians played, aroused much enthusiasm among the hundreds of spectators present, and the winning team came in for quite an ovation. Ransome was wonderfully successful with the ball, capturing six wickets for 31 runs. Mr. Toppin, it should be added, played in place of Davenport, who was injured on the previous day. Score:—

CRICKET MATCHES.

WORCESTERSHIRE v. WORCESTERSHIRE REGIMENT.

After a somewhat dull and threatening morning, the weather took a favorable turn at noon on Tuesday and the above popular county engagement was witnessed under very agreeable conditions. A fashionable company was present, and the cricket was fully up to the average, although the military during the past year have lost many that have on previous occasions rendered valuable services, and the previous match which the Regiment fell through, owing to their inability to get a team together. This was a source of disappointment to many, because the regiment matches are always highly popular, and usually attract good attendances. In the present instance, the county eleven were not strong, a remark which equally applies to their opponents, but at any rate, this rather increased than diminished the interest in the play. The chief honors of the match fell to Mr. Carmichael, whose promising and improving play has previously been mentioned in these columns. On Tuesday, going in first, he stayed over three hours, and had completed his century in two hours and a quarter, being unfortunately caught in slips with the last ball prior to the closing of the innings, which was the fifth wicket down. Batting with extreme caution at first, by capital cricket, he took his score along at a very even rate, and withstood eleven changes of bowling. There were very few faulty strokes in a brilliant display. The chief items were 7 (4 for an overthrow), fifteen 4's, and six 3's. This being his first three figure total, Mr. Carmichael was greeted with well-deserved applause upon his return to the Pavilion. Owing to the late arrival of the Norton contingent, it was 12.40 when Worcestershire, who won the toss, went to the wicket with Messrs. Ford-Kelley and Carmichael. The first named, who gave considerable trouble, left at 42, and the score had increased by 30, when Mr. Ford-Kelley was bowled. A stand of nearly an hour was made after Mr. Brown went in, and the latter, who hit hard, had soon half-a-dozen 4's to his name, but, skying one, was taken from a fine running catch by the bowler. The Rev. M. B. Buckle kept Mr. Carmichael company until the latter was caught, when the closure was adopted as mentioned above. Mr. Buckle's total was 31 runs.

It was a quarter to five when the Regiment went to defend; Captain Allsopp and Captain Monro facing the attacks of Messrs. E. E. Lea and Ford-Kelley, and very seldom has a better innings been played on the ground than the score made by the first-named batsman, his large total being obtained in magnificent style and without a fault.
