The Spalding Cricket Club have now completed their list of fixtures, and out of the 27 matches arranged, 21 were contested. Thirteen were won, 7 lost, and one drawn. Six matches were abandoned through bad weather and clubs failing to fulfil their engagements. This season the committee organised matches with several fresh clubs, and these alone have furnished some good sport, but the attendances at a great many of the matches have been smaller than in previous years.
