

STOKENCHURCH C.O. v. LEWKNOR C.C.

This match was played on the ground of the latter on Wednesday, the 12th inst., on a splendid wicket, and, after a very interesting game, resulted in a handsome victory for Stokenchurch by 10 wickets and 3 runs. The visitors were only moderate in strength, whilst Lewknor were assisted by Kirtland, Holloway, and Katon (Thames), Folley (Bledlow), and Hamersley (Pyrton), etc. The home team won the toss, and elected to bat first, sending in Kirtland and Eaton to the bowling of Sutton and Poole; but so well on the spot were the trandlers that the first six wickets were captured for eight runs, but thanks to the batting of Wetherfield and Neighbour, a much better aspect was put on the game. Both batsmen, playing with rare pluck and determination, succeeded in obtaining double figures, and thus necessitating the first change of bowling. H. Witney now took the ball from Poole, and the change had the desired effect, for Wetherfield immediately received his dismissal at the hands of Witney, the innings quickly terminating for the moderate total of 40, of which number H. Neighbour took out his bat for a well-played 11. Of the three bowlers tried, Sutton was the most successful, his wickets coming about 2 runs each. The visitors now had a turn at handling the willow, to the bowling of Kirtland and Smith, and during the innings several good stands were made. G. Poole, J. Witney, and Sutton were the only batsmen to obtain double figures; but Rose and H. Dean played well for their respective scores, the latter making one splendid square-leg hit clean out of the ground. The innings eventually terminated for a total of 65. After a short interval, the home team commenced their second innings, evidently leant upon forcing the game; but in this case it did not "come off," the bowling and fielding being decidedly too good to be taken liberties with, and, peculiar to relate, the innings realised 40, exactly the same total as before. HENLEY v. MARLOW.

[INTERESTING CRICKET.—MARLOW WINS BY TEN WICKETS.]

A team representing the Marlow Cricket Club journeyed to Henley, on Saturday, to try conclusions with the regatta town. Mr. George Ward, the popular Marlow skipper, had endeavoured to get together a powerful side, but at the eleventh hour several disappointments were forthcoming. As it was the town of footballers arrived at the scene of action one man short, and a substitute was found on the ground. ## AN EXCITING MATCH.

Requiring 64 to win, Buckingham opened their second innings. Austin was again in good form with the ball, and at the fall of the fourth wicket the total was only 17, all bowled by Austin for 7 runs. Templeman and Perkins now became partners, and the score was taken to 42 before the latter was out. Bird followed, but was bowled first ball by Austin—6 wickets for 43. Bryant followed Bird's example and did not trouble the scorers. Austin narrowly missed doing the "hat trick," taking 8 wickets in 4 balls. With Kay in Templeman made some good strokes, and the score was taken to over 50 when Kay was out lb-w off Fowler. With Templeman and Christmas together, the runs were soon hit off, Buckingham winning an exciting match by 2 wickets. The Aston men fielded well, but sadly lacked another good bowler in addition to Austin. ## THE AYLESBURY AND DISTRICT CHALLENGE CUP.

# FLACKWELL HEATH CRICKET CLUB.

At one time during the season, it seemed that Flackwell Heath would show a great falling off in the form it had displayed during the three seasons prior to the one that has just closed. Happily, however, the result of the season's work bears a better aspect than even the Club's most enthusiastic supporters had hoped for. True it is indeed that more matches have been lost than have been won, but on the whole the club can be congratulated on the result of its season's labours, considering the strength of the teams that have been met. The purely local fixtures of past seasons have, in fact, been dropped, and matches arranged with such strong teams as Maidenhead, Marlow, and Gerrards Cross. To defeat Maidenhead first team on their own ground, and then to succumb in the return fixture by only sixteen runs, is certainly a feather in the cap of the club. The heaviest defeat sustained by the club was at the hands of Gerrards Cross in the Batick Cup Competition—when, owing to the strictness of the rules governing the competition, it was impossible to play a representative team—to the tune of an innings and 71 runs. The heaviest defeat inflicted by the club was, curiously enough, an innings and 71 runs over Wycombe Reserves. The narrowest defeat of the club was by nine runs by Borelase Masters, while the narrowest victory was obtained over Wooburn, by eight runs. It only remains to say that the club did not experience the best of luck, winning the toss only three times in seventeen matches. The popular captain has hardly sustained his reputation as a bat, but has shown vast improvement as a bowler, while as skipper he has been invaluable. Wheeler, the best bowler of 1892, shows a falling-off. Walker also has deteriorated, though on two or three occasions he has done some fine performances. Fisher, who has played but few times, has not exhibited any of the skill that distinguished him in 1891 and 1892, though he has greatly improved as a bat. With another good bowler there is no reason why the club should not revert to the position it enjoyed in 1891.

## FIRST ELEVEN.

## REPORT AND RESULTS FOR 1893.

The season of 1893 has been a very successful one. The first eleven have played 18 matches, with the following results:—Woo., 15—Middlesex Hospital, Hampstead, Marlow (2), Risborough (Bastick Cup), Maidenhead, Slough (2), Philberds, Chesham (Aylesbury Cup), Henley (Bastick Cup), Oriel, Waddesdon (Bastick Cup), Buckingham (Aylesbury Cup), Chalfont St. Peter's. Drawn, 1—House of Commons. Lost, 2—Maidenhead (Bastick Cup), M.C.C. and Ground. F. Langley is once more *facile princeps* top-scorer, with an average of a little over 30. He has scored consistently all through the season, and made over 50 on two occasions, over 40 four times, over 30 three times, over 20 twice, and has not failed to obtain runs in any match in which he has played. His average is all the more meritorious from the fact that having nearly always gone in first he has not had much chance of playing not-out innings. Reynolds is second on the list with 19, his play this season being chiefly remarkable for a finely hit innings of 72, which he made against the House of Commons. The third and fourth places are occupied by Baines and Bird with 18 each. G. George and J. Newell are the only other two members of the team who have come out with a double-figure average. W. Brindley's 60 is the second highest individual innings, made against the Philberds; but he has only played in two matches. Not a little of the success which the team has achieved this season is owing to the excellent bowling of Page, the brothers Newell, and Bolton, whose averages, considering the number of innings in which they bowled, must be considered very good indeed, including as they do the heavy scoring in the House of Commons and M.C.C. matches. T. Newell has bowled the most frequently, and during this season has captured exactly 100 wickets, his best performance being against Risborough, when he took 5 wickets for 6 runs. Page is a young bowler, who has wonderfully improved, and gives promise of making a capital cricketer in time. His average is slightly better than T. Newell's, and his best performance was in the match against Waddesdon, in which he took 8 wickets for 20 runs. J. Newell has only bowled in 8 innings, his average being the same as Page's. In the match against Henley he obtained 3 wickets for 7 runs. Reynolds has only bowled four times, and his average is slightly above that of Bolton; but he rendered good service in the the House of Commons match, when he took 3 wickets for 22 runs, which was the lowest average of the day. Although the Club lost to Maidenhead for the Bastick Cup they must be congratulated upon being successful in the Competition for the Aylesbury Cup, presented by Mr. C. E. Cobb.
