BUCKS COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

RESULTS AND AVERAGES, 1893.

Season 1893 has been a most successful time for the Bucks County Cricket Club. It will be remembered that in the first season of the club (1891) two matches with Oxfordshire were lost, and the two with Beds drawn. Last year, Bucks defeated Beds and Wilts, lost to Wilts and the M.C.C. and Ground, and drew with Beds. This year's record is a vast improvement on previous efforts. The Wilts club having dissolved, matches with Northamptonshire were arranged instead. The four county matches—two each with Beds and Northants—were all won. The match against the M.C.C. and Ground at Lord's was lost by three wickets, although the county team deserve congratulations on the splendid up-hill fight they made after following on 246 runs to the bad. A trial match against Fifteen of Aylesbury and District was also won, but this does not count in the averages. The matches were remarkable for exciting finishes. In the Trial match at Aylesbury the County won in the last over of the match by 4 runs; at Bedford, the match was won three minutes before "time"; at Northampton, Nash joined Mr. Cobb with 16 runs still wanted, and only Mr. Ward to go in; and at High Wycombe, Nash, the last man, went in with 16 runs still wanted. Next year, if funds permit, the programme will probably be enlarged by the addition of home-and-home matches with another county. Complete summary of results:—

In the batting averages Saunders is easily first, thanks to his fine score of 150 not out against the M.C.C., at Lord's in the second innings. He also has the highest aggregate. Austin is well up, and Nash stands third, thanks to several not out innings. The latter deserves credit for his plucky batting on more than one occasion at critical periods, and his freely-bit 54 at Lord's was probably the first time that he has earned talent money with the bat. Mr. Higgins batted consistently, at his average of 17, with highest score 31, will show. Nash and Wright bore the brunt of the attack. Taking into consideration the fact that the bowlers only had a sticky wicket in one match, Nash's figures—51 wickets at a cost of just over 10 runs apiece—are remarkably good. The only players that took part in every match were Mr. Cobb and Nash. The former kept wicket throughout the season in splendid style, and altogether sent back eleven batsmen—seven caught and four stumped.

LOCAL CRICKET.

REVIEW OF THE 1893 SEASON.

With the close of September the local cricket season ended; a season which may accurately be termed the most successful on record. From the very commencement we have had a series of splendid matches, such as was predicted on the strength of a list of matches published by the *Cambridge Daily News* in May. The intensity of public interest in the game (so marked last year), has been well proved by the large throngs that gathered daily on Parker's Piece to see any representative match, and many and loud have been the utterances of the clubs against the crowded state of the Piece. Early in the season the prolonged drought threatened to spoil the Piece for play. However, excepting one or two days during the extreme heat, players invariably declared the ground to be in fine condition. Nothing specially novel has occurred during the season, excepting the laudable attempt of the Anchor C.O. to establish a cricket week. This from a cricketer's point of view was most successfully brought about in the week which commenced June 26th and lasted till July 1st, and a great deal of interesting play was witnessed, but, unfortunately, the attendance was very limited, and it is reported that the venture was attended with a considerable financial loss. It is to be hoped that the Anchor C.O. will not be deterred from giving a cricket week another trial in '94.

The only regrettable feature of the year will be found in the dispute which arose over the Cambs. Cricket Association Cup, when Chesterton District C.O. protested against the playing of O'Connor by the Liberal C.O. in their cup-tie. The matter was thoroughly threshed out, but unfortunately for the association, nobody was satisfied, and the consequence was that the semi-final and final matches were robbed of all their interest. One or two of the old clubs have ceased to exist, the most noteworthy being Chesterton C.O., which Mr. C. O. Buck worked so hard for. On the other hand, several new or revived clubs, such as Chesterton District, the Station, Lilley's, &c., have done very well in the field.

Turning to individuals the name of K. S. Ranjitsinhji first occurs. The connection of the Indian with three of the local clubs—the Liberal, Anchor, and Cassandra is that of a playing member, and he is certainly regarded as one of the finest cricketers who has ever honoured these by becoming a member. There are three players who this season have gone a long way towards justifying the high opinion formed of their play—E. Briggs, W. Burrell, and A. Whibley. The first named may be described as a somewhat erratic player, but it cannot be denied that he is a good all-round man, able, when he is in earnest, to play dashing cricket. The same may also be said of Burrell and Whibley. Burrell has had considerable ill-luck, yet his scores are highly satisfactory; whilst Whibley, if he would only make up his mind to play sound cricket, is head and shoulders above average cricketers.

Alluding next to

INDIVIDUAL SCORES.

it is seen that the County player, F. J. Roberson, heads the list with a splendidly played 100. Never before had Roberson played so well, and while opinions differ very much as to his powers, it must be admitted that, from a spectator's point of view, he is a dashing and attractive player. The Camdon player, A. J. Rich, comes next with the fine score of 155 not out, then follow Ranjitsinhji, A. J. Davidson, F. Luff, and W. Burrell. H. S. French has long maintained the reputation of the French family for good cricket, whilst J. Stearn may be credited with a similar accomplishment. The bowling works out well, and its improvement is remarkable. S. J. Haddow takes premier position, with the low average of 4.1, and he is closely followed by O. Riddle 4.25 and H. Gray 5.31. These are fine achievements in a season of hard and true wickets.

HERTS COUNTY CRICKET AVERAGES.

Below will be found some interesting statistics showing the performances with bat and ball of those who took part in the county matches during the past season. The Gentlemen played eight matches, of which they won two, lost five, and one was drawn—not so good a record as could have been wished, but this result is owing in a large measure to the fact that the composition of the team was not the same in any two matches, and numerous changes always tend to weaken a combination. No less than forty-eight players took part in the Gentlemen's matches, the object of the hon. secretary evidently being to give as many as possible a game, but this can be carried too far, as is shown by the record this year. H. F. Ward, a most promising bat, is at the head of those who have completed four or more innings, with an average of 28.2, W. V. Jephson and H. B. Debenham being second, each with an average of 23, but the latter is largely helped by two not-out innings. Of the bowling, the largest number of wickets has been taken by O. Pigg, whose average is 10.9, whilst I. A. Fish, who secured 12 wickets, has an average of 8.7.

Of the full County matches, three of the nine played were won, three lost, and three drawn. The batting averages are, on the whole, very good indeed. The Rev. E. D. Shaw is first with an average of 33.4 for eleven innings, and Titohmarsh, whose improved form has been most gratifying, is second with 29.6 for 17 innings. W. H. Nicholls has scored consistently, being third with eight innings and an average of 21.4, and next in order of merit come H. F. Ward and O. Pigg, with 18 and 17.1 respectively. In bowling Jones is really first, but Titohmarsh has had the brunt of the work, and has been well supported by the Rev. E. D. Shaw and W. H. Nicholls. It is a very encouraging fact that those who have done well at batting have also proved themselves destructive with the ball. The following are the details.

Monday and Tuesday of the present week have been set apart for the last fixture on the programme authorised by the Norfolk County Club. It will also probably be the last match of any importance in the district this season, and if on that account alone there might be a lively muster at Lakenham. The cricket cannot be otherwise than excellent in quality with such men as Shore, Massingham, and Morley on the side of the Club and Ground; and Mr. Hudson has gathered around him this season a very powerful combination. The Billingford Incapables are undoubtedly stronger this year than they have been for several seasons, and I am therefore anticipating a real tough encounter.

Langton and Bogle-Smith, both officers of the 1st King's Dragoon Guards, have gained big reputations as cricketers, the former as a bat and the latter as a wicket-keeper more than average merit, and their loyalties in this match will be watched with interest. Bartram of Old Walsingham has been bowling with great success throughout the season, and big things are expected of him. The remainder, with the exception of Johnson, who is, I believe, a visitor, are well known to a Lakenham audience.

A summons to attend and investigate in person the cricket of the Irish, and the knowledge that the trip will necessitate a break in these bi-weekly dissertations has induced me to turn to the average table sooner than usual. It is no glorious list of successes that needs the gaze after spending an hour or so with the scores. Three wins, 2 losses, and 2 drawn games is not, however, so very bad, but it is a very big list. This time, the wins were perilously near being losses. A one-wicket victory over the M.C.C., a difference of one run only between the scores in the Cambs. match, and a margin of 18 against Lincoln, these were all fully matched to wit, but they were uncommonly close shaves. To my mind the best match of the season was that with Lincolnshire in the Norfolk Week, when the home side won by 19 runs. After the many defeats experienced at the hands of Lincolnshire, that victory, narrow though it was, came as a gentle refresher. Below will be found a detailed list of the matches, followed by the batting and bowling averages, which I trust will contain nothing that might be calculated to irritate anyone, seeing that with the exception of Raikes and Shore none of the players have in their various departments maintained what might be termed a fair level. Rye, Fryer, and F. Davies all played one good innings each, which helped materially to put them in the places in which they will be found. Raikes, on the other hand, scored double figures in all but one innings, and his average of 42 is exceptionally fine. Morley has done some useful all-round work, being second on the batting list with an average of 11 for thirteen completed innings, and, in addition, secured twenty-four wickets at a cost of 14-6 runs per wicket. His fielding too, has been a feature of the County cricket. His partner, Shore, is easily first in the bowling department, and with better luck in the last two matches, his figures would have been even better. Fifty-eight wickets for 14 apiece is not bad work for a season like the last, and is proof that there is yet plenty of work left in the veteran Norfolk professional. Rye has not had a good season with the ball, and it was well that he occasionally came to the front with a sound and useful innings with the bat. For the rest, the figures must speak for themselves.

G. B. Raikes delivered seven no balls, and Morley two.

Thursday will be a red letter day for cricketers in the neighbourhood of Wymondham. A match has been arranged for that date between an eleven representative of the playing strength of the district and a team to be collected by Shore and Morley for the benefit of Nichols. Not to know Nichols is to be a stranger to the town in which he lives. For upwards of seven years he has had the control of the town ground, and much of the improvement that has taken place there has been due to his untiring exertions. Few men watch more keenly the varying fortunes of a Wymondham team in the cricket or football fields. His enthusiasm is not always tempered with discretion; but there is no mistaking the feeling which lies beneath. I trust his may be a good benefit. With such men as Shore and Morley in a team the cricket is sure to be good, and the next best thing that one would like to see is a fine day and the ground well lined with spectators.

D. M. Bartlett, who made his debut in Norfolk County matches at Bishop's Stortford last week, was a prominent member of the Haileybury College Elevens in seasons 1891 and 1892. "Lillywhite" writes of him as follows:—"A most useful and improving slow bowler, and can use his head; as a batsman has a good style and some strong hits, but fails to get really long scores at present." His batting for Wymondham in the Junior Final created a favourable impression. He was in it, it will be remembered, with Raikes whilst 55 runs were obtained, and, though his share of the number was small, his style pleased the pavilion critics immensely.

Writing of Haileybury reminds me that a short time ago I noticed the name of E. Partridge, this year's captain, in a local match. I am not sure, but I think it was Watton v. Swaffham, and the Haileyburian ran up a score of 40 odd against such trundlers as A. P. Sewell and Jack Hansell. The latter, by the way, was at Lakenham on the day of the Junior final, looking the picture of good health. He was evidently delighted with the success of Swaffham. There is no telling what proportions the Haileyburian's score might have assumed on this particular occasion, for when it stood at 43 there was not another Watton left to take charge of the opposite end. L. R. T. Fryer, who pleased the Lakenham goers with a plucky display of wicket keeping last season, was an Old Haileyburian. By the way, what has become of this clever player this season?

Nichols, the Wymondham groundsman, who takes a benefit on Thursday, has grand hopes of his son making a name for himself in the cricket world. The youngster has already been put through his paces by the Surrey Club, and his batting and bowling received favourable mention from the critics. He practices assiduously, and in a season or two will again be on offer. Who knows but that Surrey may be fostering another Lohmann! But why should Norfolk let the lad slip into the hands of another county? We are not so well off that we can afford to let out pros to another

county. There were many who entertained the hope that the youngster would be given a place in the Wymondham eleven for the final tie, but Mr. Raikes and others came along and bugged all the place. Not even Pickard was included in the unsuccessful Wymondham team. Why, I cannot tell. Possibly he may have been holiday making, as he was hardly a likely player to be dropped. There were endless rumours of the fast bowler leaving the town and joining the ranks of the professional footers at Crowe.

Quite an enthusiastic party witnessed the departure of Lohmann, the Surrey pet, on Saturday, for South Africa. Among the other passengers the "Mexican" carried was a cricketer whose figure was at one time frequently seen on the Lakenham ground. I allude to G. F. Gerds, the quondam Carrow and Norfolk and Norwich player, and one time a member of the Haunts County team. He was a hard hitting batsman, and a wicket-keeper of more than average ability.

The name of Maurice Read is almost as well known in the cricket world as that of the veteran "Doctor W.G.," and therefore few readers need be told of the benefit match recently accorded the Surreyite by the S.C.C.C. There are benefits and benefits, but the Surrey man is hardly likely to be the one to complain. Together with the subscriptions the profits accruing from the International match are not expected to fall short of £1200. A nice nest egg that. Read was recently interviewed by *English Sports*, on which occasion he told the following umpire story, which is a bit severe on Shrewsbury:—"At a place called Orange, N.S.W., in a match against twenty-two, as is not altogether uncommon over there, prizes were offered on certain conditions. The trophy for us English fellows was a massive gold locket for the highest individual score. Well, Lohmann, who was out, was top scorer, having made about 30, and Shrewsbury, who had been batting a long time when I went in, had somewhere about 20. When I had knocked up close on this while Arthur was getting another 10, a ball was smartly returned to the wicket-keeper, and as I could plainly see I was run out I did not attempt to run to the wicket, but walked leisurely to the tent, knowing that I had received my quietus. While undoing my pads—and not feeling altogether sorry that I was out of the sun (it was scorching hot)—I was surprised to see Shrewsbury coming away from the wicket. "What's the matter?" I inquired. "Oh, that underhanded umpire says I'm out, and not you." "Nonsense, why the ball was not returned your end." "No, but he won't give way, so you had better go back again." After a little more arguing I did, and commenced laying about me pretty smartly. While the field were changing over later on the umpire came up to me and said quietly, "You thought you were out, didn't you?" "Yes, I did," I answered, "and so I think now." "So you were, my boy, but we didn't want that fellow to get the prize. Why, he's been a peckin' and a-dabbin' for two hours like some old sparrow, and looked like keeping on for a week—we want to see a bit of cricket, and yours is the sort for our 'apeace.' The result was that I got something like 70 runs and the locket, a very massive thing, which I gave to my sister on reaching home."

Not long ago—only a day or two—I heard it generally stated there was to be a one day lawn tennis tournament on Lakenham early next month. Chadwick told me last week he had no definite information on the subject. There is no screw loose, surely?

THE OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

Compared with last season, the results of this year's County cricket are highly gratifying, albeit the record of matches won is but two; a similar number were lost; the drawn games numbering no less than five, the majority of which were decidedly in favour of Oxfordshire. The most gratifying feature of the cricket is that the runs have been obtained, not by the few, as was the case last year, but by the many, no less than ten batsmen having an average ranging from 16 to 31, the pride of place being held by Mr. T. B. Case, who was unfortunately incapacitated through illness from playing in the last three matches. His brother comes next with 29.5, a fine not out innings of 125 against Staffordshire contributing mainly to this result, and C. C. Bradford and H. Bassett are almost on the same mark with 25.3 and 25 respectively. Although the latter has played in twice as many innings, Messrs. Day and Moulder, who had not played before this year, have very creditable figures, and the two Rogers came on in a remarkable manner during the latter part of the season. Mr. Wood started well, but his failure at Lord's reduced his figures very considerably, and after a good performance against Salop, Mr. Marsh went clean off until the Beds match at Oxford, when he was responsible for a good not out innings of 25. Mr. Deane batted well on one or two occasions, especially at Lord's. Next season we are promised a considerable accession to the batting, and the one thing wanting most is a good slow bowler. Mr. Bassett is well in front in the bowling, although latterly he met with very little success. Rogers (A.), on the other hand, did poorly at the commencement, but wound up with three brilliant performances against the M.C.C. and Cambridge. The wicket-keeping was shared by Messrs. T. B. Case and G. W. Johnson, the latter of whom promises to prove a valuable acquisition, as at present he has not had a great amount of experience in good class cricket. The Captain kept wicket admirably on several occasions, and had his hands not gone Salop would hardly have made a draw of it at Shrewsbury. The fielding generally was very good, and altogether the supporters of the County Cricket Club have good cause to be satisfied with the season of 1893.

WORCESTERSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET

In giving our customary annual table of statistics, it is necessary to point out a few of the main features, and although probably the majority will be somewhat familiar with them, many will, doubtless, appreciate a brief retrospect. In the first place, the Worcestershire Club, under a powerful and energetic executive, has risen with rapid strides, and will doubtless soon occupy a forward position among second-class counties to which it is entitled. It is now only a question of finances, for several good players are waiting to qualify; but of course all these matters are very expensive. Many will be glad to learn that the membership roll has largely increased, that, with the exception of Loughborough, the gate receipts have fully realised expectations. For Worcestershire, as the result of 25 innings, 3,555 runs were scored, whilst 3,628 in 26 innings were made against the county. To the average of a fraction of over 150 its opponents came within two runs. This proves that, after playing so many good teams, there has been a manifest improvement. In losing one more match than the club won, allowance must be made that the team defeated by Staffordshire at Stoke was far below the average, but a striking circumstance occurs as to the splendid manner our representatives acquitted themselves at Manchester, Leeds, and the Oval, more particularly at the latter place, when they were opposed by a Surrey contingent that included four who play for the first team. Their being so strongly opposed in the return against Lancashire, was owing to fine performance at Old Trafford, when a draw in their favour was the result. When Briggs and Mold, however, took part in the match at Stourbridge a most wicket made these two champions unplayable, and the smallest scores of the season were recorded. A defeat and a drawn game were the result against Warwickshire. A similar experience was the result of the M.C.C. matches, Herefordshire and Devonshire were beaten on both occasions, which were the only matches won; but of course, upon the appearance of the fixtures, those against the principal clubs could not be expected to be won in what may be termed a first season, but Worcestershire will have to be reckoned with in the future in these also. Only three times wet weather interfered with the play, and then only of a slight character, but the excessive spell of hot and dry weather resulted in the wickets generally being very indifferent in most places. Messrs. P. H. Latham, W. Greenstock, and E. P. Johnson are the only batsmen that scored three figures totals, and consequently, in the order named, take precedence in the batting averages, with Messrs. C. Toppin and W. L. Foster close up. Those from whom better things were expected, viz. Millward, E. G. M. Carmichael, and H. K. Foster utterly failed. The professional, however, made amends in the bowling, in which important sphere he takes second place with a slight fraction over Alex. Smith, who has bowled remarkably well. Willoughby, Rollings, and Raynor, too, came out creditably, and both in batting and bowling the figures are highly satisfactory, but there has been an undoubted weakness at times in the fielding, which must be improved. This has shown itself very clearly in the chief matches to disadvantage. The Club and Ground matches, under the control of Mr. J. J. Thomasson, have been the medium, far exceeding expectations, of popularising cricket amongst local clubs, the indefatigable hon. secretary has done his work in excellent style, or has met with a full share of success as the result of the matches under his control. The appended tables will suffice to deal with the play, as full reports have been given from time to time. As these matches are an innovation, it is satisfactory to record that they have achieved the object for which they were instituted, viz. to give all members a chance of playing an opportunity of assisting to stimulate local clubs and bring forward any latent talent that otherwise might have remained unnoticed. Mr. P. H. Foley, with his multitudinous duties as hon. secretary, has worked very hard; besides, he has proved an excellent captain. With both amateurs and professionals he is as popular as ever, and the responsibilities of office could not rest in better hands.

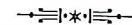

The Committee, to meet the desires of a number of the County subscribers, give the following epitome of County Matches played, together with the results.

The first County Match played by Yorkshire, appears to have been in 1833, against Norfolk, and from that year up to 1863, matches were played on several Grounds, but of such contests, unfortunately, no complete scores have been preserved.

In 1863, after an abortive attempt to induce the other large towns to join in a guarantee fund to support County Cricket, the Sheffield subscribers formed the Yorkshire County Cricket Club, appointing a Committee of Management of thirteen gentlemen. M. J. Ellison, Esq., was elected President, and Mr. George Padley Secretary. Since that date, full scores of all matches played under the management of the Club have been accurately kept; still, for eight years afterwards, and independently of the Sheffield Committee, County Matches were arranged and played at Bradford, Leeds, Dewsbury, and other places. On December 13th, 1864, Mr. J. B. Wostinholm was appointed Secretary, in place of Mr. Padley, resigned.

In 1865, in consequence of a disagreement between the Northern Players and the Players of Surrey, the five leading Yorkshire professionals refused to take part in the home and home matches which had been arranged with Surrey, and the Committee therefore, left those players out of the other engagements of the season, with the result that Yorkshire lost every match this year.

1866.—The Committee, still suffering from the defection of the County's best players, made no match this year. In those played the Committee had no part.

In 1867 seven matches were played, and each one resulted in a victory. This season Yorkshire was champion County. Lancashire was played for the first time this year.

1872 saw the institution of Colts' Matches. Many of the most talented players of the County have been brought to the front by these games. Gloucester was included in the Yorkshire County Fixtures for the first time.

Reference to pages 6 and 60, will give details of the County's doings.
