

RESULTS AND AVERAGES, 1893.

Season 1893 has been a most successful time for the Buckr County Cricket Club. It will be remembered that in the first season of the club (1891) two matches with Oxfordshire were lost, and the two with Beds drawn. Last year, Bucks defeated Beds and Wilts, lost to Wilts and the M.C.C. and Ground, and draw with Beds. This year's record is a vast improvement on previous efforts. The Wilts club having dissolved, matches with Northamptonshire were arranged instead. The four county matches—two each with Beds and Northamts—were all won. The match against the M.C.C. and Ground at Lord's was lost by three wickets, although the county team deserve congratuations on the splendid up-hill fight they made after following on 246 rune to the bad. A trial match against Fifteen of Aylesbury and District was also won, out this does not count in the averages. The matches were remarkable for exciting finishes. In the Trial match at Aylesbury ine County won in the last over of the match by 4 runs; at Bedford, the match was won three minutes before "time"; at Northampton, Nash, joined Mr. Cobb with 16 runs still wanted, and only Mr. Ward to go in; and at High Wycombe, Nash, the last man, went in with 16 runs still wanted. In the batting averages Saundern is easily first, thanks to his fine score of 150 not out against the M.C.C. at Lord's in the second innings. He also has the highest aggregate. Austin is well up, and Nash stands third, thanks to several not out innings. The latter deserves credit for his plucky batting on more than one occasion at critical periods, and his freely-hit 54 at Lord's was probably the first time that he has earned talent money with the bat. Mr. Higgins batted consistently, as his average of 17, with highest score 31, will show. Nash and Wright bore the brunt of the attack. Taking into consideration the fact that the bowlers only had a sticky wicket in one match. Nash's figures—31 wickets at a cost of just over 10 runs apiece—are remarkably good. The only players that took part in every match were Mr. Cobb and Nash. The former kept wicket throughout the season in splendid style, and altogether sent back eleven batemen—sevon caught and four stumped.



LOCAL CRICKET.

REVIEW OF THE 1893 SEASON.

With the c'ose of Soptember the local orloket season ended; a season which may accurately be termed the most successful on record. From the tormed the most successful on record. From the very commencement we have had a series of splendid matches, such as was predicted on the strength of a list of matches published by the Cambridge Daily News in May. The Intensity of public interest in the game (so marked last year), has been well proved by the large throngs that gathered daily on Parker's Piccote see any representative match, and many and loud have been the utterances of the clubs against the crowded state of the Picco. Early in the season the prolonged drought threatened to spoil the Picce for play. However, excepting one or two days during the extreme heat, players invariably declared the ground to be in fine condition. Nothing specially novel has cocurred during the season, excepting the laudable attempt of the Anchor O.O. to establish a cricket week. This from a cricketer's point of viow was most successfully brought about in the week which commenced June 26th and lasted till July 1st, and a great deal of interesting play was witacessed, but, unfortunately, the attendance was very limited, and it is reported that the venture was attended with a considerable financial loss. It is to be hoped that the Anchor O.O. will not be deterred from giving a cricket week another trial in '94.

The only regrettable feature of the year will be found in the dispute which acrase over the Cambs. Cricket Association Cup, when Chesterton District C.O. protested against the playing of O'Connor by the Liberal O.O. in their cup-tie. The matter was theroughly threshed out, but unfortunately for the association, nobody was satisfied, and the consequence was that the semi-final and final matches were cobbed of all their interest. One or two of the old clubs have ceased to exist, the mast noteworthy being Chasterton C.O., which Mr. O. O. Buck worked so hard for. On the other hand, several new or revived clubs, such as Ohesterton District, the Station, Lilley's, i.e., have done very well in the field.

The Committee, to meet the desires of a number of the County subscribers, give the following epitome of County Matches played, together with the results.

The first County Match played by Yorkshire, appears to have been in 1833, against Norfolk, and from that year up to 1863, matches were played on several Grounds, but of such contests, unfortunately, no complete scores have been preserved.

In 1863, after an abortive attempt to induce the other large towns to join in a guarantee fund to support County Cricket, the Sheffield subscribers formed the Yorkshire County Cricket Club, appointing a Committee of Management of thirteen gentlemen. M. J. Ellison, Esq., was elected President, and Mr. George Padley Secretary. Since that date, full scores of all matches played under the management of the Club have been accurately kept; still, for eight years afterwards, and independently of the Sheffield Committee, County Matches were arranged and played at Bradford, Leeds, Dewsbury, and other places. On December 13th, 1864, Mr. J. B. Wostinholm was appointed Secretary, in place of Mr. Padley, resigned.

In 1865, in consequence of a disagreement between the Northern Players and the Players of Surrey, the five leading Yorkshire professionals refused to take part in the home and home matches which had been arranged with Surrey, and the Committee therefore, left those players out of the other engagements of the season, with the result that Yorkshire lost every match this year.

1866.—The Committee, still suffering from the defection of the County's best players, made no match this year. In those played the Committee had no part.

In 1867 seven matches were played, and each one resulted in a victory. This season Yorkshire was champion County. Lancashire was played for the first time this year.

1872 saw the institution of Colts' Matches. Many of the most talented players of the County have been brought to the front by these games. Gloucester was included in the Yorkshire County Fixtures for the first time.

Reference to pages 6 and 60, will give details of the County's doings.
