### HIGH WYCOMBE v. WOOBURN INSTITUTE.

It will be remembered by followers of cricket in Bucks that the County Challenge Cup, presented by Mr. C. E. Cobb, was offered for competition for the first time in 1893, and that the final tre was played at Aylesbury between Wycombe and Buckingham, the result being that Wycombe became the holders of the trophy for the ensuing twelve months.
