### CRICKET.

#### BRIDGEND v. CARDIFF.

This important fixture was decided on the Bridgend ground, on Saturday, in beautiful weather, and in the presence of a large company, which included Mr Frank Edwards, M.P., Major Wyndham Quin, and Mr Cousens (Barrister-at law). The wicket was in good condition, and Bridgend winning the toss, Mr Nicholl determined to send his men in. Schofield and Scott opened the innings to the deliveries of Lowe and Sweet-Escott. The Bridgend pro. snicked a one off each bowler, and then Schofield was bowled by Sweet-Escott, without having scored, 2-1-0. The Rev Owen Jones joined Scott, and after making one from the last ball of the over, he put the first of the next into Clark's hands, off Lowe, 3-2-1. Things looked rather black for the homesters, but on W. E. Lewis joining Scott, some pretty cricket was shown, both batsmen hitting freely all round the wicket. At 45, Clark replaced Sweet-Escott, but runs still came, and Marley went on, vice Clark. The score still mounted up, and Clark took another over, and at 61 he managed to beat Scott, who retired with a faultless 31 to his credit, the score including a couple of threes, and half a dozen twos, 61-3-31. W. E. Lewis who continued to play splendid cricket, was joined by Killick, but the latter succumbed to Sweet-Escott, after contributing a useful nine which included one four, 76-4-9. J. I. D. Nicholi was the next man in, but a fast yorker of Lowe's dismissed him, when he had made seven, 91-5-7. Harry Lewis joined W. E., and shortly afterwards, sent up the 100 with a pretty cut for two. Three runs later, however, he shaped badly to a ball from Lowe, who scattered the timber yard, 103-6-6. J. P. Williams was the next man in, and he immediately began to hit out, putting on 16 very quickly. His partnership with W. E. Lewis resulted in an addition of 25 runs, when he hit one of Rooney's deliveries into the hands of R. B. Sweet-Escott, 128-7-16. The Rev F. C. Williams next partnered Lewis, but before any score was made, W. E. gave his first and only chance, which was promptly accepted by R. B. Sweet-Escott. The old Carthusian's 51 was a perfect display of batting, and included a three, and fourteen twos, 128-8-51. Ivor Edwards joined the Rev Williams, who hit freely, and when 140 went up, Mr Nicholl declared. Lowe took four wickets for 49, and Sweet-Escott two for 53, whilst Clarke's wicket cost 12 runs, and Rooney's was obtained at a cost of 13.

With three-quarters of an hour in which to make 140 runs, R. B. Sweet-Escott and Pruen commenced the Cardiff innings to the bowling of Scott and Owen Jones. R. B. opened the ball by cutting Scott for one and Pruen followed suit, and Sweet-Escott put Owen Jones away nicely for two, Pruen treating Scott in the same fashion and adding a single in the next over. R. B. then hit the pro. for three, and securing the bowling drove Owen Jones for two, but succumbed to the next ball from the reverend trundler. 14-1-8. Pullen came in and Killick went on in place of Scott. He sent down two maidens in succession, and Pruen got three off Owen Jones. In his next over Pullen hit Killick to the boundary three times in succession, making 13 in four hits. In the next over Owen Jones beat Pruen, capturing his wicket when 28 had been scored. 28-2-7. K. R. Marley came in and Maskell went on with the leather, but was very expensive, both Pullen and Marley, especially th latter, hitting him all over the place, and Bridgend were treated to some leather hunting. When he had made 13, Pullen was badly missed by Killick in the long field, and shortly after the same fielder missed a hard chance from Marley. As Maskell was getting knocked about Ivor Edwards sent down an over, and time was then called with the score at 67 for two wickets, the not outs being Pullen and Marley. The former's 21 included three fours, and the latter's 28 was comprised of two fours, two threes, five twos and four singles. Rev Owen Jones obtained the two wickets for 19 runs. The Bridgend fielding, with the exception of the instance

referred to, was an improvement on Wednesday's form, whilst the Cardiff men were characteristically smart in the field. The umpires were Mr Morgan Davies and Mr J. H. Hill, and the score is appended :-

# CRICKET NOTES.

By the time these lines will be in print, June will have been ushered in, and uncharitable folk with cricket predilections will say that this is a late hour in the day—or a late month in the year, at which to contribute my first instalment of Cricket Notes. But if charged with dilatoriness, I can readily exculpate myself by laying the blame solely and entirely on the shoulders of the clerk of the weather, whose changeful mood this season has been the puzzler of meteorologists and the bane of cricketers.

Tis in the spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of cricket, and the spring has gone and the summer is come. But "better late than never."

If their performances so far this season afford any criterion of the intrinsic merits of the team, Bridgend First XI. have assuredly the the Briagena Elise Al. have assured the brightest prospects of going through their fixture list "with ease and majesty," as Zoane would say of his countrymen when emerging from a hotly contested battle from which they had come out the victors, the true victors, and nothing but the

Thus far-I am writing before the match with Cardiff is decided-they have overcome Aberavon. and Penarth " with ease and majesty "-with such ease and majesty "--with such consummate ease indeed that both performances, praiseworthy as they were, should be but the precursors of greater things to come; for it stands to reason that no team can show its true colours after baving had only a few weeks at the vet.

In the new professional-Hordley-the team seems to have discovered a destructive fast bowler, and a good bat withal. His "deeds of valour"in other words his bowling performances-at the two matches above-mentioned, show this phenomenal result :- Against Aberavon-14 overs; 8 wickets; 5 runs. Against Penarth-10 overs; 5 wickets; 13 runs.

So far so good—nay so far so wonderful. It is too soon as yet to drift into "wild ecstacies of delight." We shall be the more able to judge of his sustainable capacity as a bowler when the Cardiff batsmen are pitted against him.

BRIDGEND v. CARDIFF.

The day fixed for the first trial of strength between Bridgend and Cardiff was Wednesday, and the match was advertised to commence at the Five Bells' Field, at half-past eleven. The clerk of the weather has been in such an oscillating mood ever since the advent of the cricket season that local followers of the game looked forward with gloomy forebodings to its behaviour on Wednesday—the more so as on the occasion of the two matches played by Bridgend this season the sun has been as conspicuous by its absence as threatening clouds have been by their presence. On Wednesday morning the prospects were dull indeed, the rain descending in fitful drops at intervals and the sky being over-cast for the rest of the time. A short time before the hour advertised to commence, however, there was a welcome change, the rain—or what there was of it—ceasing and giving place to sunshine—or at any rate, a sort of apology for sunshine. The time to commence, as already stated, was 11.30, but the perversity of fate arranged matters otherwise. A week ago, Mr Harry Lewis (Secretary of the Bridgend Club) wrote to the secretary of the Cardiff Club reminding him of the engagement, intimating that the match was advertised to commence at 11.30, and asking to be supplied beforehand with the names of the team. This request, simple enough in all conscience, the Cardiff Secretary did not deem It within the bounds of courtesy to accede to ; nor did he even condescend to acknowledge the letter till the night previous to the day of battle, and then his communication took the form of a cool reminder that his team would not arrive at Bridgend till 2-30. This was a "damper" to say the least of it, and it is only human to suppose that "Gory, sanguinary, empurpled words" (to quote a Cardiff contemporary) were freely made use of by some of those enthusiastic and vehement devotees of the summer

game in Bridgend, who know how to be militant at the opportune moment. It is little wonder that "Things should be thus" when it is romembered with what expectant interest the game had been looked forward to—all the more expectant by reason of the Bridgend Club's success hitherto. People were curious to know how they would fare against a powerful combination, and knowing that it was "Half-holiday" the Committee thought they would resp a harvest by charging sixpence admission. A lancheon moreover had been prepared in the pavilion, but all came to nought. When a team is conscious of its superiority it is inclined to be autoratic in its dealings with inferior clube; hence Cardiff's conduct. The game eventually commenced about three o'clock, at which time there was a goodly number of spectators.

Bridgend won the toss and sent in W. Williams and T. D. Schofild, Selwyn Biggs started the bowning, Williams took first over, which proved a masden. Schofield received a masty hit on the mand with the second ball he received; but continued to play steadily. In the next over Williams compened the score with a single and from the next ball Schofield was smartly caught in the alips. W. R. Lewis was the next batman and signalised his advent with a drive to the off for two. Williams, after playing Lowe's fast bowling very neatly, was then caught behind the wickets off Biggs' slow, but tricky bowling. It was evident that the shower of rain in the morning, followed by sunahine, had worked sad havoe with the wicket from a bataman's point of view. Rev Owen Jones came next and at once commenced to put a more roseate complexion on the game, hitting the second ball he received from Biggs beautifully to leg for three, and following up this by getting a similar hit from Lowe's bowling for two. This good start by one of their best batamen seemed to infuse confidence into the hearts of the home enthusiast, and with W. E.
