## ST. ALBANS GRAMMAR SCHOOL v. OLD BOYS.

A match was played between these teams on the Grammar School ground on Thursday, the result being a victory for the School on the first innings by 31 runs. The Rev. F. Willcox, captain of the School team, won the toss and elected to bat first. Kentish and Golds were the first to handle the willow, and Day and Deed shared the bowling, but before Kentish had time to get set he was bowled with a splendid ball by Day for five, and Golds soon after was caught and bowled by Day, the score then having reached 15. Symons was sent back after scoring 13, and Reynolds soon afterwards followed with half that number. Lord, after having obtained a quarter of a century by correct cricket, was clean bowled with a "shooter" from Kidman. The innings then soon closed, the total realised being 66, only three of which were extras. The visitors on going to bat thought they had a very easy task to perform, but their hopes were soon blighted, for before the figures had reached half-a-score Lord managed to disarrange Reynold's wicket, and he retired for a "duck," and Kidman, who partnered him, soon followed, after having scored eight, he being out leg before wicket. The end soon afterwards came with the total at 35, Golds taking seven wickets for 30 runs, and Lord four for one. On going in a second time the School did not do so well, all being dismissed for 33, half their first score; but the visitors, at their second venture, made a far better show, for when stumps were drawn at half-past six the score had reached 39 with only two wickets down. WEST HERTS CLUB AND GROUND v. ST. ALBANS.

On Saturday last these well-known rivals met on the West Herts Ground, and great interest was felt in the result to know which could claim premier honours for the summer pastime. The day's play ended in a substantial victory for the West Herts combination on the first innings by 160 runs, the scores being West Herts, 188 runs; St. Albans, 28. West Herts went in first, C. Pearce and White opening the innings. C. Pearce soon mastered the bowling, but at 24 White was dismissed lbw for five runs, and H. H. Cobb partnered Pearce. Runs came freely, and it was evident that one or both of these batsmen would make havoc of the bowling. At 57 Pearce succumbed to Dickenson, having contributed a most useful 47 to the score, his hits including seven 4's and a six. Mr S. Ward was dismissed for a duck at 58, but J. Woods who followed was in his usual excellent form, and during his stay at the wickets the score was raised from 58 to 106, himself contributing 27, while Cobb, who was hitting freely, was responsible for most of the remainder. Woods was succeeded by F. Sargent, C. R. Humbert, A. B. Seymour, and W. E. Gardner, but none of these players made any stand, the board reading five wickets for 113 (Sargent), six for 118, seven for 118, and eight for 119. With the score at 119 R. A. Thorpe joined Cobb, who had kept his wicket up since the first wicket down, and who by some very careful batting and defensive play enabled the latter to still further increase his score. It was fourteen minutes past three when the partnership commenced, and it was not until ten minutes to four that it was dissolved. During the whole of that period Thorpe only credited himself with twelve runs, the majority being registered by Cobb. As the score was raised during the partnership from 119 to 174 (an addition of 55 runs) it will be seen that Thorpe deserves great credit, for, with careful play, he enabled Cobb, who had got the bowling well in hand, to make the runs. Having knocked up 30 runs, including seven 4's, Cobb was at last held by Sansom. Thorpe followed soon afterwards, leaving C. H. Little not out with 8 runs to his credit. The total of 188 included 26 extras. On a good batting wicket this score was not more than it should have been, and there was every possibility that the visitors, who had some good men in their team, including Small (who is recognised as the best bat in Hertfordshire), H. J. Hill, W. T. Westell, T. Skilman and others, would either run up to that total, or at any rate realise a sufficient number of runs for a portion of their wickets to warrant the game being a draw in their favour. But this was not to be. This would have been so perhaps were there no such persons as White and J. Woods to be reckoned with. But they were there! and well St. Albans knew it. White went in for moderate bowling, but of a very tricky nature and accurate, and moreover very tempting to the batsmen, while Woods indulged in Derby fliers dead on the wicket. The result was truly remarkable. The first wicket fell for 3 runs, the second for 8, the third for 3, the fourth for 4, fifth for 9, sixth for 9, seventh for 11, until it seemed probable that the unfortunate representatives of the City on the Hill would not obtain a baker's dozen. But towards the end matters took a very slight turn for the better, and when the tenth wicket fell 28 runs were credited to St. Albans, who had been in less than an hour in contrast to the home-sters, who, including lunch time, were over three hours at the wickets. St. Albans followed on as a matter of course, and for six wickets realised 81 runs, when stumps were drawn. F. Sansom made 22 runs, while W. T. Westell made 26 in this innings. Some mention should be made *en passant* of the bowling analysis of the Watfordians. White, as will be seen below, took six wickets for 9 runs in the first innings, and out of 11.2 overs no less than seven were maidens. J. Woods was also remarkably successful, taking 4 wickets for 15 runs, and out of 12 overs 6 were maidens. Six of the St. Albans players were caught out. Appended are the scores:

The unbroken career of triumph with which Bushey opened the cricket week, was somewhat checked by the match they played yesterday. At last he was caught by Williams, and retired amid loud cheers. He had played a capital innings, and had put on 45, the highest figure reached in the match. His score was remarkable for the number of single runs that went to compose it. This was about a quarter to four, and some expectation of a speedy declaration of the innings began to manifest itself, for it was evident as there were only three hours to play the match, that, if the remaining six wickets cost as much to get as the first four, there would be no possibility of the Bushey team completing their innings when their turn came. However, the match went on, but the remaining players were not up to the mark of their predecessors. At first there was no sign of falling off, and the next wicket was not taken till over 50 runs had been added, but the rest fell rapidly, and, at about a quarter to five the last four men were got out at the small cost of 19 runs. As to the batting we have little to say beyond repeating that, by far the best form was shown by Woodbridge, and added that, the finest hit of the innings was a mixer by Hunt, who sent the ball clean over the hedge. There was now only about an hour and three quarters to play, and as Bushey wanted 179 to win it seemed very likely that there would not be time to get the runs, even if the innings could be played out. Bushey therefore appeared inclined to play for a draw. The innings had hardly commenced, however, before the first wicket fell for a duck. Harvey had collapsed before a ball of Woodbridge, who was the best bowler as well as the best batsman in the visiting team. Huntley came next, but before long Woodbridge disposed of him for two, and the second wicket was gone for seven. Wethered followed, but Woodbridge bowled him with the first ball, and the third wicket was also lost for seven. The St. Albans Cricket Week, which from the playing point of view was a very satisfactory one, was brought to a close on Saturday, when the M.C.C. inflicted a severe defeat on the Albans—a defeat which was fully expected even before the game commenced, as the premier club sent down a capital side, very strong both in batting and bowling. The home team, unfortunately, was not so strong as it was anticipated it would be, several being unable to play who had hoped to do so. The visitors won the toss, and about noon on Friday J. S. Russell and Titchmarsh went to the wickets, the bowling being entrusted to Wardle and Sansom. In the first over Titchmarsh gave a chance on the off-side at deep point, but it was not accepted, and subsequently both batsmen hit away merrily, the score reaching 76 before Russell was easily caught at point off Hill for 40. Shortly afterwards the luncheon interval arrived, and on resuming Titchmarsh was bowled by Wardle—101-2-40, while at 142 the same bowler beat G. G. Hearne and clean bowled him. With Davenport and W. Morgan together the batsmen completely mastered the bowling, the latter being particularly severe. The second century appeared on the board after an additional forty minutes' play, and it was not until the score had reached 271 that a parting was effected, Sansom bringing off a fine catch in the long field which sent back Morgan, who had totalled up 85 by hard, free hitting, but he was very fortunate, inasmuch as he was missed early in his innings, and on several occasions the ball just missed going to hand. When Davenport, who played splendid cricket, was sent back by Wardle, the bowlers gained the upper hand. Six wickets were down when the third century appeared, but at 304 Dickerson caught Clayton

off Sansom, Capt. Crampton was bowled by the first ball he received, and in the same over, Sansom clean bowled P. Russell—three wickets in four balls. The last wicket put on ten runs, and the innings came to a close with the score at 315. Of the bowlers, Wardle and Sansom were the most successful, the former sending up 33 overs for only 74 runs and 4 wickets, and Sansom 12 overs for 49 runs and 3 wickets. It was not expected that against this formidable score the home side would be able to make much of a show, but the start was most promising, and when stumps were drawn, the total was 53 for no wicket, H. J. Hill being not out 28 and Wardle not out 16, the remainder being extras. On resuming on Saturday morning, matters went badly for the home side for a time, the fourth wicket falling when the score was only 81. Day then assisted Wardle to carry the score to 113, and afterwards Westell remained until the total was 137, and without the addition of a further run the innings was brought to a close, Wardle, whose patient and careful innings was invaluable, being caught behind the wickets, Dickerson being bowled by Titchmarsh, and Simmons was run out. Titchmarsh was the most successful bowler, his four wickets being obtained at a cost of only 27 runs. In a large minority, the Albans commenced their second innings with the same pair of batsmen who had made such an excellent start in the initial attempt, but disaster after disaster occurred, and when the sixth wicket fell only 37 appeared on the telegraph board. BY FIELD AND ROAD.

The Herts County Cricket Club finished up their season on Wednesday in splendid style by defeating Norfolk by an innings and runs. The home county have thus had a most successful season, full particulars which I hope to give next week.

It may be stated now, however, that the importation of new blood into the county team has had a most beneficial result, and generally speaking, the form shown has been a vast improvement on that of the past few years. Only one match has been lost, that against a strong 2nd XI of Surrey, and several matches have been drawn very much in favour of Herts.

The St. Albans Cricket Week, which was brought to a close on Saturday, was a great success from the cricketing point of view, but the support accorded to it by the public was most disappointing. The weather certainly was not of so favourable a character as could have been wished, but when the sun was shining and the cricket was of an exciting character, the number of spectators was lamentably small.

It was generally thought that when Sir Blundell Maple had generously provided so magnificent a ground for cricket and other athletics, that the public would have done their part, and rallied to the support of those who are doing their utmost to raise cricket to the position it formerly occupied in St. Albans. The public have not responded to the opportunity which has been presented to them, and this fact is a very discouraging one.

The people of St. Albans could best have shown their high appreciation of the gift which has been presented to them by their attendance on those occasions when the ground was being used for the purpose for which it was primarily intended, but they failed to put in an appearance, and had Sir Blundell Maple have visited the ground on any one of the days during last week when cricket was in progress, he would have been surprised and ill-pleased that the enthusiasm manifested at the opening had so soon vanished into nothingness.

The lesson taught last week is that the residents of St. Albans do not care for cricket, and that it is almost useless to continue the efforts which are being made to put the King of English games on a proper footing in our midst. At Watford, Hertford, Hitchin, Bishop Stortford, and other places in the county it flourishes, but at St. Albans there is not enough public encouragement and support to enable it to do so, notwithstanding the possession by the city of advantages which no other town in the county can claim.

The lack of interest taken in last week's doings will not be sufficient to induce the committee of the St. Albans Club to throw up the sponge, but it has seriously damped their ardour, and unless more practical support and encouragement are forthcoming, there will be no other course open but to give up cricket altogether, except perhaps for a few half-day matches, which are hardly worth the trouble of arranging.

If a cricket week is arranged for next year I sincerely hope it will be patronised by the public, and that the money taken at the gate will be much heavier than last week, which was not nearly enough to cover expenses, and the County Club and also the St. Albans Cricket Club will be at a considerable loss.

The thanks of the Club and of many others are due to Lady Jane Grimston, who kindly entertained both teams and many visitors to tea on Saturday afternoon in the Pavilion. Next year, in all probability, a ladies committee will undertake to supply tea daily.

It may be of interest to state that there is a consensus of opinion among those who played on the Clarence ground last week that it is one of the fastest in the country, as it certainly is the lightest. There is nothing to obstruct the light at all, and even when the clouds were very low and threatening the batsmen could get a good sight of the ball.

The match on Saturday on the Clarence ground will be against Frogmore, when the St. Albans team will be selected from H. J. Hill, T. Sanson, J. Dickerson, A. J. Day, W. Spencer, T. Pearce, W. H. Golds, W. T. Westell, G. Hartley, H. C. Webdale, H. Pearce, and G. W. Simmons.

ST. ALBANS v. WEST HERTS.

The return match between St. Albans and West Herts was played on the Clarence Ground on Wednesday, the result being similar to that when the teams met at Watford—a victory for West Herts—and there is no doubt that on Wednesday's form they thoroughly deserved their win. The visitors won the toss, and batted first on a good wicket, C. Pearce and White opening the venture, while the bowling was entrusted to Sansom and Dickerson. In the former's first over White got him away prettily on the off-side for 3, but without any alteration in the total he was bowled by Dickerson with a ball that broke across from the leg side and took the off stump. With A. Butcher and Pearce together runs came steadily, and Pearce went on at the lower end, Dickerson changing over. The change proved effective, Pearce failing to stop one from the slow bowler which was on the wicket—40-2-24. Another useful stand was made when Woods joined Butcher, 29 runs being put on ere the former likewise succumbed to a lob, and with the addition of 8 runs Butcher, who had played a fine innings of 28, getting his runs in exceedingly pretty style, was bowled by Sansom, who had resumed at the pavilion end. C. H. Humbert and Beeton now became associated, and the former was missed twice before making 10, and for these mistakes St. Albans had to pay dearly, as he hit away in fine style. At 93 Beeton was well caught in the long field by Day off Pearce, but the score reached 115 ere another wicket fell, though some chances in the long field were either badly judged or missed. Burrows, in running out to drive Pearce, missed the ball and was smartly stumped, and the next ball was fatal to W. A. Sargent, whom Kent also stumped in fine style. With the addition of one run Humbert's valuable but lucky innings was brought to a close, Pearce bowling him, and at 143 Astley was bowled by H. J. Hill, who had displaced Sansom, the innings being brought to a close at 150. Of the bowlers tried Pearce was the most successful with six wickets for 78 runs, but his analysis was spoiled by the poor fielding.

It was confidently expected that the home side would head their opponents' total, but at the outset several disasters overtook them, and from these the Albanians could not recover, and they were fighting a losing game all through their innings. T. Sansom and Hartley opened the innings, and Wood and White shared the bowling. Only six runs had been scored when Sansom, in attempting a second run for a cut of his own in the slips was run out, at 16 Hartley was bowled by Woods, and at 17 H. J. Hill was badly run out, while at 27 Pearce, after scoring 9, skied a ball from Woods, and was well caught by Humbert. Spence and Day then became associated, and there was a slight improvement in the appearance of matters, both batsmen making some good strokes, and 49 was reached before Spence was sent back, bowled by Woods—19-5-16. T. Blinks soon made matters lively, but he lost the company of Day at 61, and W. T. Westall was bowled first ball, while Kent was sent back at 69. An ignominious defeat thus seemed probable, but J. Dickerson and Blinks both hit well, and the century appeared on the board ere the latter retired for a well hit 25. Dickerson continued to hit away merrily, but at 115 it was all over, Woods finding his wicket, Dickerson made 25 when runs were sadly needed, and both he and Blinks are to be congratulated on succeeding when so many others failed. Woods bowled with splendid effect, his eight wickets being obtained at a cost of 43 runs. White also bowled well, but failed to secure a wicket.

HERTFORD TOWN CRICKET CLUB

The Hertford Town Cricket Club have had a very variable experience this year; some of the matches have been won with ease, others have resulted in most decisive reverses, while others, again, have been so stoutly contested that almost up to the finish it was an open question as to which side would win. Taking the matches collectively, there is a slight - a very slight - "adverse balance" against the town. Fourteen matches were played - of which six were won, seven lost, and one ended in a tie. The match arranged at Batterssea had to be abandoned on account of the rain, - the disconsolate players, after "weary waiting," being compelled to return to Hertford without a ball being bowled. It will thus be observed that Hertford, compared with its opponents, averages half a run less. Sharpe leads the batting with the splendid average of 47.3 for eleven innings. He is far away the best, and his grand displays this season deserve the heartiest recognition. W. H. Nicholls, who comes second in the batting, has not figured in many matches this year, having been engaged with the County; his bowling figures are much less remarkable than usual. The brunt of the work has devolved upon Fish, who is the top of the tree with the excellent average of 10.26, having dismissed 57 batsmen for 596 runs. In several matches he rendered yeoman service for his side, though frequently he was practically single-handed. G. Nichols, though he has maintained the stylish character of his batting, and has frequently rendered useful assistance, has not been so successful as in several previous years. Hammond has occasionally proved effective with both the willow and the leather; and it is a curious thing that both his and Fish's highest efforts reached their climax when within two only of the century. A certain degree of ill-luck was attached to Hammond's case, for he had the misfortune to play a ball on to his wicket.

Several of the matches played were extremely interesting. Probably a finer match has never been witnessed at Balls Park than the one against Islington Albion - which after a most exciting struggle resulted in a tie - 193 all. The very next match against Batterssea (which resulted in a defeat) was also very keenly contested, for a few minutes before stumps were drawn it was anybody's game. Both the matches with Stortford this year were lost, as were also the fixtures with Hornsey - the Club sustaining crushing reverses from the last mentioned Club; but on the other hand, decisive victories were obtained against Clapton (twice), and once against Cheshunt, Broxbourne, and Cheshunt and District. Appended are a summary of the results of the matches, and the batting and bowling averages:
