WILFRED E. KING. (By "Arous.")

It was a pleasant thought which inspired the writer to look up the cricket records of Wilfrid King, who has for some years occupied a prominent place in Bedfordshire-aricket. Born at Keysoe Park on July 6th, 25 years ago, he took to cricket like a duck does to water—at an early age. He was to be seen with bat and ball before he became a pupil of Dr. Poole, headmaster of the Modern School, and on becoming more acquainted with school life he soon forged his way into League and school cricket. His paterfamilias, Mr. Charles King, was a cricketer of no mean reputation in his younger days, and it may truly be said of young Wilfred "like father, like son." Mr. Charles King ran the famous Keysoe Park team in the League some few years ago, and won the championship of the First Division on no less than three occasions—in the seasons of 1898 powerful one, and included in its eleven most of the crack players of the day, as a good many past and present cricketers will resembler—the writer included—and heather-hunting was always to be expected, to be followed by making a more intimate acquaintance of the genial host of Keysoe Park.

But to return to the hero of our sketch. We find him at the early age of 15 making his lifest century in League cricket against Vulcan Works in 1900. It was, however, in the season of 1904 that King first came to be recognised as a batsman and bowler of merit, and in that year he topped the thousand runs and hundred wickets, which is the ideal that every cricketer, high and low, aims at. It was, however, not for one club alone that King played for, for in that season—as in grery succeeding one—he played for quite a number of teams, and amongst them one notices Keysoe figures promisently in the list. His highest score for that season was 97 for Keysoe 2nd v. Alma, and he also got 67 for the Early Closers against Dudeney and Johnston's, 74 not out for Capt. Petchell's team v. Mr. Ford's XI., and 74 for Kimbolton v. Huntingdon. His grand aggregate for the season was 1,272 runs and 194 wickets—not a bad total for one so young.

In the season of 1905 he was first invited to play for the county of his birth, although he had figured in the Club and Ground side the previous year, and after showing good form by scoring a couple of centuries, he first turned out in County cricket against. Nogthumberland, when he hit up 55 and 12. Another good score for the county was 83 against Staffordshire. During this season, in all the matches he played in, we find King again scoring very freely, and he had 1,223 guns and 118 wickets to his credit before the fall of the curtain.

The following season was another meritorious one for the Keysoe youth, but it must be here mentioned that the Keysoe Park Club had now ceased to exist, as Mr. King, senting transferred his affections to fields and pastures new; he had removed to Keysoe, where he occupied, as he now does, the Grove Farm, and he with his old love of League cricket still to the fore, had strengthened the Turvey Club and had been instrumental in having a besutiful wicket laid down. At this time Wilfred was a recognised strong force in

Bedfordshire cricket, for he was sought after by clubs in and out of the county. Early in May he was found in form by Bedford Town. for playing against this team for Turvey he ran up 104, and another three figure in-nings that same season was for the Town Club against the Grammar School. North-Citto against the Grammar School. North-umberland also had cause to remember him, for the young amateur put on 32 against the Northerners before he was sent back to the pavilion. This season's was his greatest yield of runs and wickets so far in his career, for the totals were 1603 runs and 151 wickets.

King had two centuries to his name in the ason of 1907, and these were scored against a Ramblers and Huntingdon. Besides the Ramblers and Huntingdon. Besides these, however, he made several large scores, and his bowling was very often to the front. Playing for the Printers against Luton Liberal Club in a League match he took seven wickets, and for Roxton against Bedford Town he captured eight wickets for 11 runs. His aggregate for this season was not quite so good as the previous one, but still it was an excellent season's play, as he scored 1,509 runs and took 148 wickets. Some of the teams he played against during the season teams he played against during the season were the Grammar School, Club and Ground, Kimbolton, Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, and the

Kimbolton, Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, and the M.C.C.

Early in the season of 1908 we find the subject of our sketch figuring in the Northants. Club and Ground team, and on that occasion he signalised his appearance by scoring a century and taking three wickets against Burton Latimer, and another useful 112 not out was obtained for Turvey against Mr. R. Green's XI. This was followed later on in the year by a splendid 124 for Bedford Town against Mr. H. R. Orr's team. In County matches, however, the Turvey youth does not appear to have been a success this season, as in the four innings he played he could not claim double figures. He did very well for the Northants. Club and Ground and also for Turvey, and in all games in this season he scored 1,382 runs and 134 wickets were down to his name.

After making 64 for Bedford Town v. Grammar School in May of 1909, King, a week after, improved upon this performance for the same club and against the same School by running up 135 not out, and another great innings in the following month was for the Town v. Beds. Club and Ground, when 35 came from his bat ere he was diamissed. For the Old Modernians against the Old Elstonians he obtained 55. King came out of the ordeal against Lincolnshire by knocking up 68 for his County, and another good innings that season was 74 for Turvey v. Olney. The net results of the season were 1,325 runs and 84 wickets, from which it would appear that his bowling was not quite up to the average.

King's performances this season are

would appear that his commission are too fresh in the memories of cricketers and enthusiasts to need recapitulation here, but suffice it to say that at the time of writing we find he is in just as good form as ever, for he has obtained 1,563 runs (including 109 against Bedford Town on Wednesday), and taken 103 wickets.

One cannot conclude this sketch without speaking of the popularity which has always fell to the lot of Wilfred King. He is a quiet, unassuming young man, and a sportsman to the backbone. He has over and over again helped weak teams against strong ones, and has made a name in Bodfordahire cricket which one might justly feel proud of. He is a left-hander and a hard hitter, and one of those spirited cricketers who goes about his work with the intention of getting runs. In bowling he is a medium-paced left-handed, with a bit of a break, and on a wicket to suit him is a source of trouble to even capable batmen. His fielding, although not always perfect, is on the whole good, and he is a trier all the way. He also plays Association football with success, is a dashing centre-forward, and can also play full-back.

CRICKET.

"It is stated in your report," says Mr Reeve in his letter, "that I was a member of the Highbury C.C. This is not quite true, because I had already signed on for the Albion before signing a form for the Highbury. I sent my reasons for signing a Highbury bury. I sent my reasons for signing a Highbury form to the Secretary of the League when asked to do so in the early part of the season, and I cannot understand why the League Committee have left the matter over until the end of the season, because I have been given to understand that the Committee were supposed to meet every month to settle any disputes or other matters that arise. Again, I should like to know why Mr. Armitago and myself were not invited to attend before the Committee to answer the charges made against us. I think that the punishment meted out to the Albion C.C. has been rather drastic. Rule 10 says that two points only shall be deducted from any club playing an unregistered man, whereas the League Committee have deducted four points. I should like to suggest that the League make a rule to the effect that a player should be allowed to sign for whatever clubs he likes, but be eligible only for the Club he plays for first."

THE LATE MR. SWORDER

OF LUTON. ,

MEMORABLE FEATURES OF A LONG CAREER.

The announcement of the death of Mr. Sworder, which occurred at Holly Lodge, his residence in Castle-street, on Sunday morning, was received with much regret by the people of Luton, not merely by those who have known him in recent years by repute and by his good deeds in Church work, but especially by the older residents, who remember well the prominent part he took in years gone by in the public affairs of the town.

Mr. Sworder's health began to give cause for anxiety about six or seven years ago. A year or two later, when spending Christmas with his son at Folkestone, he became so seriously ill that for nearly three months his life was despaired of. His sons brought him from Folkestone a few wooks later in a semi-conscious condition, under the supervision of the St. John Ambulance Association. Largely owing to the advice and treatment of Dr. James Collier, and the assiduous care of his nurses, he made what seemed to be almost a marvellous recovery, and, following Dr. Collier's advice, he lived a few years longer. Very gradually he went down hill and, during the last two years, required the attention of two nurses, being at the same time almost blind and helpless.

A few weeks ago there developed the trouble which, at times, gave rise to great pain to him, specially during the last week or two of his life, when it was so intense that it was doubtless answerable for the ultimate collapse, which occurred rather unexpectedly. The pain for two days previously had, however, been greatly relieved. Never was a patient attended by more devoted nurses, never was the care and attention rendered by nurses more greatly appreciated. Mr. O'Neill, whose idominant and powerful character was a force in Luton for many years, was perhaps Mr. Sworder's greatest friend, and together they fought many a School Board battle.

And those cld days which saw the introduction of the School Board in Luton were indeed stirring days. Although Mr. Sworder took part in other public work—he was for instance, a member of the old Board of Health, the forerunner of the Corporation—no doubt his greatest activity was seen in his association with the Rev. J. O'Neill, in the fight en school matters in the early "seventics." At that time the only schools in the town were the old British School and the Church Schools Complaint was made that there was an insufficiency of school accommodation in the town; but the Vicar, supported by Mr. Sworder and elhers, fought the question in determined fashion, and the outcome was that the Education Defartment became convinced that there was a sufficiency of school places. They accordingly refused to grant the request for an order for the formation of a School Board. Thereupon the trustees of the British School closed their establishment, and in face of such a position the Department had no alternative but to order an election, the amount of available school accommodation having been greatly reduced by this freens.

duced by this means.

The Board was duly elected in February, 1874, the Vicar heading the poll, and Mr. Sworder being one of the first members elected. At the first meeting the following protest signed by the first meeting the following protest signed by the wider, Mr. Welch, and Mr. Sworder, was handed in: "Wo, the undersigned, hereby state that the validity and legality, both of the order made for the election of the School Board and the election of the Board itself, having been disputed, and preliminary steps having been taken with a view of ascertaining whether such order and election are valid and legal, and notice to this effect having been given to the Education Department, protest against any proceedings being taken until further inquiry is made." Despite that protest, the business was proceeded with, Mr. Robinson being elected vice-chairman, and Mr. Sell clerk. During the whole of the proceedings the Church party abstained from voting, and they did not attend another meeting until May 19th, when all were present. On that occasion Mr. John Higgins gave notice to move that a census be taken of the children of school age, and at the ensuing meeting that resolution was accepted. Among questions which came up

During the many years Mr. Sworder was a member of the Board he held firm to his convictions and his party, and although always a man of retiring disposition, with no great predilection for public speaking, he took his part in the debates, and frequently intervened with effect. He was ever a warm supporter of the Church Schools in the town, was a Manager of one or two of them, and always ready to assist them whenever assistance was needed. He was indeed one of the kindest hearted men that Luton has known, though he was not one to publish his acts abroad. It has been said of many, and not more truly than in his case, that he never let his left hand know what his right hand did in the way of charitable gifts. He was, in fact, very quiet and unostentatious in doling out charity, but he was a most liberal subscriber to all philanthropic bodies, and there was cortainly very little done in the way of church extension or church work, or school building, but he was connected with it in some way.

It may be mentioned that first Mr Sworder was attached to the old Parish Church. Christ Church was opened in 1859, and after that Mr. Sworder, who lived then at the Bury, where the Deputy Mayor now resides, attended Christ Church, where he was a valued supporter for many years. He left Christ Church at last because he could not hear the preacher very well there, and a new church sprung up in St. Paul's, in New Town. Mr. Sworder took a great deal of interest in the building of the new church, the foundation stone of which was laid by Lord Alwyne Compton, as Bahop of Ely, in August, 1890. The building of St. Paul's was found necessary because of the rapid growth of the New Town neighbourhood, caused by the opening up of the Ashton Charity Estate and the hundreds of houses that were ercoted on it and other proporty, accommodating a large population which was far removed then from any regular place of worship connected with the Church of England. Mr. Sworder took a prominent part in connection with the scheme, was a member of the Building Committee, and contributed liberally to the funds. He attended the church in these later years until he was laid aside by the increasing infirmities of age, and was always very good to the vanous institutions and societies connected with it. For one year he was church-warden of the Parish Church, and for some years

he held office as churchwarden of Christ Church. Mr. Sworder in his day was connected with the Volunteer movement, and became Captain of the local Corps, but husiness claims prevented him from holding the position any length of time. In politics he was a staunch Conservative, and a strong Tariff Reformer. long before Mr. Chamberlain's conversion to the policy, and often talked or experiences in the old Corn Law days. In earlier times, that is to say some thirty or more years ago, he took an active part in the political doings of this part of the county, and occupied the position of Chairman of the Conservative party of Luton and District. That was, of course, in the days when the whole county returned two members, and before the redistribution of seats by which the county was divided for Parliamentary purposes into North and South Beds. Divisions.

Among other characteristics, it may be men-

tioned of him that he possessed one that few men could claim—he never complained about the weather! He was never heard to say a bad word; yet, as a friend says, he was not namby-pamby by any means. Master in his own household, no one could take advantage of him, either in private life or in business; and he maintained the dignity that was natural to him even in his illness, in which he had to put up with almost every trial a man could encounter.

Mr. Sworder was in his 87th year, and, as a devoted friend of his writes, "He died full of years and honour." Born at Westmill Bury, Buntingford, of an old and well-known Hertfordshire family, he spent his school days in the fine old cathedral city of Canterbury, being educated at King's School. On leaving school he was articled to his uncle, Mr. Thomas Sworder, of Hertford, of the firm of Longmore, Sworder, and Longmore. He came to Luton somewhere about 1848 or 1849, and in September, 1851, was married at the old church to Miss Vyse, eldest daughter of Mr. Richard Vyse, of Holly Lodge. He practised here as a solicitor for some time, but eventually gave up his profession, not from choice, but from necessity, to take over the Bedford Road Brewery. This was still in the fifties. It was the first really well-known Luton brewery, and Mr. Sworder directed and controlled that large concern for many years, in fact until it was sold in 1897. In 1860, the brewery of Messrs. Burr and Crab in Park-street, was absorbed, and the numerous houses belonging to it were added to the Bedford Road Brewery, only a malting place being kept on the old brewery site. As we have said, Mr. Sworder continued to direct the affairs of the brewery until some thirteen years ago, when it was sold by public auction at Tokenhouse-yard, being acquired by Mr. J. W. Green, after some spirited competition, for no less a sum than £139,000. Thereupon it was amalgamated with the existing browery of Mr. J. W. Green, and there are one or two of the old employees of the Bedford-road undertaking still in the service of the firm.

Mr. Sworder's golden wedding was kept as a grand family event on Sept. 10th, 1901. Fourteen of his children survive him, and several of them are intimately connected with Luton. The eldest son is Mr. Arthur Thomas Sworder, of Weybridge, Surrey, and next comes Dr. Horace Sworder, who was for thirty years Medical Officer for the Borough of Luton, and has been a familiar figure in town life for many years. The eldest daughter is Mrs. Minet, of Bagnor, who married Mr. J. C. Minet, late head of the London and County Bank; and the other children are Mrs. A. W. Welch, widow of Mr. A. W. Welch, of Bridgnorth, who has a son a Captain in the Duke of Cambridge's own Middlesex Itegiment; Miss Sworder, of Holly Lodge, Luton, prominent in church work in St. Sawour's parish; Miss Ada Lucy Sworder; Miss Emily Sworder, Mrs. Bolton Tomson, wife of Dr. Bolton Tomson, of Luton; Mr. Sydney Vyso Sworder, an enthusiastic supporter of the Town Cricket Club; Dr. Ernest Geo. Sworder, of Ramsgate, who was receently on a visit to Luton; Mr. Noville R. Sworder, momber of the firm of Sedgwick, Turner, Sworder and Wilson, solicitors at Watford; and Miss Hilda Minet Sworder.

THE FUNERAL.

The funeral will take place at three o'clock this (Thursday) afternoon. The first part of the service will be conducted in the Parish Church, and will be taken by the Rev. T. Bulman, Vicar of St. Paul's, assisted by the Rev. E. Dakin, curate of the Parish Church. The Vicar of Christ Church, the Rev. C. Morgan Smith, and the Rev. Mr. Watts, representing the Vicar of St. Saviour's Church (the Rev. J. C. Trevelyan), who is away from Luton, will also be present. The last rites will be performed at the Church Cemetery, where the mortal remains of the late Mr. Sworder will be laid to rest next to the grave of his dear friend, the Rev. James O'Neill.
