ANNUAL DINNER.

The annual dinner in connection with the Bollington Cricket Club was held at the Turner's Arms, Bollington, on Saturday evening, and was a great success. About sixty, which is a larger number than usual, sat down to the excellent spread provided by the landlord (Mr C. Woodhead). Afterwards a concert was held, over which Mr G. H. Swindells, captain and treasurer of the club, presided. Amongst others present were the Rev. A. H. King (the vicar), Mr E. L. Hoyle, Mr J. A. Wanklyn, Mr C. Slater, Mr N. Irving, Mr R. H. Owen, Mr G. Beaver, Mr J. Wilson, and Mr J. W. Woollam (hon. sec.).

The toast of "The King and the rest of the Royal Family" having been duly honoured,

The Chairman apologised for the absence of Mr E. L. Oliver, Mr F. F. Grafton, and Mr H. S. Claye, who regretted their inability to be present.

The Vicar proposed the toast of "The Army, Navy, and Auxiliary Forces." Before he came to the dinner he was wondering in what way the toast was connected with the Cricket Club. However, he had arrived at the conclusion that cricket and the Army and Navy and the Auxiliary Forces were very great factors in developing the mental and the physical well-being of the men of the country. (Hear, hear.) He trusted that the Bollington Cricket Club would be even more prosperous than it was last year, and that he would be allowed to take some personal interest in it himself. (Hear, hear.) Referring to football, the speaker said the other week he kicked off for Bollington, and then was obliged to go to a meeting; but he afterwards heard that three players had been suspended for fighting. (Laughter.) He trusted his connection with the Bollington Cricket Club would not have a similar result. (Laughter, and hear, hear.) Reverting to the toast, the Vicar said it was very important that every young man should devote his services to his king and country instead of doing nothing. Some of those present would no doubt read the results of the day's football, and they would see that forty and fifty thousand people had been present at a certain football match. He maintained that it was essential that every young man should employ his spare time in drilling and physical exercises, thus fitting himself to be called upon in time of stress and emergency. (Hear, hear.) Cricket was a healthy game, and should be taken more interest in, because every man learned "to play the game." (Hear, hear.) He had to couple with that toast the name of Captain Haigh, who was doing a great work in connection with the younger branch of the auxiliary forces in the form of the Church Lads' Brigade. He (the Vicar) hoped the auxiliary forces in that parish would increase, and also that the junior branch would prosper, as he was sure it must do under the leadership of Captain Haigh. He had pleasure in proposing the toast. (Applause.)

Mr C. H. Haigh, captain of the Bollington C.L.B. briefly responded.

"SUCCESS TO THE BOLLINGTON CRICKET CLUB."

In proposing this toast Mr Wanklyn said they were sorry their President was not amongst them to receive their grateful marks of appreciation and good will. The results of the year's working had been very disappointing owing, of course, to the fact that their old friend, the rain, had poured down in buckets full on them on their spots day. It started raining in the morning last year, and the year before, and they could not expect the crowd to come down to the Happy Valley on a wet day. He thought

they were going to alter this, because they had got Mr Woollam as Secretary again. (Applause.) He congratulated the club most heartily in having persuaded such an energetic man as Mr Woollam to resume the secretaryship, and he wished to couple his name with the toast. (Applause.) Now they had got him again their success was assured. One might just point out why Mr Woollam was a successful secretary, and why he was always successful in everything he did. It was simply because he was energetic. He did think that the lack of this quality was a defect of a good many people. They would never be successful unless they put energy into their work. (Hear, hear.) Mr Wanklyn concluded with an appeal for more subscriptions and begged to submit the toast. (Applause.)

In response, Mr Woollam thanked them for the way they had drunk the toast, and also Mr Wanklyn for coupling his name with it. He (Mr Woollam) rather thought their worthy chairman would have responded as he (Mr Woollam) had been out of office for the last three or four years. The reason he had again taken over the secretaryship of the club was because he could not bear to see it going down, though this was not from any lack of energy on the part of the two previous secretaries. In Mr Harrop and Mr Comberbirch they had two hard working men, but unfortunately they had had shocking sports days. Last year rain started about twelve o'clock, and continued for the rest of the day. In spite of that they took £80 or £90 at the gate, and if they could only have a fine day this year he was sure their sports would be a huge success. After they had been working for such a long time prior to the sports, it was very disheartening indeed when the rain came on and spoiled everything. After referring to the death of Mr Collier—whose cup attracted such huge entries—and also Mr Turner, the Secretary went on to speak of the excellent ground they had got, and surprised all present by stating that the improved condition of the ground and surroundings was entirely due to Mr F. F. Grafton, who had given the Council £200 to spend as they thought fit. (Applause.)

Mr E. L. Hoyle proposed the toast of the Cheshire County Cricket Club. He had been wondering why he had been selected to propose this toast, and the only conclusion he could possibly come to was that cricket was one of the few sports in which he had not disgraced himself. (Laughter.) The County Cricket Club was a cause in which they were all interested, and their interest in it was only second to that in their own local club. They were all Cheshire men, either by birth or adoption, and they all of them desired to see Cheshire occupy an honourable place in county cricket. (Applause.) He wished to couple with the toast the name of Mr Stanley Turner, who had represented Bollington on the Cheshire team. They all wished well to the club, and he hoped they would not only occupy good positions in the League, but become the champion county in England. (Applause.) He asked them to drink to the health of the Cheshire County Cricket Club.

Mr Stanley Turner, in responding, said he was afraid Mr Hoyle's remarks were a little previous. As one of the suffering martyrs who appeared to represent Cheshire—(laughter)—he might say they had distinguished themselves, but with low scoring. He referred to the match to be played on the Bollington ground between Cheshire and Yorkshire second, and said the County had given them that match without any asking. (Hear, hear.) He hoped that when the match was played Bollington would show their appreciation by turning up in good numbers. (Applause.)

The Chairman proposed the health of the Patrons and Subscribers, and in response Mr Owen referred to the Club's financial position. He wanted them to "go up one" in their subscriptions, and place the club on a sound financial footing. He had always taken a deep interest in the club, and his first subscription was given to the Shrigley Vale Club 30 years ago. If the club went down it would be a great calamity, and if those present could only get a subscriber each the club would be kept alive, and the villagers would be entertained to healthful recreation every Saturday. (Applause.)

On the proposition of Mr N. Irving, seconded by Mr J. Wilson, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded to the Chairman for presiding.

During the evening songs were rendered by Messrs A. S. Turner, H. Comberbirch, W. Maguire, G. H. Swindells, J. O. Warburton, and the Vicar. Mr Fox recited, and Mr David Cole presided at the piano.

CRICKET.

SATURDAY'S MATCHES.

MACCLESFIELD v. BOLLINGTON.

The keen but friendly rivalry which has long existed between the above clubs always invests their annual encounters with a special interest. Saturday's match, unfortunately, was somewhat marred by the wet. There was very little grubbing, however, for it was generally recognised that vegetation was already in need of a little moisture. Still, a sufficient rainfall is scarcely conducive to the enjoyment of outdoor recreation, and consequently it was not surprising to find that the match, which was played on the Victoria Ground, was witnessed by a small number of spectators.

It had been arranged to pitch the wickets at 2.30, but evidently the Weather Office had not been consulted, for it was four o'clock before it was possible to commence operations. In the meantime it had been agreed to drawumps at 7.30. Last year's opening match ended in a draw, after an historic struggle on the part of Macclesfield's "tail," and it was hoped that the present encounter would be brought to a decisive conclusion.

Bollington were the first to occupy the wickets, J. Millward and W. Berry facing the bowling of Spencer and W. Compton. After a maiden over, Millward opened his score with a boundary, but ten minutes later a sharp shower drove the players into the pavilion. The captains (Messrs. J. C. Gosscock and A. S. Turner) then had a consultation as to the desirability of continuing the match, but on the rain abating, it was decided to make another attempt. Finally, the additional rainfall had not improved the bowlers' chances; indeed, the water of the ground rendered the bowling ineffective, and the batsmen, finding it very much to their liking, helped themselves to a liberal supply of runs. Eventually, Spencer succeeded in disposing of Millward, and Turner took his place at the wicket. When the half-century had been reached, Compton handed the ball to Millward, but the change proved ineffectual, and the Bollington captain completing his 50. Millward relieved Spencer, and superseded Harrison. Ultimately a ball from Millward disposed of his partner, the new-comer, T. Clay, soon after which the bowling had no terrors for the batsmen, who were given out lbw, after many innings, which produced 88. The successor, Dixon, the visitors' proctor, helped Clay to carry the score to 150, when the rain necessitated another adjournment, during which Bollington decided to retire. They had obtained their runs at the rate of about 100 per hour, and are to be congratulated upon their exhilarating display.

J. Millward and R. Corbishley were entrusted with the task of opening Macclesfield's batting, and it was soon evident that they were no beginners. The runholders were Maguire and Dixon, and the batsmen appeared to be at their best when Hall was cleverly caught by Corbishley, running out at a well-pitched ball from Harrison. Spencer then joined Corbishley, and Macclesfield's score looked like assuming respectable dimensions, when suddenly a ball taken by Turner in the slips was run out to his credit. Henceforward, he fell somewhat rapidly. Turner and Dixon, playing havoc with the remaining batsmen, 15 the last man came in, and the question was would he and his vis-à-vis be able to play out time, and thus save the game, as Gosscock and his partner did in the corresponding match of last season. On this occasion, however, the fates were against the defending batsmen, and two minutes of time Turner sent the Macclesfield skipper to the right about. Thus the match, which was of a decidedly exhilarating character, despite the adverse weather conditions, terminated in a well-earned victory for Bollington. Scores:

**BIRKONIAN'S DEATH IN
SOUTH AFRICA**

**INTERESTING CAREER OF
MR. T. R. BRETHERTON.**

Many sincere regrets were expressed when the news reached England of the death of Mr. Thomas Roughhead Bretherton at Bloemfontein, South Africa. Mr. Bretherton, who went to South Africa about fourteen years ago, was well known in sporting circles in Birkenhead, having been a particularly fine cricketer.

Information regarding Mr. Bretherton's career has been kindly forwarded by "Our Orange River Colony Correspondent" (as he styles himself), Mr. Gilbert W. Heesketh, late of Claughton Higher Grade School, who is now a prominent consulting engineer in Bloemfontein.

Mr. T. R. Bretherton, who was 38 years of age, died very suddenly at about nine o'clock on May 15th at his residence, "The Bungalow," First-street, Bloemfontein. The news of his death came as a great shock to his many friends, for very few knew of his illness. In fact, he was at his office on the previous Saturday morning, and was then apparently in good health. The immediate cause of death was hemorrhage. He was attended by Dr. de Kock, and his old friend and fellow sportsman, Mr. C. G. Frichardt, was present at the last. Deceased leaves a widow to mourn his untimely death.

Before going to South Africa Mr. Bretherton was intimately connected with sport in and around Birkenhead. He was particularly fond of cricket, and for three years played for Cheshire (as well as his brother Jim), and was chosen in 1893 to play for Liverpool and District against the all-conquering Australians. He also played for Birkenhead Park and Rock Ferry. A keen follower of hounds, he acted as whip to the Cheshire Bungles and hunted with the North Cheshire hounds.

He was accompanied to South Africa by his sister, who remained with him until his marriage. At the outbreak of the war with the Boer Republics they experienced exciting times. Mr. Bretherton was commandeered to fight for the Boers, but fortunately managed with his sister to board the last train which left Bloemfontein for Naaport and Queenstown. His sister left for the South, while he rendered excellent services for the English in the remount department at Naaport. His knowledge of horses was an important factor, and was of great service to the English officials in the department.

After the war he returned to Bloemfontein. He was a member of the Ramblers' Club, and was a member and steward of the old Bloemfontein Sporting Club from its inception till incorporated in the Orange River Colony Turf Club. Mr. Bretherton was of a sunny, genial nature, and was immensely popular both in business and in sporting circles. To many who remembered him while in Birkenhead his death will be keenly regretted.

The funeral was attended by a large number of townspeople, and at the funeral service at the cathedral there was a representative attendance, including Mr. D. Wilkie (representing His Excellency the Administrator), Sir Andries Maasdorp (Chief Justice of the O.R.C.), Mr. J. A. Ashburnham (Resident Magistrate), Mr. W. Murgear (Registrar of High Court), Dr. De Kock, Dr. A. B. Ward, Mr. H. F. Rhine, K.C., Attorney G. A. Hill, Messrs. G. A. Frichardt (Ramblers' Club), L. Richardson (Secretary Club), C. P. Beck, P. J. Faure, H. L. Frichardt, H. Jagan, Barclay Lloyd, Attorney Evenwell, D. Murray, J. Davidson, H. Botha, J. Elliott, A. Johnson, J. Elkington (Bethlehem), H. Holmes (Kaffir River), Gilbom, W. Heesketh (representing Birkenhead, England). A number of the Toupe Garrison were present, including Lieut.-Colonel Dallas, Commandant, School of Musketry; Major Moore, Chief Instructor, School of Musketry; Major Horne, the Carabiniers; Captain Sadler, the Carabiniers; Lieutenant Kidd, the Carabiniers; Lieutenant Norris, the Carabiniers; Lieutenant Blackburn, the Carabiniers; Lieutenant Anstruther, the Carabiniers; and a great many others.

Mr. Bretherton was one of the most familiar figures in Bloemfontein, and also one of the most popular. A native of Lancashire, he was the fourth son of the late Mr. J. H. Bretherton, of Whiston Hall, Lancashire, and of Crabwall Hall, Cheshire. He is a brother of Colonel H. W. K. Bretherton, V.D., the popular commanding officer of the 4th Battalion Cheshire Regiment (the "Greys"). Mr. Bretherton was educated at Chester, under private tutorship, at King's College. On terminating his studies he joined his brother, afterwards becoming connected with Messrs. Higgins and Porter, stockbrokers, of Liverpool. He was with the latter firm for four years, when a breakdown in health caused him to go abroad, and he went to South Africa, turning his eyes to Bloemfontein, where he started business as sharebroker, estate agent, and insurance agent. Bloemfontein boasted few better sportsmen than Mr. Bretherton, for in almost every branch he either took an active part or was keenly interested.

GREENHALGH'S BENEFIT.

When he had made five the batsman was caught by Hewetson off Greenhalgh. With eight runs added Cragg played on to Greenhalgh, the outgoing batsman's contribution being 18. Oldham quickly hit up 15, and was then caught and bowled by Hewetson. Baker, after making four, was missed at cover-point by Wild, and should have been run out. Greenhalgh knocking down the stumps before he had gathered the ball.

The century was hoisted after an hour and 45 minutes' play, Baker and Williams at this time being associated. These batsmen made an excellent stand, and a useful addition to the score. Williams left with the total at 125, being caught behind the wicket of Hartley's bowlers. Baker, who at this time had made 22, was joined by Goodall, who last week, playing with the second eleven against Bowdon 2nd, hit up 58. Firth had the satisfaction of reaching the half century, but at this figure was bowled by the Sale captain. Good all, after contributing 20, was caught and bowled by Greenhalgh. The innings closed for 176. Greenhalgh was the most successful of the Sale bowlers, his five wickets being secured at a cost of nine runs each.

The Sale innings were opened by H. A. Thomas and C. A. Hartley, Williams and Archer being the bowlers. When Britty had made six he put himself up in the slips out of the reach of Archer. LOCAL CRICKET NOTES.

[BY "COVER-POINT."]

KNUTSFORD'S LAST MATCH.

The Knutsford Cricket Eleven did not wind up the season in anything like the fashion that their supporters anticipated they would. Their last match—that at Heaton Mersey, last Saturday—proved disastrous to them, for they were beaten by 22 runs and a wicket to spare. Still, on the whole, the joculars have had a very satisfactory season, and it takes an exceedingly good eleven to beat the Merseyites on their own enclosure. Knutsford's failure was brought about by rather poor batting, combined with good bowling by the homesters' bowlers, particularly J. Sawyer, who was in deadly form and took seven wickets at a small cost. Morris and Harry Todd opened Knutsford's venture, they having won the toss, and the game opened in sensational manner, for Todd was once more clean bowled by the first ball sent down. This is the third occasion this season that Todd has experienced this unfortunate occurrence, and it is curious to think that prior to this season he had only been bowled once before in his life by the first ball he received. Such, however, are the fortunes—or misfortunes, whichever you like to call them—of the game. Morris was out at 16, and then, two runs later, Hall departed for a duck. A stand, however, was made for the fourth wicket, Daniel being chiefly responsible for the fact that the score was taken from 20 to 68 before "Sandy" Bebbington was bowled by Sawyer for four. At 74 Daniel departed, and thenceforward wickets fell cheaply, although Atkins hit well, and defied the bowling for some time, compiling 29 before being beaten and bowled by Sawyer. The last six wickets fell for the addition of 22 runs. Altogether Knutsford totalled 98.

A NEAR SHAVE.

Although Knutsford had done rather badly in the batting line, the Heaton Mersey men had a narrow shave of doing even worse, for eight wickets were down for 28 runs and nine down for 94. But the home batting was better than that of their opponents, for no less than six of their eleven managed to reach double figures. Hayward (21), T. Sawyer (17), Halden (16), and Robinson (not out 29) were the ones who did well for their side. To Robinson, however, chief honours are due, for I doubt whether, in the event of his being a failure, Heaton Mersey would have won—they would more likely have lost by a good margin. Simpson obtained three wickets for 48 runs, A. Smith three for 46, A. Dick two for 11; Daniel one for 3, and Sandy Bebbington none for 5. Scores: Knutsford,

A SUMMARY OF THE SEASON.

During the season that has just closed it is interesting to know that out of 25 matches played by the team nine were won, four lost, and ten drawn. 3,022 runs were scored for the club for 190 wickets, giving an average of 15.8 per wicket, and 2,766 runs were scored against the club for 189 wickets, an average of 14.6 per wicket. The highest score the club made was 223 for eleven wickets against Wintringham Park, and the highest total against the club 275 for five wickets by Broughton. The lowest total of the club was 65 against Timperley, and the lowest against 46 by the Northern Zingari. OBITUARY.

MR WILLIAM LISTER, J.P.

FORMER MAYOR OF STOCKPORT.

WELL-KNOWN BUSINESS MAN.

It is with regret we have to announce the death of Mr William Lister, which took place at his residence, Norwood Villa, Lowfield-road, Stockport, about 2 a.m. on Tuesday morning. Mr Lister had been ill since Easter, and went away for a holiday to the Canary Islands. On the return voyage he caught a chill, and became worse. Since his return home Mr Lister had been attended by



Dr. Rayner, but he never recovered from the attack, and died as stated. The deceased, who was 65 years of age, leaves two sons and two daughters, and the news of his passing will be received with regret by a large circle of friends and the townspeople of Stockport generally.

The late Mr Lister (in partnership with his brother, Mr Richard Lister), succeeded his father, the late Mr John Lister, in the business of a draysalter in Lord-street, and in which he was actively interested up to the time of his death. The deceased, who was a native of Stockport, married Miss Wakefield, a Stockport lady, in 1868, who died in 1897, leaving him a widower, with four children.

HIS PUBLIC WORK.

Mr Lister, although of a modest and retiring disposition, for many years had taken an active part in public affairs, in which his shrewd and sound business qualities served him well. In 1889 he was returned to the Stockport Town Council, together with the late Mr Jonathan Noden and Mr Robert Redfern, for the Middle Ward, and three years later was allowed a "walk over." After a rearrangement of the Wards Mr Lister was returned as a representative for Spring Bank Ward, and was elected an alderman of the borough in 1901, and in 1902 Mr Lister was elected Mayor, filling the office for one year. His term of office as Mayor was a somewhat stormy one. Mr Lister was chairman of the committee charged with the important duty of bringing into operation the Education Act of 1902. Just before the election of Mr Lister the disastrous fire took place at the Vernon Cotton Mills on November 5th, 1902, in which nine operatives lost their lives and 30 were injured. Two funds were raised in the town at the time, including the "Echo" Shilling Fund, and another was opened by Mr Lister as Mayor. The two funds were amalgamated and during the time the mill was being rebuilt the operatives were out of work, the fund was administered by a committee; the then Mayor taking a prominent part in it. The balance of the fund was invested for the benefit of the widows and children of the men who were killed at the fire, and Mr Lister, as the Mayor, with Mr Astle, Editor of the "Echo," were appointed trustees. This fund is not yet exhausted, and payments are still being made, but a

vacancy in the trusteeship has been occasioned by the death of Mr Lister.

It was also during Mr Lister's Mayoralty that a town's meeting was called at the Court House to consider the various clauses in the Corporation Bill, the proceedings being of a protracted and heated character, as also was a special night sitting of the Council. Certain clauses in the Bill were negatived at the town's meeting, but Mr Lister, as Mayor, won for himself golden opinions for the fair and impartial manner in which the meetings were conducted by him.

During Mr Wm. Lister's Mayoralty in 1902, his daughter, Miss Annie Lister, officiated as Mayoress with dignity and grace.

Mr Lister was appointed a borough magistrate in 1902.

In religion, Mr Lister was a member of the Portwood United Methodist Church, with which his father was also associated, and the deceased has held office in the Connexion, being hon. treasurer when the New Connexion Conference was held in Stockport. Mr Lister was also interested in P.S.A. work, and had been chairman of the Portwood United Methodist Chapel for many years.

In politics Mr Lister was a Liberal, being one of the leading members of the Stockport Liberal party. In addition to having been chairman of the Central Reform Club, he was for many years treasurer of the Stockport Liberal Association, and a member of the "400."

The late Mr Lister retired from the Council in 1904, together with other Liberal aldermen and councillors, when the Conservatives went into power, and he never sought to re-enter the Council after that time.

The deceased was connected with a number of companies in the town, including the Ark Mill, and was chairman of the Stockport Hat Supply Company.

Mr Lister was a member of the Stockport Licensing Committee.

Flags are flying at half-mast at the Borough Court House, the Hat Supply Company's Works, Central Reform Club, and other local buildings.

The interment takes place to-day (Friday) at the Stockport Borough Cemetery. A funeral service will be held in Mount Tabor Chapel at 11.15 a.m., prior to the interment at 12 o'clock.

MAGISTERIAL REFERENCE.

At the Stockport Police Court on Tuesday, Mr T. Kay, the presiding magistrate, made sympathetic reference to the death of Mr Lister. Mr Lister he said was Mayor of the town in 1902, and from 1889 to 1904 he served the town as a member of the Corporation. He did valuable work on several committees, he dignified the bench to which he was elected, and his advice was always esteemed, whilst his public speeches were characterised by good sense and sound judgment. He did much for the welfare of the people of the town, and in religious and P.S.A. work he took a prominent part. Their sympathy went out to the family. They could say of him -

"His life was gentle.

And the elements were so mixed in him

That nature might stand up

And say to all the world,

This was a man."

Mr Helm, speaking on behalf of the gentlemen practising in the Court, said that they had the opportunity of judging the gentlemen who sat on the bench, and they had always found that in Mr Lister they had a magistrate who gave most careful attention to any matter that came before him. He had been associated with Mr Lister in many matters outside that Court, and he was always unostentatious, sympathetic, and charitable.

The funeral of the late Mr William Lister, J.P., whose death occurred at his residence, Norwood Villa, Lowfield Road, Stockport, on Tuesday morning, took place on Friday amid unusual signs of sympathy and esteem. The remains were enclosed in a hermetically sealed shell with an outer case of polished English oak, and engraved breast-plate:

Aged 64 years.

THE SERVICE.

The service, which was of a solemn nature, was conducted by the Rev. W. H. Lockley, assisted by the Rev. W. J. Crossley, suitable music being played by Mr J. W. Bray, who presided at the organ.

The Rev. W. H. Lockley said that as a memorial service had been arranged to take place on Sunday morning in the church with which Mr Lister had been connected, it was not necessary for him to say much that morning. They were going to lay aside the remains of a good man and true, a man of simple tastes and blamelessness of life. He was a man of sterling worth and solid character; he was not a man given to much speaking, but the few words he did speak were always weighty. There was a word which had a considerable modern tendency, the word "pushful" or "pushfulness," but Mr Lister was not a man of that description, he was of a quieter order. If his words were not many, they were wise words; they came from a sound man, and as he (the speaker) thought of him he was reminded of those still waters that not only ran deep, but which also best reflected the stars. He had the interests of the town at heart, and faithfully served it in

the capacity of mayor, alderman, and magistrate, and in many other offices. He was connected with many associations and organisations; he wrought well according to the gifts which God had given him, and he had well earned the rest which God had now given him. He was a loyal and faithful son of the Stockport circuit, which he represented in conference. He was treasurer for the trust at Portwood; three years ago he took a foremost part in the founding of the new church at Edgeley, and to the end he was its friend and its treasurer. As he had seen Mr Lister so regularly in his place at Portwood Chapel, he had thought of Goldsmith's village preacher, who "never changed, nor wished to change his place." He had been associated with the church from his earliest days. Nowadays character told more and more; character was power, and in Mr William Lister they had that power.

AT THE CEMETERY.

The cortège afterwards proceeded to the Borough Cemetery, where it was met by the Mayor (Alderman A. Briggs), the Town Clerk (Mr R. Hyde), the Borough Treasurer (Mr H. Grundy), Alderman A. Johnson, J.P., Mr H. A. Jolostone, J.P., Councillor S. Brewster, Mr John Bateman, Mr Charles Carrington, Mr Edward Turkeston, and other gentlemen.

The service at the graveside was conducted by the Rev. W. H. Lockley. The last solemn rites were very impressive, and witnessed with mournful and sympathetic interest.

**PROPOSED NEW CHURCH
ROOM.**

**BAZAAR IN AID OF THE BUILDING
FUND.**

A four days' bazaar was opened on Wednesday by Lady Forbes Adam in the Stadium Rink, Northenden, in aid of the fund that is being raised for the erection of a new Church Room. The objects of the bazaar are fully set forth in the bazaar booklet, in which the Rector (Rev. Lowry Hamilton, M.A.), chairman of the Bazaar Committee, states:-

Nine years ago exactly, on coming to Northenden as rector of the parish, there appeared to be at that time two needs which stood out as of paramount importance. One of these brooked no delay. Northenden was rapidly increasing in population; new houses, new streets, were springing up in our midst, and it was evident that action must be taken, and at once, to provide an addition to the church burial ground. It is now rather ancient history, but none the less a gratifying

memory, that the scheme of extension by voluntary effort was determined on, and carried through, at last, with complete success.

The secondary need appeared to be more of the character of a luxury than a pressing necessity, but now the time has come when we may set about laying the foundation of this much-needed room.

The old Church Room has done in its time, excellent service. It is an ancient building. In the course of years it has become somewhat gloomy, and as it now stands quite out of proportion to the requirements of our increased and still increasing population.

The new room, when it is built, will carry on the old name, and will be available—let this be clearly understood—for various kinds of parochial meetings, concerts, lectures, gatherings, etc., social and serious, which are held from time to time.

It is widely and generally acknowledged that the need of such a building is most strongly felt. Therefore, starting with a good cause, a popular object, and a real need, the promoters of this bazaar ought to feel confident that they will have the generous and loyal support of practically all our parishioners. Further, bazaars on the scale of this undertaking, in Northenden, are not of frequent recurrence. Many years have elapsed since the last call was made on the generosity of our friends, and many years will probably pass before another such call comes round again. A record rally should, therefore, mark with signal success this effort to establish a fund for the building of this room, universally regarded as the chiefest need, at the present time, in the parish. It is a matter of congratulation, and no small satisfaction, to feel that we are not grappling with the incubus of a debt (as is so often the fate of bazaar workers), but that we hope to see, as a result of our labours and self-sacrifice, in the near future, a building that we may feel proud to have borne our share and part in erecting.

Buildings are expensive, and good buildings are very expensive. We want a building that will stand the test of time, and the more money that is generously found for this purpose, the better the building, and the sooner we shall see it rising in our midst. We have now a population in the parish of Northen-

den of well over 3000 people. If one in three of that population spend or give £1 to the bazaar's fund we shall be in a position to set about the work! The organisers have been working hard and working well to secure success. It remains for the general body of our parishioners and friends to back up their efforts, and if all will do their share the bazaar will be crowned with the happiest results.

THE OPENING CEREMONY.

The bazaar was opened on Wednesday afternoon by Lady Forbes Adam in the presence of a numerous gathering. The Rector (Rev. Lowry Hamilton, M.A.), presided. Amongst those present in addition to the stalholders and other ladies, being Mrs Hamilton, Mr and Mrs T. E. Tatton, Mr K. H. G. Tatton, Rev. J. A. Duff, B.A., Dr Boycott, Dr Munro, Mr John Faulkner, Mr T. Davenport, J.P., Mr Widdowson, and others.

The Rector, in introducing Lady Forbes Adam, said: "It is my pleasure and happy duty to extend to you from all who are interested in the parish of Northenden a most hearty welcome as opener of our bazaar today. If you only knew the many silent blessings that have gone out to you from those who had to organise this bazaar, you would feel amply rewarded for your kindness in coming to aid us. The object of our bazaar, like every other bazaar, is to raise as much money as possible by fair and free trading; but what this money we hope to raise will be spent on is to provide for our many parochial and social needs a better, larger, and more comfortable room than we possess in the present old Church Room. Northenden has grown rapidly, and this need is becoming more and more felt among us every day. The chance of meeting that need, or of going a long way towards it, is now being given to the parishioners, and it is my great ambition to see this building in our midst while I have the honour of being Rector of the parish. There are many pleasant incidents connected with a bazaar (as well as the reverse), but to look

on the pleasant side, among them we may number your presence here to-day, and though this is not the moment to dwell on this particular point, the goodwill, good temper, keenness, and loyalty of all our splendid workers. One regrets the fact that local trade may suffer a little through a bazaar at this time of the year, but here in Northenden it should be remembered that seven years have elapsed since a bazaar of this kind was held, and I think I may safely promise that another long period will elapse before a venture is made on this big scale again. Lady Forbes Adam, I feel sure if we only knew the numberless calls and invitations that you have to help out parochial efforts of this kind we would be astonished. We consider, therefore, that we are greatly honoured in Northenden, and most sincerely thank you for your interest and presence with us to-day. I trust that you may long be able to continue your many acts and deeds of kindness, which are associated with your name in this county and neighbourhood.

Lady Forbes Adam, on being called upon, said the generous way in which all appeared to have come forward to help, was, she hoped, a good augury for the success of the bazaar. She had much pleasure in declaring the bazaar open for business, and hoped it would prove a great success. (Applause.)

Mr T. E. Tatton, in moving a vote of thanks to Lady Forbes Adam, said they were greatly indebted to her for honouring the bazaar with her presence and help.

Dr Boycott, in seconding, said that Lord Rosebery, addressing the students of the Liverpool University on Monday, said that what we wanted in our country and in our history was action, not speeches. He believed if Lord Rosebery had been present at this bazaar he would have said "We want money, not speeches." He (Dr Boycott) could, however, endorse all that had been said by their Rector and Mr Tatton as to their indecision to Lady Forbes Adam for coming amongst them to open the bazaar. It was for an excellent cause, a parish hall being greatly needed in the village, and all the more praise was due to ladies like Lady Adam for coming forward from purely unselfish motives, and helping them.

The vote having been carried, Lady Adam bowed her acknowledgments, and was presented by Miss Hilda Faulkner (daughter of the Rector's Warren) with a magnificent bouquet of pink carnations, made and given by Mr Alfred Price.

SECOND DAY'S OPENING PROCEEDINGS.

The Bazaar was opened on Thursday by Mrs Tatton, of Wythenshawe, in the presence of numerous visitors.

In introducing Mrs Tatton, the Rector said: "It would be an impertinence on my part to talk of introducing the opener. Mrs Tatton needs no introduction, and she knows full well that she stands here as a friend among many friends. It is true that it needed no little persuasiveness to induce her to stand on this platform, but we give to her a warm welcome, with our assurance that by doing so she has given us real pleasure. "I do not want to go down to posterity as the great bazaar opener." One might go down with a worse character and title. The date of the old church room is 1840. It is Trust property, and the trust must be upheld. There has been no difficulty in the past, and we need fear none in the future, as to the use of that room. There has been little or no restrictions put upon meetings and other gatherings held within its ancient and now bulging walls. We have in our parish no fewer than four important buildings, two schools, a working men's club, and the old church room. In each case, I think I am right in saying, the building's to has been given by the owner of Wythenshawe. Memory and gratitude are often short lived, and I am glad of the opportunity of showing that of acknowledging that we owe a debt of gratitude to the past and to the present Squires of Wythenshawe. And I now add our warmest thanks to Mrs Tatton for standing in the position that she finds herself at the present moment.

In declaring the bazaar open for the day's sales Mrs Tatton said she had great pleasure in being present to assist them in their laudable effort to raise the funds necessary to erect a building suitable for the various purposes connected with the church and parish. She hoped their efforts would meet with abundant success.

On the motion of Mr John Faulkner, seconded by the Rev. J. A. Duff, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mrs Tatton.

It was announced that the takings on the first day amounted to £260.

Cricket Club.

The Season's Record.

The season closed last Saturday at the Arpley organization will hardly compare favourably with that of last year, when the Warringtonians had a most successful time of it going through the West Lancashire League without a defeat, whilst in the ordinary engagements only one match was lost. The inability of the club to raise anything like representative teams in many of the later matches has been a very sore point, and there is no doubt that in several of the games where moral victories have been gained a different tale would have been recorded had the representation been in accord with the club's reputation.

The season opened full of flourish, and so well did Warrington do at Newton, Warrington Park, Boughton Hall, and St. Helens Recreation, all away, that hopes were entertained of another long sequence of successes. The cold weather experienced at this portion of the campaign had, however, its effect on several of the players, and notably was this the case in that of Cresswell who for many matches was compelled to return home and the Arpley side had to rely upon the amateur talents. It was hard luck at Manchester and the dismissal of the strong side at headquarters for the paltry total of 82 was about one of the best performances of the season. In this game, the club had the assistance of the Rev. Father Lawson and he proved himself a rare good bowler; but, unfortunately, he was unable to play in any of the other matches.

The club have also been in the unfortunate position of being deprived of the services of their skipper, Mr. B. Shcock, who has been in failing health more or less all summer. His loss has been felt severely for not only is he an able captain but a valuable batsman, and one capable of dismiling any dangerous partnership. Mr. Richardson has, however, stepped into the breach at an opportune time and has ably led the team.

The highest aggregate score made by the Warringtonians was 201, for the loss of seven wickets, at Ashton-under-Lyne, and the match was noticeable for a fine not out innings of 122 made by T. Wright, who easily heads the batting averages. The highest score made against the Warringtonians was that of Manchester, a strong side including several of the county professionals making 216 for the loss of six wickets. Warrington's lowest aggregate was 66 against Sale, whilst they dismissed Boughton Hall for 48. This match played on Thursday, June 16th, being noticeable for a fine bowling performance by W. Bennett who secured nine wickets for eight runs.

In all 24 matches were arranged and of these six were won, five lost, seven drawn and the game at Chester with Boughton Hall ended in a tie. Four matches have been marred by bad weather and a mistake in the Stockport game at Arpley caused the records to be erased from the first class averages. It may be stated that Wright in this game made 132 not out. The Warringtonians have lost 146 wickets for 1,038 runs and dismissed 158 batsmen for 1,822 runs. The bulk of the bowling has fallen on the shoulders of W. Bennett, the Rev. H. Gray and Cresswell and the returns below will show at a glance the good work they have done.

THE ANNUAL MEETING.

THE CLUB'S BRIGHTER FUTURE.

The 40th annual meeting of the members of the Dukinfield Cricket Club was held on Friday at the Commercial Hotel, Astley-street. Mr. George Heathcote, the president, occupied the chair, and there was a crowded meeting, among those who were present being County Alderman C. H. Booth, Messrs. Joshua Hurst (secretary), John Thorpe (treasurer), J. W. Ashton, J. Hall, Percy Wagstaffe, G. H. Taylor, J. O. Lawson, and Joshua Garnde.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Mr. J. Hurst (secretary) read the annual report as follows:-

The report we have to place before you, from a cricketing standpoint, is not a gratifying one. As you all know, we are at the bottom of the league table. We have gained the distinction of winning the wooden spoon for the second time since we joined the league. This is to be deplored. (Hear, hear.) Still your committee is not dispondent, for we believe the players at our disposal are capable of better results. (Hear, hear.) The weather, as per usual with us, was very unfavourable, for out of fourteen home matches in favour there was not a ball sent down. Several others were very much interfered with, including one home match with Ashton, which means to us if not played a very serious loss. (Hear, hear.) The first team, out of 23 matches won 12, drew 1. The second team, out of 23 matches won 11, lost 4, drew 7. This is just the reverse of last year, but still a very creditable performance for our second team. (Hear, hear.) In the averages, first team, Mr. Ed. Heaton again heads the list in batting. He played 20 innings, not out 2, total runs 480, average 25.33 per innings. (Applause). Mr. S Horrocks comes second with 12 innnings, 16.9 per innnings. (Hear, hear.) In bowling Mr. E. Hobson is at the top with 70 wickets at a cost of 11.90 per wicket. (Applause). In the second team Mr. H. Halstead heads the list in batting with 12 innnings not out 2, total runs 299, average 22.90 per innnings. In bowling, Mr. J. Hopwood leads the list with 2 wickets at a cost of 13.40 per wicket. You all know that we have just held a very successful bazaar, and I take this opportunity on behalf of the committee, of thanking all the members who have in any way assisted us in that grand effort. (Hear, hear.) I trust we shall not rest now till we see a good pavilion on our ground, which is so essential to the welfare of our club. (Hear, hear.) During the year we have lost two of our most promising supporters and valued members in Mr. C. Lingard and Mr. Percy Wallwork. Your committee have appointed Mr. T. Porton as professional for the coming season, and we trust that the young players will take encouragement from his tutition, as we all know him to be a very good coach. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. Heathcote proposed that the report be adopted, which was seconded and passed.

THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

Mr. John Thorpe, the treasurer, explained a few of the items which appeared in the balance sheet. The £20 for work on the ground was for various kinds of labour, such as boardings, and repairs to boardings, etc.

Alderman Booth asked about the subscriptions in arrears of £21.

Mr. Thorpe said that they had about £35 all told, and he considered that there would be £21 good, or perhaps over.

A question was asked about the stationery, and printing and advertising being £5 more than last year.

Mr. Thorpe replied that there had been more general meetings summoned; they had had extra members' cards printed, which had cost 30s.

Mr. Lawson thought the arrears last year were £16. How much of that £16 was recovered and he also wanted to know how much of the £21 would have been collected?

Alderman Booth asked if the £21 subscriptions covered more than one year?

Mr. Thorpe replied that the £21 would be knocked off with the expense of the bazaar fund. Mr. Lawson again put his question, and Mr. Thorpe said that about £8 pounds had been recovered.

Mr. Wagstaffe: Are there several subscriptions outstanding for several years?

Mr. Thorpe: There is one ordinary member who owes more than three years.

Mr. Ernest Ashton, an auditor, said it had been a great pleasure to him to go through the accounts. There were some things which struck one as rather awkward from an auditor's point of view, as there were items from a few shillings to £10. The accounts were on a sound basis and he could say that they were a correct record of what had been presented to him. Mr. Lawson asked for the £20 odd for work done on the ground to be explained; it was rather a big sum considering they had a professional. The treasurer read a detailed list of the items in this account.

The auditor's report was accepted.

Mr. G. Heathcote proposed that the balance sheet be accepted. Mr. J. Garnde seconded and it was carried.

Mr. Heathcote proposed that Mr. Percy Wagstaffe be the president of the club for the coming year. Mr. J. Garnde seconded, and it was carried unanimously. Mr. Wagstaffe took the chair amid applause.

THE NEW PRESIDENT'S SPEECH.

Mr. Wagstaffe thanked them sincerely for electing him to the presidency. He would do his utmost for them and he would welcome any suggestions that might be made to him for their betterment. Everything would be put before them as closely as possible. He had had some experience of the cricket club in connection with the bazaar, and he could safely say that as chairman of the bazaar they had not a single hitch with anything in connection with that event. That was something out of the ordinary run of the cricket club. He would do his best in the future and he could not do any more. (Applause.)

On the nomination list for the position of treasurer there was only one name, that of Mr. Ernest Ashton, and he was accepted unanimously.

Mr. Heathcote moved that Mr. Frank Webb be secretary, and this was seconded by Alderman Booth on the understanding that Mr. Hurst had declined to stand again. The resolution was carried.

The committee was elected as follows:—Messrs. John Stafford, G. Heathcote, G. H. Seal, W. Leuning, H. King, J. W. Ashton, and J. Hurst.

It was suggested that an auditor be appointed who was independent of the club, and it was moved that a professional auditor be elected. This was seconded by Mr. Stafforid. Mr. Garnde said about the cost of such an audit. Mr. Wagstaffe said that when the committee got working it would not be a very great undertaking for any auditor to go through the accounts and certify as to their being correct. He did not think it would cost more than two guineas, and it would be more satisfactory from every point of view. He thought the committee should have power in regard to the appointment. Mr. Cash objected to such an appointment being made. When they had no money they had no professional auditor, but now they had money they wanted to spend it.

An amendment was moved by Mr. Kellett that the public auditor be dispensed with and that the two members of the club be appointed. The amendment was put, 21 being in favour and 20 against the amendment.

Mr. Lawrence moved that Mr. C. H. Sykes and Mr. Edwin Rains be elected auditors. Mr. Heathcote seconded. It was then announced that Mr. Sykes had tendered his resignation and the name of Mr. Ellis Williamson was substituted. There was carried unanimously.

Mr. T. Hobson proposed that Mr. Sam Horrocks be captain of the first team, and Mr. Heathcote agreed. This was agreed to and also that Mr. W. Holt be vice-captain. Mr. Arthur Williams was elected captain of the second team.

Dr. Porton spoke about the selection of the teams. They had had gentlemen in the past on the committee who might be business men, but who perhaps did not know very much about cricket. He suggested a small selection committee of men or a sub-committee to understand the game.

Mr. J. O. Lawson proposed a vote of thanks to the returning officers for their services. He said they had done their best to carry out their various duties.

Alderman Booth, in responding, as one of the older members of the club along with Mr. Lawrence, had seen the good and ill fortunes of the club for many years past. They were in a better position since the bazaar than they had been for a good many years, and they were hopeful that their efforts would bear fruit on the cricket field and in other directions. He hoped they would get more members and that the players would endeavour to do their best. The efforts of the teams had not met with the success they deserved. He thought when they got the new pavilion it would be an inducement to the people of Dukinfield to subscribe to the funds. They were indebted to the officers of the club for their services during the past 12 months and particularly Mr. Thorp and Mr. Hurst. The club had been in debt and they might congratulate themselves that they were retiring from office now that the club was fairly on its feet, and he hoped the new officers would put their shoulders to the wheel and bring the club back to what it was in its most palmy days. (Applause.)

Mr. Wagstaffe supported the resolution, and it was passed with applause. Mr. Thorp and Mr. Hurst briefly replied.
