**CRICKET.**

The first-class cricket of last week possessed very considerable interest; but the struggle for the county championship does not begin in earnest until to-day, when all the counties are engaged. Essex, who oppose Derbyshire at Leyton to-day, and Surrey at the Oval on Thursday, obtained a very handsome victory over Cambridge University a week ago. The Light Blues gave a very disappointing display, and the fine innings of P. A. Perrin (144), and the Rev. F. H. Gillingham (141) enabled Essex to close with seven wickets down and to win by an innings and 89 runs. The Cantabians did much better against Surrey towards the end of the week and won by two wickets, a result in large measure due to the brilliant batting of J. P. Ireland, whose not-out 187 was "a hard effort." Ireland, who is well-known to cricketers in East Anglia, went in second wicket down and remained until the match had been won. Yorkshire and Lancashire have opened the season in promising fashion, but Kent shamed in disappointing style against the Oxoniens.

The first-class fixtures for the present week include the following—Monday, matches: Kent, at Leyton (for A. D. Rougher's benefit); Yorkshire v. Lancashire, at London; Nottingham, at Nottingham; Somerset v. Gloucestershire, at Taunton; Sussex v. Hampshire, at Brighton; Essex v. Derbyshire, at Leyton; Worcestershire v. Warwickshire, at Worcester; Leicestershire v. Northamptonshire, at Leicester. Thursday, Surrey v. Essex, at the Oval; Lancashire v. Kent, at Manchester; Leicestershire v. Yorkshire, at Leicester; Warwickshire v. Northants, at Birmingham; Sussex v. Derbyshire, at Hastings.

Suffolk meet Lincolnshire today under somewhat unpromising conditions. The utmost difficulty has been experienced in inducing cricketers to represent Suffolk, and it is to be feared that the eleven will not be by any means representative. It is disheartening to find that not the opening match of the county's season there should not have been greater enthusiasm. Barely there must be a sufficiency of capable players in Suffolk to make the eleven put up a decent game in field which should have a reasonable prospect of success. I am assured that the Hon. Secretary (Mr. H. A. Groom) left no effort unmade to make the side representative. Cricketers of ability ought to display somewhat more of local patriotism than appears to have been brought into play on this occasion. Then, and then only, will there be any likelihood of success. There must be plenty of cricket promise procurable in the county if trouble is only taken to discover it.

Judging from the way in which the season has commenced at Colchester, the game has lost nothing as regards support from local enthusiasts, and all that is needed for an interesting four or five months' sport is fine weather. The change of the Garrison Club will be watched with interest, for since last season closed, several new regiments have arrived at the station, and accordingly the constitution of the Garrison team will be considerably altered. The officers' patch on the Abbey Field is fast, and in excellent condition. League cricket will gain from the introduction into the local competition of the military element, both the corporals and sergeants of the West Yorkshires Regiment having entered. The other competing clubs are the Esquires, Britannia, St. George's, Culver Street Works, Mersea, and St. Stephen's. Most of the well-known local League cricketers will be found playing for the various clubs. Mr. P. Lissom, an enthusiastic sportsman, has again undertaken the secretarial work of the League.

The Colchester and East Essex Club retains most of its old members, and in addition has secured several newcomers, playing or otherwise. These include Colonel Challenger, Capt. A. M. Ross (West Yorkshire Regiment), Captain Larcom, the Rev. F. G. D. Webster ("my Captain"), Messrs. W. A. Smith (Elmstead), R. Chapman, S. P. Clark (Layer), F. J. E. Gates, L. A. Frost, T. Sheppard, L. F. Ditchfield, C. George, H. Gray, and J. Joppe. Captain A. M. Ross takes the place of Major Higginbotham—who has left the town—as a member of the Committee to represent the Garrison. An excellent card of fixtures has been arranged. On April 16th, Upper Tooting are the visitors, and several old "Blues" are likely to appear in the team. The cricket week commences on July 2nd, and the matches will be against the M.C.C., Gentlemen of Essex, Colchester Garrison, Witham, Essex Club and Ground, and Chelmsford. In addition fixtures have been arranged with Ipswich and East Suffolk, Brentwood, the Orangeman's Club, Merton, Framlingham College Masters, Bury and West Suffolk, Old Marlowians, Horleybury Park, Felsted School, East Anglian Ramblers, The Stones (two days), and other well-known neighbouring clubs, together with the various regimental eleven. The professionals, F. Allen and C. Bellinger, have been re-engaged, and their efforts have resulted in a good pitch, which improves with age; for it is yet comparatively new. Mr. H. D. Kean will again captain the eleven. Mr. G. M. Minson is secretary, and Mr. M. Whiting the captain of the "A" team. The secretarial work is again in the capable hands of Messrs. F. J. Chapman and E. C. Green.

The prospects of the Ipswich School team for this season are not as bright as they have been in some former seasons. There are only three "colours" left of last season's XI—A. P. R. Evans, E. A. Ashwin, and E. C. Randa. The Club has to deplore the loss of R. C. Wyrich and G. A. C. de Beaufort, who were very useful last year. The batting ought to improve a lot on last year, the bowling is weak, though E. C. Randa and P. Ward both show some promise. The "wicket keeping is in the capable hands of E. C. Randa, who is quite the best keeper" the School has had for some time past. The match list is much the same as before. A new match is to be played against the Marquis of Graham's Easter Part VI.
