MOSELEY v. HANDSWORTH WOOD.

A FIGHT FOR THE CHAMPIONS.

After an interesting struggle in which the fortunes of the game fluctuated to a considerable degree, Moseley defeated Handsworth Wood at the County Ground, Edgbaston, by the narrow margin of 11 runs. The visitors won the toss, but with the exception of Wigley and Evans, the early batsmen shaped poorly against the bowling of Foster and Baile, seven wickets falling for 41 runs, and despite some plucky batting by Hesketh and Boulton who ran out by the time the score had reached 66. However, on Dickens joining Bassett, the character of the game underwent a great change. Both players faced the attack with resolution, and although numerous changes were made in the bowling 50 runs were added before the ex-Warwickshire bowler was dismissed. Taking the baton as a wicket it was a poor display, and the success of the last two men clearly showed that there was little to match with the wicket, nor was the bowling particularly deadly. Foster was the most successful of the bowlers, and at one period of the game he secured three wickets in one-over without a run being scored. He appeared to bowl faster than when he first appeared for the county, and he had the faculty of hitting the wicket on every occasion. With so many good cricketers at their disposal Moseley's task did not look to be a very arduous one, and although they started badly by losing two wickets for 15, Bassett and Foster by quite distinctive methods put Moseley on the right road to victory. The latter got away in spirited fashion, and the total was taken to 71 before he was caught from a misfield. Foster's innings of 44 included seven 4's, and his display was marred by one chance-only at 14. Bassett was dismissed seven runs later after a steady exhibition of batting, and then the game took a turn in favour of Handsworth Wood. The bowling was handled with commendable judgment, and with the fielders alert and keen Moseley found runs hard to get. Ball, however, kept his end up in clever fashion, but when Bassett went in 32 runs were still wanted for victory and only three wickets to fall. Both players exhibited good nerve at this critical juncture of the game, and despite the strenuous efforts of the visitors the score was taken to 110 before Bassett was bowled. However, who followed, was content to play a defensive game while his partner sat, and Ball had the gratification of winning the match with a fine on-drive, the innings eventually closing for 136. Ball's display was undoubtedly the outstanding feature of the match, for although his score was not the highest most of his batting was accomplished when his side were in a tight corner. Some few seasons ago Ball had looked upon as one of the most promising young players at Moseley, but he has hardly fulfilled expectations. His success on Saturday, however, clearly shows that he has the ability of a really sound batsman. Dickens and Boulton bowled well for the visitors, who are to be congratulated on their splendid efforts to gain a victory. Moseley were without J. F. Byrne, F. G. Stephens, and G. W. Stephens.

ASTON UNITY v. MITCHELLS AND BUTLERS.

OPENING OF THE UNITY'S NEW GROUND.

Glorious weather favored the opening match on the Unity's new ground in Trinity Road on Saturday, and the brilliant sunshine and clear atmosphere showed off the picturesque surroundings of the old club's new home to advantage. Although there is much to be done yet before the ground is completed, enough progress has been made to give a fairly good idea of what the quarters will be in another twelve months' time, and it is safe to predict that in the near future the Unity will be the possessors of one of the finest grounds in the Midlands. Standing considerably higher than the old ground and commanding a fine view of Bear Beacon, the new ground covers an area of about six acres, and when completed the cricket portion will be both wider and deeper than the old field. In addition to this there will be six tennis courts (four of which are already completed) and a bowling green, whilst one of the two substantial houses included in the estate makes a charming pavilion. There was a good attendance at Saturday's match with Mitchells and Butlers, and it was the universal opinion that the Unity were to be congratulated upon the selection of their new domain. Appropriately enough the home team won the toss, and thus started the batting in the new arena, and it was also appropriate that they should open the new era with a handsome victory. A. Dwyer shaped better than last season, and E. T. Edkin, the popular

secretary and vice-captain, faced the bowling with all his old skill and energy. Both gave a good account of themselves, and the total for the side of 141 was not to be complained of on a wicket which, although it looked in perfect condition, had not been previously tested. The visitors were only able to knock up 57 against the deadly bowling of Belden and Ross.

NOTES ON CRICKET.

THE LUCK OF THE TOSS AT LEICESTER.

When the Leicestershire captain won the toss at the opening of the return match with Warwickshire he did his side as much service as if he had placed 10 in front of the figure credited to him in the score-book. That is to say, if he had scored 100 instead of 0 his luck could not have been of greater benefit than correctly naming head or tail in tossing. To discuss the advisability of making a change in the present method of leaving things to blind chance is very much like beating the wind, but in a case like the match in question the choice of innings determined the result ere Warwickshire had an opportunity of making anything like an effective response to the good score of 339 hit up by Leicestershire. Earlier in the season the fortunes of the game favoured Warwickshire in the match at Coventry, so that on the score of luck pure and simple there is little need to complain. Putting these considerations aside for the moment, the score of 300 odd shows up the Warwickshire bowling and fielding in a poor light, and for once in a way F. R. Foster proved expensive. Much of the bowling lacked sting and variety, and the quietly-plotting C. J. E. Wood made the best use of his opportunities. There were many blemishes in the fielding of the visitors, and batsmen of the type of Wood and Knight cannot be let off with impunity. Having recognised that they were doomed to defeat, the Warwickshire men showed less fight than one might have expected, and, of course, were beaten by an innings. In this season's engagements between the counties honours have thus been evenly divided, and taking everything into consideration it may be admitted that Leicestershire and Warwickshire, at the present time, are fairly evenly matched. As still did an exceptionally smart performance in capturing five wickets for eight runs, a feat he will recall with pride. On the "piece of glue" the Leicestershire bowlers had the batsmen at their mercy, but the course of events brought to light some amount of latent talent unearched by Warwickshire. C. L. Breeden, who has already won his spurs in connection with Birmingham League cricket, showed most promising form once again, following up his creditable work at Huddersfield in a most gratifying manner. Although unsuccessful later in the week, when appearing against Surrey, there can be no doubt as to his capabilities, and those well qualified to judge predict for him a successful career if properly encouraged. With more experience, the nervousness usually attending early appearances in first-class cricket will probably wear off, and the county will lose nothing by persevering with her young amateurs. Another unsatisfactory feature was the bowling of Leonard Bates, the eldest son of the groundman at Edgbaston. With adequate support from the fieldsmen, his performance would have made a much braver show than it actually appears in print. To a young beginner it must have been galling to see catches dropped off his bowling, but he may live to play enough county cricket to discover that these things are all accepted as the fortunes of war. One may hope to see a deal more of Bates, for Warwickshire sadly need a strong left-handed bowler.

WARRICKSHIRE DISCOVER A LITTLE GRIT.

Surrey's visit to Edgbaston provided a most interesting match, in which the fluctuations of an always uncertain game swung first to one side and then to the other. On the first day the home eleven did well in disposing of the visitors for less than 250, and on the second day improved upon this a little by topping their opponents' total by 10. This in itself was not a great performance, it is true, for had all the Warwickshire batsmen played up to their form Surrey's score should have been exceeded by at least 100. In the batting line, F. R. Foster easily carried off the palm, playing splendidly forceful cricket in both innings. While one witnesses so much bating of the steady order by the Warwickshire players, it is particularly refreshing to see men like Foster and Charlesworth in full flight. Their play is always aggressive, and gives one the true impression that the bowling is to be hit and not fended with as if the ball would not stand punishment. Upon the sound pitch provided by Bates, the Surrey attack was made to look uncommonly deadly by most of the local batsmen. "Razor" Smith certainly came with a wonderful reputation, and the Warwickshire team played him for the most part as if this dreaded reputation was always uppermost in their minds. It would be unjust to make the condemnation of their methods too sweeping, for there were several bright interludes, and at the finish the home team gol within 43 runs of victory. M. C. Bird bowled Smith with good judgment, and studiously refrained from putting him on at the pavilion end while the known hitters of the side were at the wicket—a touch of genius in captaincy quite worthy of note. Either Foster, Lilley, or Charlesworth—to say nothing of Smith and Field—might conceivably have hit the Surrey bowler into the enclosure for sixes. The match was a triumph for F. R. Foster, who exceeded 50 in each innings, a feat he has before accomplished for the county.

Lilley, Baker, Kinneir, Quaife, Charlesworth, and Santall were only partially successful, while Smith and Field found a little welcome grit before Surrey could claim a victory on the last afternoon. Of the bowling one can say little beyond the commonplace; it was occasionally effective, and not infrequently moderate, while the fielding, if one has to put it plainly, was at times quite unworthy of a first-class county, the gathering of the ball and the catching leaving much to be desired. But for these faults Surrey's score should not have reached 300 on Friday. For the visitors, excellent service was rendered by Hobbs, Captain Bush, and Hayes—whose fielding at slip was magnificent—M. C. Bird, Abel, and Hitch. Apart from a few mannerisms that may wear off, the son of the famous Surrey professional promises well. He hit hard, and has several telling strokes. For a considerable time the interest was well sustained, but Surrey gradually gained the upper hand on the last afternoon by the soundness rather than the brilliance of their attack, and deservedly won after being so generously treated by their opponents. Elsewhere reference is made to the financial results, but a line may be added to the effect that Quaife deserved a richer reward for his great services to the county.

WARRICKSHIRE AVERAGES.

With a couple of defeats recorded against them during the week the Warwickshire batsmen have little to pride themselves upon, the only member of the eleven to materially improve upon the previous week's record being F. R. Foster, who did uncommonly well against Surrey. His figures have advanced from 15.73 to 19.77, and he has done much to further establish himself as one of the best all-round amateurs in the country. Quaife and Charlesworth have each dropped a couple of points, Lilley has dropped three, while Smith has slightly improved. The bowling presents no additional features, but it is interesting to note that Bates, who is a most promising cricketer, makes his first appearance in the averages. During the coming week Warwickshire will improve their figures for next Monday's records.

WORCESTERSHIRE'S DISAPPOINTMENT.

At the beginning of last week the Worcestershire players experienced keen disappointment in being deprived of a game on Monday and Tuesday, at Stoke-upon-Trent, where they were due to meet the Staffordshire team. Restricted to one day's play (on Wednesday), Bowley, Hayes, H. G. Baché, and W. B. Burns made sorry at the expense of the Staffordshire attack, which was materially weakened by the absence of Barnes, who is nursing a bad leg. The cricket was not taken too seriously, the visitors in their two visits to the wicket scoring nearly 300 runs, while Staffordshire were dismissed for 29. It provided some practice for Worcestershire, but few of their players profited by this in the encounter against Kent later in the week. Kent included D. W. Carr, S. H. Day, K. L. Hutchings (who resumed after his accident), and Fairservice. The "googly" bowler was only partially successful in the first innings, but Fairservice proved to be in great form. Pearson played well for 40, but after 73 had been scored for one wicket, the remaining nine wickets fell for an addition of 39 runs. Rain made the wicket difficult on Friday, but Kent managed to run up a score of 224, most of the eleven doing something with the bat. The visitors were unusually uncertain in the field, and missed many catches, and Bowley, Pearson, Arnold, and W. B. Burns all made fairly good scores. Arnold's 61 was the best innings in the match. Carr, Blythe, and Wooley were much too good for most of the eleven, and Kent had 84 only to make when

they went in a second time. Humphreys failed for the second time in the match, but E. W. Dillon, K. L. Hutchings, and Seymour did all that was necessary for the champions, whose victory by seven wickets would probably soothe their wounded pride after the little affair at Leyton. Worcestershire were not seen to advantage on the rain-affected turf, and will be glad to forget Kent's visit to the banks of the Severn.

WORCESTERSHIRE AVERAGES.

During the past week the Worcestershire players had some rather trying experiences in connection with their engagement against Staffordshire at Stoke-upon-Trent, rain preventing play on Monday and Tuesday. On Wednesday some few of the batsmen enjoyed a merry time, but in the following table no account is taken of matches outside the championship engagements. H. K. Foster's appearances are gradually becoming more and more uncertain, and it would be almost impossible to overestimate what his absence means to the eleven. Against Kent he was enabled to turn out, but his average suffered along with the rest of the team, coming down from 45 to 40. Burrows has an excellent bowling record, but the team generally have failed to reproduce their dazzling performances of last season. As, however, they usually do well against Warwickshire, it is possible some improvement may have to be recorded next week.
