NORBURY'S STRIKING DEBUT FOR NORTHUMBERLAND.

EXCITING STRUGGLE.

Beyond delaying the same for an hour and perhaps (only perhaps, for the attendance, about 4,000, was, it was stated, a record for the past three or four years; keeping a few enthusiasts away, the rain overnight and the dull, threatening of the sky did nothing to interfere with the Whitsuntide match-and

A batsman of stylish, easy grace, Norbury was probably the most polished cricketer on the field, and his score of 63 was without repreach. It is particularly gratifying to find a new man justifying his inclusion in the county team so pronouncedly.

The first day's game was hardly fought, both sides being very eager and perhaps over anxious. The Dunelmans were, if anything, smarter in the field and missed no catches, whilst their apponents were cometimes at fault in this respect. As far as batting is concerned, however, Northumberlefid have the advantage, and but for an unfucky accident that depraced them of Gillespie's services, the home county would trotably have colipsed their opponents total.
