Second-class Counties Championship.

Real Staffordshire Form: Visitors Thoroughly Beaten.

THIS MORNING'S PROCESSION.

Bucknell and Barnes Again Bowl Unchanged.

Last season's result: Staffordshire won by four wickets. Scores: Northumberland. 80 (Barnes eight for 38) and 131 (Barnes eight for 55); Staffordshire, 118 and 85 for six.

STOKE, Tuesday.

A full day's cricket was devoted to this match yesterday, and much progress was made. Staffordshire were dismissed twice, and Northumberland once, and, so far as the first innings was concerned, the home county held the advantage. When stumps were drawn, Staffordshire had been disposed of in their second innings for 121, and, together with the

statordshire had been disposed of in their second innings for 121, and, together with the home lead on the first innings, Northumberland were left with an innings to play and 176 runs: to register to secure victory. In the course of yesterday's cricket, thirty wickets fell-for an aggregate of 249 runs.

The match was continued to-day before a moderate crowd of spectators. F. W. Gillespie and Norbury opened the Northumberland innings at ten minutes past eleven, the bowling leing shared by Barnes and Rucknell. The first four overs only yielded three runs, all of which were scored by Norbury, and the same player had added another three when he was bowled by Bucknell. Up to now Gillespie had not scored. R. C. Cumberledge, who joined Gillespie, had a very brief stay, because, after Gillespie had notched a single off Barnes, he tamely returned a delivery into the hands of the same bowler before he had scored. Two vickets were lost, therefore, for seven runs.

S. P. Bell filled the vacancy, and he and Gillespie, by steady cricket, carried the score to 21, when the latter foll a victim to an excellent delivery from Bucknell, having contributed 11 runs. W. G. Davis filled his captain's place at the crease, and runs came very slowly, the game having been in progress 50 minutes before 30 were recorded.

### THE CRICKETERS' FUND.

Mr. W. E. Denison presided over the Annual General Meeting of the Cricketers' Fund Friendly Society, held on Monday evening at Lord's. The officers were re-appointed, and John Moss was elected on the Committee in place of William Gunn. During the past year £336 was paid in sick pay, but the Society had a net surplus on the year of £182 odd. In moving the adoption of the financial statement, Mr. Denison referred to the present scheme of deciding the ferred to the present scheme of deciding the County Championship, and expressed the opinion that it would not accomplish its intended object. In his view, it would not determine the best county, and certainly not the order of merit for the others. Lord Harris, who spoke on the same subject, suggested that it would be well to see the result of the scheme. He was disposed to think it had produced results that otherwise would not have happened. Anything that en-couraged brisk play was to be welcomed. The public called for it and county clubs could not ignore the public demands. He hoped that the Triangular contests for 1912 would not fall through because the South Africans and the Australians had not come to terms.
