CRICKET TOPICS

TO-DAY'S MATCH AT LYNN

M. FALCON TO PLAY AT BEDFORD.

One of the features of this July cricket continues to be the deplorable wet and unseasonable weather. The Thursdays and Saturdays so precious to the afternoon cricketer have been especially disappointing, and some of the mid-week players are forgetting what it feels like to hit a fourer. The only thing settled about the weather is the wet, and the sunshine of which East Englanders are wont to boast is conspicuously absent. Norfolk County has two important engagements this week, and the fulfilment of one of these will take the team to Bedford, a delightful tour under pleasant weather conditions, but particularly depressing when the rain is pouring down, as was when Norfolk went there at twelvemonth ago. On the occasion Bedfordshire batted between half-past three and a quarter to six on the first day, and that represented the full extent of the play in the match. Geoffrey Stevens was one of the Norfolk eleven who did not get a knock, and he thus missed his usual century on the Bedford Grammar School Ground, having accomplished the feat in 1907 and again in 1908. R. F. Taylor of Starston was another member of the side who was at Bedford last year, and we note that the Old Malvernian took an 80 off the Bungay bowlers on Saturday.

The Bedfordshire match on Thursday and Friday is preceded by the King's Lynn fixture with Durham, and the renewal of the meetings with the northern county takes one's memory back to the days of Burns, the sturdy little Nottingham man, who did such fine work for Norfolk in the late nineties, and also to the period when Albert Half was a brilliant member of the Norfolk team. It is ten years since Half headed the Norfolk averages. He has spent the years well, for he is now an English player, and we believe he has taken something like a thousand wickets for Sussex. It was a century by the great left-hand, the foundation of a nice wicket's victory for Norfolk at Durham in 1899, and less than a fortnight later Durham turned the tables and beat Norfolk in an innings at Yarmouth. The strong men of the Durham team of those days were the Elliotts, the Whitwells, Housefield, and Hanbury-Tracy, the wicket-keeper, with Butler and Turnbull, the professors, to help Mr. Whitwell in the attack. W. E. Whitwell, an old Uppingsman, was to Durham what P. H. Morton was to Norfolk. He caused a procession of Norfolk batsmen at Yarmouth in the 1899 match, and neither Albert Half nor any other man could stay in long against him, or a crumbling wicket. It was the last big match on the Yarmouth ground; the next takes place on August 22-23.

C. O. Raven, a relative of the Ravens to be found in Norfolk and Suffolk border cricket, hit 108 for Norfolk in one of the Durham matches of ten years ago, and it is strange how he dropped quite out of Norfolk cricket. In the same year Durham had an innings-keeper named Half was then with Sussex—and we believe that was the last time the counties met. The achievement that stands out above everything else in the Norfolk-Durham matches of those bygone days was Shore's 110 ten wickets in Durham's first innings at Lakenham for 50 runs. It was thirteen years ago this week, and our search for details of the performance disclosed the fact that the wicket was a hard one, and that Morley, G. H. Raikes, and N. Workman bowled in turn from the other wicket. There is an element of luck about the taking of all the wickets in the innings, as it is only possible by the failure or lack of success of the other bowlers. In the second innings Shaw took six wickets for 22, and his match record of 16 wickets for 74 is one of the finest bowling achievements in the history of Norfolk cricket. E. B. Raikes, the present Norfolk captain's barrier brother, came near equalling it in the famous tie match with Hertfordshire in the cricket week of 1895, when he took eight for 47 and nine for 44. "E. B." was in great form that August, as he also took five for 21 and three for 27 against the Parses, eight for 104 against the Free Foresters, seven for 125 against the M.C.C. at Lord's, and ten in two innings in the return match with Herts.

These bowling feats were done about the time that R. H. Movement was working his way into the Norfolk team, and we note with satisfaction that the old Belle Vue bowler, now a staff surgeon in the senior service, has not forgotten the cricket and the instruction he received from Tom Morley. Movement captained the Navy and Army team which defeated combined Oxford and Cambridge at Aldershot on Friday. Captain Wilson of Suffolk and Major Poore were included in the Services team, and the captain's bowling, three for 58 and five for 60, helped the Services to a six wickets victory.

To return to Durham and the match which begins at Lynn this morning, Durham won only one of the four matches they played in May and June, and standing to their credit a victory over Cheshire; but on the debit side of their account are poor performances against Northumberland, Bedfordshire, and Yorkshire II. The batting has been often weak, and the side has been dismissed for 53, 45, and 27. They experienced a keen Barnes shock when meeting Bedfordshire, the England bowler taking eight wickets in the first innings for 6 runs, and the Durham side was down in the late nineties. Turnbull is still with them, and he now appears to be a better batsman than a bowler. He is engaged with the Bedford Club, which won the Lancashire League last season. Morris is now bowler-in-chief for Durham, and in 1908, when Durham lost only one match, he took 84 wickets for 11 runs per wicket. Last season he was less successful and slightly more expensive, his 48 wickets averaging 12 runs each. One of the change bowlers is Thackeray, who is leaving Middlebrough, after six seasons at outside left, to play for Bedford Park Avenue. Four of the team playing at Lynn today will be making their first appearance for Durham. These include J. J. Common, the wicket-keeper, J. G. Rutherford, C. Pickersgill, and Hendren, who is a brother of the Middlesex professional.

R. A. A. Beresford, who should have pleasant recollection of his County match at Lynn, is making a welcome appearance for Norfolk, with R. W. Collinson, J. J. Compton, and Stevens, the Lynn School groundman. The three last named were all seen to advantage in club cricket on Saturday. Stevens' bowling helping Lynn to a capital victory at Overstrand. R. G. Plich was chosen, but domestic seasons compelled him to call off on Saturday, and the team will be as follows:—

The Rev. G. B. Raikes returns to captain the side at Bedford on Thursday and Friday, and M. Falcon, whose last appearance for Norfolk was at Cambridge in 1908, when he scored 84 out of 81 in an hour, is also assisting the County. Norfolk sympathies were with Falcon over the disappointing result of theVarsity match, in which the Australian and Rhodes' scholar, Le Outeur, performed great deeds for Oxford, and his achievement has been emulated by Fowler, the Eton captain, in a wonderful match with Harrow. The Light Blue captain is in a great acquisition to the Norfolk side, and our readers will be glad to learn that he has promised to go north with the team next week. At Bedford G. B. Raikes, M. Falcon, G. W. Birks, and C. J. Triggdown take the places of R. W. Collinson, J. J. Compton, R. A. A. Beresford, and Another, and the players leave Thorpe on Wednesday at 5 p.m.

H. R. Orr still captains Bedfordshire, and he was playing for his county before some of the members of his team were born. He had an exceptionally good season last year, and B. L. Piel only just beat him for the place of honour in the batting list, and W. E. King, the left-hander, beat his captain in the highest aggregate race by 1 run. Orr scored 400, King 378. George Wharmby is one of the strong pillars of Bedfordshire, and at Coventry the other day he played a not out innings of 170 against Upton-on-Severn, and took five wickets. The Bedfordshire side on Thursday will be chosen from H. R. Orr (captain), P. E. Aphorby, A. T. Morcom, W. E. King, E. H. Gibson, H. Grayson, H. R. Rennie, M. Day, Wharmby, Holdstock, Garry, and Pilgrim.

After Bedford Norfolk are due at Nottingham, and they travel north on Friday, G. B. Raikes captaining the side, which will include M. Falcon, G. A. Stevens, R. W. Thursty, G. W. Birks, G. E. Dunning, W. J. Thursty, J. J. Compton, and C. J. Triggdown. From Nottingham the team travel to Sunderland for the return with Durham, and N. W. Stevens, the Edinburgh University captain, takes the place of G. B. Raikes.

The C.E.Y.M.S. were in serious danger of losing their unbeaten record in the League

to Carrow on Saturday. Batting first at Earlham Road, Carrow scored 106 for seven wickets, Collinson, who went in second wicket down, being not out 88 when he felt justified in making a declaration. Collinson proceeded to get rid of the first four C.E.Y.M.S. batsmen very cheaply, and, to use the familiar phrase, the Church were "in the cart, and only a skilful exhibition of the "spoils" game by Stevens and Plich enabled the Churchmen to avert defeat. As points were halved when the clubs met at Lakenham on June 4th, Carrow have done especially well in their matches with the champions. A postponement of the Durham v. Y.M.C.A. match helped to swell the growing list of arrears, but there was an exciting match at Lakenham, the Teachers winning a low scoring match with the 18th Laners by the narrow margin of 1 run. Malachowski and Clarke bowled finely, and the wicket was hit altogether 16 times. Roberts and Cook made a bold bid for victory hitting three foursers at a critical time and taking the Lancs' seamer to victory than they had been previously, and Smith, the eleventh man, came in with 2 wanted to tie and to win. Only 1 run had been obtained when Smith lost his wicket in an attempt to get a run for a tie, and the Teachers bagged two welcome points for a 1 run victory. The revised tables are appended:—

Several members of the Football Association and the chairman of the N.C.F.A. saw Lynn beat Overstrand in a friendly match at the Pleasance on Saturday. The weather had been bad for days, and the outlook was so unpromising in the early morning that the Westerners were advised not to come, but Lynn had been left behind before the telegram arrived. Matters meteorological had meanwhile improved, and when the time for starting came Lynn were allowed to bat first, because only seven of their members had turned up. This probably lost the home men the match, for the wicket cut up badly, as might have been expected after the week's drenching. Victory crowned the Lynn efforts at the fifth ball of the last over of the day. The home men were naturally disappointed, but the match seemed to afford a good deal of interest to the visitors. George Gemmell (25) and Fisher (23) were the chief contributors to the very respectable total of 196, which the Westerners compiled. Gemmell played a smart innings, and Fisher was strangled to a good catch "in the country." Overstrand had about two hours to bat, and with Falcher and Compton falling early, Overstrand's only chance was to play for a draw, and the match revolved itself into a duel between young Baker's stone-wall and Stevens' bowling. The Sidney Sussex player kept his wicket intact for over an hour and a-half, but was eventually beaten by a fast ball from Stevens. Jackson threw his wicket away by attempting an absurd run. The ninth wicket fell to Stevens' bowling at the third ball of the last over of the match. Watkins, the last man, came in to try and keep his end up for the last three balls, but the second proved fatal, and he fell a victim at point.

Watson, the Norfolk fast bowler, took part in the Old Boys' match at Thetford School on Saturday, and was top scorer with 22. He also took five of the school wickets.

NORFOLK V. DURHAM.

SENSATIONAL PLAY AT LYNN
MATCH FINISHED IN ONE DAY

The Norfolk eleven gave a disappointing display in their match with Durham on the Lynn Grammar School Ground yesterday. They met a very fine bowler in Morris, the Sunderland professional, and it was mainly due to his fine work that the match was completed in one day, Durham gaining a splendid victory ten minutes before time by an innings and 43 runs. The low lying Lynn ground recovers very slowly from rain, and the wicket bore unmistakable traces of the long spell of bad weather. Yesterday was the first fine sunny day experienced at Lynn for a fortnight, and there was a good breeze. Anxious that the wicket would probably be at its easiest before lunch, the Norfolk captain decided to bat, but the batting of the Norfolk team during that period rather flattered the bowlers, although Morris was able to make the ball whip back in a disconcerting manner. R. W. Collinson was the only Norfolk man whose reputation did not suffer, and he saved the side from a worse failure by two admirable displays. Only two other players reached the distinction of double figures, E. J. Fulcher, who came into the team at the eleventh hour, hitting with some success, and R. A. A. Beresford playing well in his second essay. The majority fell easy victims to the skill of Morris, who hit the stumps twelve times, and in all took thirteen wickets for 57 runs. It was a fine achievement, even allowing that the wicket helped him, and in the sense that the wicket was a moot point, he was quite irresistible. It is on that Durham did not for a time during the middle period have the best of the wicket. They certainly did not find ransacking very difficult, although this may have been partly due to the fact that the Norfolk did not have the best of the type, and they lost only one wicket in passing the Norfolk total. Hendren and Turnbull were the most successful, and after the latter lost wickets fell fast, the last six going down for 16 runs. Allieopp was the chief factor in this collapse, and he was easily the best of the Norfolk bowlers. The early finish which deprived Lynn everybody, except the Durham players, who fully deserved their victory.

Although the wicket was damp, no one was quite prepared for the astonishing success the bowlers met with at the beginning of the day. R. A. A. Beresford and E. W. Collinson had not arrived when C. E. Dunning and R. W. Collinson commenced Norfolk's first innings at seven minutes to twelve. Morris, a fast right-hand bowler with a short run, led the attack from the top end, and C. Morris, a slow left hand batsman, was at the other wicket. The opening was a quiet one, the first four overs being to the procession started Morris bowling Thurgar's off stump down with the first ball of his fourth over. Geoffrey Stevens came in to share a similar fate on the third ball of the same over, the off stump being again knocked out of the ground. R. W. Collinson joined Dunning, and when the latter had been in twenty minutes without scoring he played forward to the fast bowler and missed the ball. J. J. Compton came in, and at once went for the slow bowler, but missed the going-away ball, sending it up in the direction of cover point, to be caught by Pickersgill. A. A. Beresford followed, only to be immediately beaten by Morris, the ball again hitting the off stump, and half the side were out in thirty-four minutes partner, and the West Norfolk man was expelled against for a catch at the wicket off the first ball he received. He survived, but soon fell a victim to an attempt to hit the slow bowler, Pickersgill taking a running catch at second slip. Six for 18, Collinson was more successful in his treatment of the slow bowler, and after the arrival of Allieopp the Carrow man hit two consecutive balls from Brooks to the on boundary. These were the only two of the innings, which was nearing the end. At 35 Allieopp had his leg stump knocked out of the ground by Morris, whose analysis at this period was five wickets in eleven overs for 3 runs. E. J. Fulcher tried to force the game as soon as he went in, and punished both bowlers. At 44, however, he lost the company of Collinson, the Carrow man stepping out to drive the slow bowler, and missing the ball, he got back a second too late to prevent Compton from taking his wicket by a smart piece of stumping. In at the fall of the second wicket at 4, Collinson was eighth out at 44. He was batting just over three-quarters of an hour, and his meritorious display was the only redeeming feature of the innings. Fulcher's spirited and hard hitting helped on the score, but Stevens was bowled out by a well-pitched up ball from Brooks, and in the next over Fulcher was bowled for a valuable 21. The innings closed at one o'clock for 43, the runs having been made in 78 minutes. Morris and Brooks shared the wickets equally, the fast bowler obtaining his at less cost.

Durham had thirteen minutes' batting before lunch, and Herbert Brooks and Hendren scored 14 runs off Gibson and Allieopp, the professional making two nice cuts. The wicket had probably improved a little after the use of the roller, and on resuming the batsmen forced the game. At 28 Allieopp got one past the amateur, and the ball hit the wicket. Cecil Brooks, a left-hander, joined Hendren, and the run making proceeded at a merry pace, the batsmen scoring freely in all directions, and Hendren's score being helped along by an overthrow, the ball glancing off the stumps and going to the boundary. Stevens took up the bowling at 51, and after an expensive first over, in which the Norfolk total was passed with nine wickets upstanding, he succeeded in breaking up the partnership, Hendren being well caught at deep square leg, Thuraby running several yards and taking the ball sideways. The total was 70, and in forty-five minutes Hendren had collected 35 by good cricket. The wicket fell with the last ball of the over,

and the next ball bowled from the other end by Allieopp defeated C. Brooks. Turnbull and A. E. Walker were next associated, and the first-named set to work quickly. E. J. Fulcher received Allieopp, and at W. Stevens sent one of Walker's stumps flying. C. Pickersgill, a left-hander, was Turnbull's next partner, and a square out from the latter off Fulcher sent up 107 at half-past three. Shortly afterwards Allieopp resumed at Brooks' end, and J. J. Compton went on at the other. The play became quieter, Pickersgill, who was nearly bowled by Compton, leaving the scoring to Turnbull, and the latter now found fewer opportunities of employing his favourite strokes. He reached his 50, however, out of 87 in sixty-eight minutes, and the partnership had lasted nearly an hour, and produced 88 runs, when Turnbull played a ball from Allieopp into his wicket. Turnbull scored 84 out of 90 in eighty-three minutes, and included in his admirable innings were eight sixes and five fives. He was fifth out at 109, and after he left wickets fell fast. Pickersgill, caught at slip off Gibson, left at the same total, having batted nearly an hour for 18, and one run later Gibson bowled Rutherford, middle stump, and Thackeray was bowled and bowled by Allieopp, four wickets thus falling for 2 runs. Allieopp finished off the innings by getting the last two wickets in an over, and the venture closed for 176, having lasted two hours and thirty-five minutes. Allieopp's last successful spell, in which he took four wickets in 25 balls for 8 runs, gave him the best figures for the innings being six wickets for 52.

Norfolk, 111 in arrears, began their second innings at four minutes past five. The principles were the same as at the opening of the first innings, and the start was equally bad, except that Morris got his first wicket a little sooner. A maiden was bowled from each end, and then Morris, with the fourth ball of his second over, sent Thurgar's off stump flying. Collinson joined Dunning, but the latter stood was not forthcoming. Dunning having his stumps preceded by the fast bowler. The total was 7, and Beresford came in. Beresford hit the first 4 of the day off Morris, a powerful stroke past mid-off, and although neither batsman succeeded in giving one the impression that they were quite at their ease, the run came, and at 25 the Durham captain made his first bowling change, Turnbull, displacing Brooks. Beresford made a beautiful square cut off the fast bowler, but from the last ball of Turnbull's second over the Hunstanton man was caught off a skimming on drive, Thackeray stopping just mid-off, and judging the catch well. Fulcher followed in and made a six off Morris, but the last ball of the same over proved fatal to him, Morris sending one of the stumps flying rather-well fashion. Geoffrey Stevens partnered Collinson with the total at 28, and a crisp late cut off the fast bowler brought the Carrow man a pretty 4. The next ball went through his defence, but missed the wicket. In his next over Morris knocked down Stevens' leg stump, and half the side were out for 48. Thuraby appeared, and soon lost the company of Collinson, the Carrow man having his second valuable innings closed by a ball from the fast bowler which knocked a stump out of the ground. Collinson scored 26 out of 44 in forty-four minutes, and was out just before six o'clock. Morris' slow left-hand bowler, and with seven wickets down for 46 there was nearly half an hour to go. Compton and Allieopp kept together nearly ten minutes, and then Allieopp put up a ball on the leg side which Brooks peered rather cleverly. Compton was caught at slip off the last ball of the innings, and the match was over by the next ball the innings closed for 44, and in twenty minutes past six Durham had gained a fine victory by an innings and 43. Morris led the analysis of eight wickets for 57, and his record for the match was the splendid one of thirteen for 37, and he hit the stumps twelve times.
