Northumberland won this return match at 12.40 pm on the second day. The margin of victory was the closest of the season for a team batting first. The outcome was a surprise as the home side had led by 51 runs on first innings. The match between the two sides at Jesmond in June had been drawn. For the winners, there were 3 sixes and 9 fours in Cumberlege's 69. He reached his fifty in 35 minutes. Norbury's 43 contained 2 sixes and 4 fours. For the losers, Broadbent took 11 matches in the match for 110 runs, including 7 for 39 in the Northumberland first innings. Hardy top-scored with 38. Over a thousand paying spectators attended during the two days. Receipts were over £38.

## COUNTY CRICKET.

#### ON THE REGREATION CROUND.

Bridlington, as a county cricketing centre, is undoubtedly unfortunate. For two successive years, the county second eleven matches allotted to the town by the Yorkshire Executive have failed, or partially so, by reason of the success with the bat of the visiting teams. Last year, it was Cheshire, who scored 24 runs in their first innings. Yesterday, the Northumberland representatives were "outed" before lunchtor a paltry 78. The nett result is that, given nne weather, the match will be completed by about 12-30 this morning. Bridlington deserves something better than that. Maybe, next year, when the Surrey second string will visit the Yorkshire coast, Bridlington will have the opportunity to prove that it can, and will, support county cricket equally with any other town in Yorkshire. In two years, a reputation for "county cricket" weather has been earned, but twelve months hence, it may happen that the "gate," which is all important, may suffer because the match will be a "friendly," and nothing more. Surely, the county second eleven could still play in the Minor Counties' Tournament in addition to the District League matches which it is proposed to play! A cheese paring policy at this time will not assist Yorkshire to regain her supremacy among the cricketing counties. Yesterday afternoon, it seemed that the attendance was larger than a year ago, but the official returns showed a slight decrease. Last year, 969 paid for admission, yesterday the number was 921, and the receipts were £23 0s. 6d., as compared with

£24 4s. 6d.

The composition of the two teams did not elicit general satisfaction. Northumberland were four players short of full strength, while-Yorkshire have not fielded a team so weak, on paper for many a day. "Bobbie" Franks. on paper, for many a day. "Bobbie" Franks, the erstwhile captain, and Richardson, the Scarborough man, who did so well against Cheshire, were on the ground, but did not play The eleven included Braithwaite, the Hullbatsman, Bayes, the Flamborough-cum-Bridlington-cum-Scarborough bowler, Wailes, an amateur, whose location was said to be somewhere in the Malton district, and Hare, who came to Bridlington with Leeds Springfield. Evidently, the Northumberland captain is by way of being a prophet. Yesterday morning he remarked that he and his players would be Yesterday morning starting back on the way home very soon after

lunch to-day. Most probably, they will.

The day's cricket went quite in Yorkshire's favour. Three innings were completed, and altogether 31 wickets fell at a cost of just over 12 runs each. Yorkshire to-day, with nine wickets in hand, require 95 runs to win. The fall of so many wickets for so small an aggregate of runs does not convey the idea that the play was of an exhilarating nature, and yet there were few dull moments. For the most part the batsmen were getting runs, or, in accordance with Roosvelt-ian advice, getting out. Sixes were quite common. Northumberland's first innings was redeemed from absolute mediocrity by a fine display by Cumberledge, who, going in first wicket down, carried out his bat for 43, more than half the total. He established himself firmly in the favour of the crowd, and while his repertoire of scoring strokes was limited, he drove with great power and accuracy. He hit 2 sixes, 4 fours, 1 three and 1 two. The wicket, following the heavy rain during the night and under the influence of the sun and wind, was a "sporting" one. Broadbent apprecia-ted it and he did some wonderful work. At the other end, Bayes did not like it so much. A hard, dry wicket suits him, but it must be said that he did not bowl at all well. His length was bad and frequently the batsmen went half way down the pitch to pat the distributed furf. Just at the present moment. turbed turf. Just at the present moment, Yorkshire possesses some clever wicket-keepers and Toulson, who hails from Armley, did good

Yorkshire's scoring was not confined to one man, five of the side reaching double figures, Braithwaite pleased immensely with his free style and Kilner got in several clinking leg. Geofrey Tattersall batted very correctly and Broadbent handled the bat very well, in fact, the spectators would have liked to see more of him. By the way, Northumberland's work in the field was not smart, although it must be said that Davis at point stopped very well. The visitors rubbed off their arrears of 51 runs for the loss of one wicket. Norberry quickly rattled up 18, but Hardy snapped him with a beauty at point. The next wicket provided the best stand of the day, realising exactly 90 runs. Cumberledge was the hero again. His driving was delightful and in 45 minutes he collected 69 runs, chiefly by means of 3 sixes, 9 fours and 3 twos. Off Blackburn he sent four seccessive balls to the boundary, but he put his leg in front of the next delivery, which was straight. His departure was heartily regretted, for the crowd realised that another hour of Cumberledge would extend the game over a couple of days. Bell displayed a masterly defence, and his 32 was one of the best

# COUNTY CRICKET.

#### WHY DID YORKSHIRE LOSE?

#### FIVE BATSMEN FAIL TO SCORE 12 RUNS.

The "glorious uncertainty" of cricket is always apparent, and that there is no certainty about the game except, that has become quite a trite saying. It happens in all grades of cricket. Take for instance the County Second II match at Bridlington last week.

Last Thursday night, at the completion of the Last Thursday night, at the completion of the first day's cricket, the matth seemed to be a "pinch" for the Yorkshire juniors, and in the "Gazette" next day, it was stated that "the match will be completed about 12-30 this morning." The "intelligent anticipation" was only too early by ten minutes, and at lifteen minutes after midday, there seemed to be nothing so certain as a victory for the home be nothing so certain as a victory for the home county. One hundred runs had been registered county. One hundred runs had been registered with only five men out, and only eleven more were required to tie and twelve to win. And yet Northumberland won the match with four

runs to spare!

The failure to get the runs was quite inexplicable. Broadbent. Toulson, Blackburn
and Bayes could only muster three runs
between them. The first-named was particularly disappointing, and probably more so to
himself than to anyone else. He had been in
the Press tent earlier in the morning and was
quite confident that the runs could be knocked
off without the loss of more than six wickets. off without the loss of more than six wickets. Broadbent was in sixth wicket down and he was clean bowled second ball. The lack of was clean bowled second ball. The lack of success with the bat of Toulson, Blackburn and Bayes was not surprising, and when the Scottish professional followed his captain to the Pavilion it was clearly recognised that Hardy must "do the job" by himself. This young Bradford batsmen had been playing a clever game. But he is still a month off completing his eighteenth year, and when the crucial test came, when only Bayes remained to come in, the lack of experience told. An older player, granted the ability, would probably have pulled it off. It is useless, in fact it would not be right, to blame the players too much. They did their best to win, and if that best was not good enough, it was not their fault. The fault lay with the people responsible for the choosing of the team. experimented too much for a match which had to be won to gain the championship among the Minor Counties, and it is now quite easy to see the folly of putting in a team which included only three bowlers, one of whom was an unknown quantity from a county point of view, and not more than seven batsmen of repute. As a Hull contemporary said last Friday, many caustic things were said by the spectators. The mistake was recognised at headquarters, and for the match with Staffordshire, Newstead, Meal, Hartington, and Harrison replaced C. P. Hare, F. G. Wailes, Blackburn and Bayes.

When operations were resumed on Friday morning, Yorkshire required 95 runs and had nine wickets in hand. Turner, the over-night nine wickets in nand. Turner, the over angu-not-out, was accompanied to the wickets by Kilner. The latter scored a couple, but in the third over, he was run out. Turner played a ball hard to extra cover and called his partner, There was hardly a run to start with, for the ball was travelling very quickly, but Kilner hesitated slightly, and a fine stop and throw-in by Watson led to his downfall—19 for 2. Hardy and Turner scored steadily, but at 45 the latter was bowled by Skinner's second ball, the pace of which completely beat him—35 for 3. Hardy did most of the scoring in the next partnerships, for Hare and Wailes were responsible for only two and one respectively, and with five wickets down for seventy, Yorkshire's chances were not so rosy. Tattersall and Hardy restored the balance, however. The

captain sent up the eighty with a fine brace of fours, and between them the batsmen scored 14 from that over. Milne, the slow left-hander, resumed at the top end, and off his first ball, he appealed for a catch at the wicket without avail. Elsey crossed over to the railway end, and Tattersall with a lucky snick to leg, not his first, caused 90 to be hoisted, while very shortly the century was reached. The scoring had been steadily maintained, the innings having been in

progress less than ninety minutes.
Mr. S. P. Bell, the Northumberland captain, had not hesitated to change his bowlers, while had not hesitated to change his bowlers, while the fielders were doing smart work. On the previous day, Norbury had bowled seven overs for 24 runs without getting a wicket, but he was ordered to relieve Elsey. The change was an inspiration. Norbury bowled fast, and off his second ball he had Tattersall taken at the wicket by Ullathorne, who stood well up—100 for 6. His fourth ball spreadeagled Broadbent's sticks—100 for 7. Yorkshire's hope was now in Hardy who had a chat with Toulson as he went in. Milne was bowling. Toulson played fhree balls very carefully, but he let out played three balls very carefully, but he let out at the next and was well taken in the long field—105 for 8. In Norbury's next over, Blackburn was well beaten with three successive balls. but he managed to keep his end up. Milne then tempted liardy with a well-pitched ball, just short of a yorker. Hardy succumbed, and striking well over the top of it, he was clean bowled—105 for 9. Bayes whipped in. There were no cheers for the local lad as in the first innings. The tension was too great for that Bayes never touched the first two balls, and was lucky to remain. The next was straight.

Bayes half drove it past mid on, and called for a second run. Blackburn stopped half-way down the pitch, but Milne foozled the throw-in and the batsman got home. The mistake did not make much matter. Milne was much too wily for Bayes, who wanted to drive the ball out of the field, but he missed it and was bowled. Thus Northumberland unexpectedly won.

The victory of the visitors was due to their superior bowling, and to the superb batting on the Thursday of Mr. Cumberlidge.

It is only necessary to add that the financial results were not so satisfactory as a year ago, but that is not Bridlington's fault. At the Cheshire match the total receipts were £38 and a few stillings, and, comparatively, a decrease of £7 is shown this year. The gate money on both days amounted to £26 13s. Od., 1.066 persons paying for admission while the stand and enclosure attracted a further sum of £4 13s. making a total of £31 6s. making a total of £31 6s.

#### YORKSHIRE II. v. NORTHUMBERLAND.

#### HOME COUNTY'S STRONG POSITION.

In their return match with Northumberland, com-menced at Bridlington yesterday, the Yorkshire Second Eleven established themselves in a good position, and have the prospect to-day of bringing off an early tory, for they only require 35 runs to win, and have nine wickets in hand. Such a victory, if it be achieved, will have the effect of ensuring the Yorkshiremen a place in the final tie for the Minor Counties championship, for a reference to the table of results compiled in another column will show that the Yorkshire Second Eleven are at the head of affairs in the North and East Division with a substantial lead over their nearest rivale. They have still to meet Staf-fordshire at Stoke next week, but a victory to-day would nullify any adverse result that might be arrived

Yorkshire's team at Bridlington is by no means a strong one, Hardisty and Harrison, who have played in most matches this season, being left out, whilst-Mr. R. W. Frank, who was expected to captain the team, had to withdraw at the last moment owing to a bergavement. Mr. G. Braithwaite, of Hull, Mr. C.
P. Hare, of Leeds Springfield, and Mr. F. G. Wailes,
of Malton, were therefore introduced, along with
Bayes, the Scarborolgh fast bowler, who was given
a trial for the first time. They owed a very great deal to Mead and Stone, who made 193 for the first wicket in two hours and a-quarter. Neither batsman made a mistake. Stone's chief hits were thirteen 4's, and Mead's a 6 and thirteen 4's. The later players endeavoured to force the game, the consequence being that five more wickets fell for 60 runs in the last 40 minutes. On the third morning 43 runs were added for the loss of two more wickets, and then the innings was declared closed, leaving Lancashire 403 to make in five hours—a truly formidable task. The pitch, fortunately, was in excellent order and the visitors made a good start. Hartley and Tyldesley (W.) scored 100 for the first wicket in an hour, but 18 later Tyldesley (J. T.) was low for 11 and at lunch three men were out for 141. Then followed an excellent stand by Sharp and Makepeace, who placed the result beyond dou
