On Monday Bedfordshire opened their county programme with the away match with Hertfordshire at Bushey, near Watford. Before the match there had been a sprinkle, but at the time Mr. Orr won the toes, clouds seemed to be concentrating over the ground from far and near, and to warn him that runs should be made quickly while the opportunity lasted. opportunity lasted.

Bocquet laving made four, Willett let a leg breaker get past him, and he retired in the second over off his second ball. With Apthorp for company, Bocquet seemed settling down, when he stepped out to have a slam at Shelford, a very slow bowler, missed it; and was easily stumped. This was the position—15 for 2, 13 of them Bocquet's—when the first sharp shower-drove players to cover.

Resuming, after a quarter of an hour's wait. Apthorp and Orr in half an hour put another complexion on affairs. The latter was particularly severe on all loose balls coming from Shelford, and he followed up a couple of boundaries by lifting him over the on houndary for a grand 6. Meanwhile Apthorp was giving a hand in this merry tune, and Marsh having relieved Burton, the "keeper" showed his impartiality by smashing the new bowler for 9 in his first over the last stroke being a fine square leg hit for 6. The score was jogging along nicely when another copious shower caused a hurried adjournment. The score was then 72 for two wickets. Continual showers and a hail storm allowed of only one more period of play, during which Orr and Apthorp were caught. This stand had been of inestimable service to the side. Holdstock and Wharmby resumed on Tuesday in sunshine, with the glass rising, and with prospects of a day's interesting cricket. The exciting and sensational finish, however, could hardly be foreseen, although the wicket was known to be capable of anything. Holdstock led off with two pretty glances to leg-a favourite stroke of his-off Shelford. Wharmby also mightily smote the same bouler to the leg boundary. But the pitch was very soft, the field fleen, and Shelford and Burton, who bowled all the morning unchanged, were making the ball do somequeer things. Snorters followed risers, and leg breaks off breaks, indiscriminately. Holdstock beautifully covered all varieties, but his partner, in attempting to swipe Shelford again to the leg boundary, got too much under the ball, it shot up, and Household running in, secured it at mid-on, 95.5.5. With 13 added, Squire, who seemed likely to settle down, played forward to a half-volley, which broke in sharp from the ilkely to settle down, played forward to a half-velley, which broke in sharp from the leg, and was bowled. Burton had discovered a much better length than on Monday. Moreom joined Holdstock, and both batted with extreme care. The former now and again got in a scoring hit, but he had his career cut short by a brilliant catch by Golding, who jumping up at mid-off stopped at arm's length a hot drive, and secured the ball on a second attempt. The end was now in sight. Moreom now began to hit, and drove Shelford overa five-foot hedge into the road, the fourth of the innings, but neither of the others could stay long with him, and the venture closed after about an hour's batting in the morning for 154. Burton and Shelford each bowled 24 overs, and each took five wickets, the former for 52 and the latter for 72.

Herts had nearly an hour's batting before lunch. Two early successes brightened Bedfordshire's prospects, for at 5 a swift return by Willett ran out J. N. Cowley, and with only a single added, Morcom accepted a hard chance in the slips off Wharmby, which closed R. B. Cowley's account. With the separation of Titchmarsh and Golding events moved fast. At this period the Beds, bowling was remarkably fine. At the same score Morcom bowled Golding. Marsh made three of the next ten before Morcom yorked him. 89.7.3. The home-skipper's stay was very short, for with the total unchanged, he only half got hold of one of Morcom's "sticking" deliveries, and Saunders, running in from mid-on, took the ball almost on the ground in another brilliant effort. At 92 Marsh played on. The last pair gave considerable trouble on a rapidly drying wicket, scoring quite freely, and were beginning to cause anxiety when a beautiful ball from Wharmby settled the matter, and Bedfordshire led on the first innings by 34. Morcom's four wickets cost 35. Wharmby's four 36, and Orr's one 19. Genry and Pilgrim bowled without success. Bedfordshire cut an inglorious figure on their second attempt. Bouquet was caught at short slip with the score at five. At 11 disasters came in battalions, for Holdstock gave an easy catch, Willett cut the ball into his wickets, and Orr was given out l.b.w. to the first ball he received. Thus in a quarter of an hour Bedfordshire had leat fore

Shelford brought about the separation with a daisy cutter which took Squires unawares, and then the procession was renewed. Morcom retiring at 55, and Saunders and Pilgrim at 56. The innings had lasted exactly an hour to a minute. Burton and Shelford bowled unchanged, the former taking six wickets for 28, and the latter four for 14.

This left Herts with 91 runs to get in 91 minutes. That the task was not a light one was evident when Morcom clean bowled J. Cowley with a shooter with only six scored. Meantime the sun hid himself under a cloud and the pitch improved perceptibly. Wharmby failing to get anything like the turn on the ball which had made Burton so unplayable. Every run had to be worked for though. Soon after, R. Cowley was nearly taken at mid-off, but Squires just failed to get to it. Every scoring hit was loudly applauded, and the home crowd's spirits rose with the score. At fifty-eight Squire did a double service for his county, for off consecutive balls he caught both Cowley and Cuthbertson. With the score unaltered Morcom bowled Coleman and the game did not look quite the certainty for Herts, it did a few short minutes before. A magnificent catch with outstretched hand with the ball going away from him, by Morcom, closed Household's career at 64. The position now was decided by interesting. A re-arrangement of the county groupings gave Bedfordshire the opportunity to renew their old rivalry with their neighbours in Herts. The game came off on Monday and Tuesday last at Bushey, and ended, rather surprisingly, it must be admitted, in a victory for Beds, by nine runs. So frequently have our county been beaten by narrow margins during recent years that it is a genuine pleasure to be able to record this one little portion of, shall we say, luck. Beds. have never been treated very kindly by the gods and it is to be sincerely hoped that their luck has now changed for the good. From the 13 selected men Grierson and Graham did not play. The former was of course engaged fighting for his Blue, while Graham was not asked. This latter omission I regard as ill advised, because I am confident that Graham, young and always improving as he is, would be of material service to the county wide. I quite recognise that in Grierson's absence a left-handed trundler was essential, and that Geary was the man to play, but I maintain that the old Modern boy, possessing the "cricket temperament," as he undoubtedly does, would have been less likely to have been attacked by nerves than at least one member of the eleven who actually played. But still, the team won, so why grumble? the team won, so why grumble?

Mr. Orr won the toss and decided to make the most of his chance. Rain was imminent and runs, if they were to be made at all, were to be made quickly. Willett failing, Bocquet, Apthorp and the skipper (all naturally free hitters) were next on the sheet. And the policy was justified, because these three laid the foundation of a total of 154, which, as after events proved, won the game for Beds. Bocquet was showing up well, when he got out of his ground to a slow one and was stumped. Then come the stand of the innings, those two old hands, who have stood with their backs to the wall for the county many and many a time; Orr and Apthorp. Then came a longish stand and Geary, who had bowled seven overs really well, and had kept the batemen always playing, was displaced by Pilgrin, who only bowled four overs, two of which were maidens, for nine runs, before he too was relieved. Willett was again bowled for a trifle and Bocquet, Apthorp, Orr, Wharmby, Geary, Holdstock, Saunders, and Pilgrim all failed. In the light of this awful show I think it must have been that Beds. were trying to force the game and match a win. They certainly left things very close, leaving Herts only 90 to get. But this proved too mack and Beds. triumphed by nine runs. For this success they owe a debt of gratitude to Wharmby (three for 35), and Moroom (six for 37), who bowled splendidly in the Herts. second venture, backed up by some exceptionally good fielding. To sum up, this first county, game showed us that Beds. have a splendid fielding side, and a more than useful set of bowlers. The batting failures, I fancy, need not be taken seriously, the conditions being all infavour of the man with the ball. It was a very long day's cricket on Tuesday, and I hasten to congratulate Mr. Orr and his men on their successful season's start. It should do the team themselves some good and will undoubtedly stimulate interest in the county town.

- Cricket.

It seldom occurs that three and a halfinnings in county cricket are crowded into one day. That of itself would make the Beds, v. Herts, match this week noteworthy. Yet the one thing for which the match will long be remembered was the magnificent uphill fight the team waged during the last 90 minutes, after an exhibition of rank badrbatting laid to all appearances left their position hopeless. For anything like it in the annals of the club one has to go back to the renowned Staffordshire match, when after letting Barnes trundle them out for 23 Bedfordshire pulled off a great victory.

One could not help admiring the spirit of the men as they left the pavilion that last time. "We have won matches before when it seemed impossible, and we can again," observed one. And then the Staffs, precedent was mentioned, and several other brilliant seleventh hour recoveries. It was known that the wicket was getting faster and easier, but another consideration entered, viz., that a faster wicket was much more to the liking of Wharmby and Morcom.

After all, that small score in the second innings was a blessing in disgnise. But for that, undoubtedly Beds, would have had to be satisfied with 'ie three points for a first innings victory instead of the full five points, for even an optimistic sporting skipper like Mr. Orr dared not have risked his three points already won to have declared with such a total, treacherous as the wicket was. Allowance, too, must be made for the fact that this was the first slow wicket of the season.

When Bedfordshire began their second innings at 3.50, there was just a sporting chance that a definite conclusion might be reached. If Herts., who had nothing to lose now, and everything to gain, could get Bedfordshire out for a triffe and quickly, they might knock off the runs. In the first part of this proposition they succeeded beyond their fondest dreams. Burton at first was simply unplayable. While howling very fast, he was keeping a perfect length, and making the ball twist and turn at will, and nip up from the pitch at an alarming pace. He was a real artist, and his performance delighted the crowd enormously. In his third and fourth overs, both maidens, he bowled Willett, got Orr given out the first ball, and bowled Apthorp and Wharmby, surely a bag good enough for any-bowler.

It was in the second part of the proposition that the home county miscalculated grievously. They had ample time to make the 91 needed for victory, and when at 6 o'clock they had eight wickets in hand and only wanted 31 runs, it seemed a dead cert for them. "But never prophesy until you know" is an exceptionally good maxim incricket, and especially on a wicket like that. Herts. had their first doubts when Squire caught Cowley and Cuthbertson off consecutive balls and enabled Wharmby, who was working heroically, to smash up the partnership which was threatening big disaster. Then Morcom got on the spot. With only four runs added four more wickets had fallen. 27 runs and four wickets to fall is quite a different prospect to 31 runs and eight wickets to fall. Morcom was bowling like one possessed, mixing up fast shooters, yorkers, and that special deadly thing, which began to be known as the "sticker." Amid tense excitement, Morcom fung them down, and when Titchmarch left, Herts, felt their case was hopeless. And it was.

Morcom was the star performer of the winning side. Besides his wonderful bowling, he batted admirably in both innings. There was one special delivery about which the opposing batsmen discoursed most eloquently. They knew exactly what it did, but they never knew when to expect it. It came to be known as the "sticker." In delivery and pace it was like the rest, but when it struck the pitch it seemed to stop dead, and then either shoot, or come up

slowly. In either case the batsman was caught napping, for if it shot it bowled him, and if he hit it he was invariably too soon and gave an easy catch.

Mr. Orr is to be congratulated on the management of his bowling, or rather, perhaps, in the confidence he displayed in Morcom and Wharmby. While R. Cowley and Cuthbertson were surely if laboriously piling on the runs and seemed likely to knock them off, he showed fine judgment in keeping his original bowlers on. A slip here would have meant the loss of the game. Both were bowling magnificently, as witness the eulogy of the Herts, batsmen. Nothing, either, was given away in the field. In that last innings, Bedfordshire, to a man, put everything they knew into it. Herts: pay the return visit next week, when another fine game should be seen on the Elstow School Ground.

Hertfordshire have a capture in voung Burton. Mr. Orr formed a very high opinion of him, and his work in this match stamps him as a class bowler. He is the son of Burton, the old Middlesex cricketer; his brother was umpiring in this match and has played for Northants., so that he comes of cricketing stock. Last year he took over 70 wickets for Herts. He has a nice easy action, excellent length, and a splendid variety of balls, which he mixes with great art. His capture comes opportunely for Herts., as they have lost White, formerly a mainstay of their attack, who has been appointed one of the head professionals at Lords.

Wharmby has had a fine season so far with the Coventry and North Warwickshire Club. He has scored nearly 1,000 runs, and has an average of over 100. Among his innings are 120 (not out) v. Birmingham Nondescripts, 150 v. Sutton Coldfield, 87 v. Oratory School, Birmingham, 67 not out v. Yardley, 150 v. Uppingham Rovers and 72 v. Aston Unity.

Obituary.

G. ARBER.

George Arber, who died at 2, The Lees, Malvern, on June 22nd George Arber, who died at 2, The Lees, Malvern, on June 22nd, aged 71, after a long illness, was for 39 years cricket professional and groundsman at Malvern College, coaching the Foster brothers and other Old Malvernians whose names are prominent in the cricket world. He was born at Cambridge on June 12th, 1841, and played his first match at Lord's, for Colts of the North v. Colts of the South, in May, 1869, when he obtained eleven wickets for 49 runs. In Scores and Biographies (xi., 15) he was described as "a fast round-armed bowler, and an average batsman. . Height, 5 ft. 7 in., and weight 11 st. 6 ib."

Arber went to Malvern as professional in 1868 and was retained Arber went to Malvern as professional in 1868 and was retained as groundsman until about four years ago. He was one of nature's gentlemen, commanding the respect of all who knew him and the affection of those who knew him best. His success in the match at Lord's in 1869 led him to be summoned to the pavilion and offered an engagement on the spot, but, having previously accepted the Malvern appointment, had to decline the honour. For some years he appeared occasionally in the Worcestershire eleven. He claimed to be the maker of the first cinder track for tennis.
