CORNWALL'S VICTORY  
OVER BERKSHIRE

HOME COUNTY'S DEADLY  
ATTACK

The weather was overcast and there was only a small number of spectators at Liskeard, on Friday, when Cornwall commenced the second of their home matches in the Minor Counties' championship. In the first match, at Penzance, Cornwall had defeated Devon on the first innings, and on Friday they opposed Berkshire. Winning the toss, H. Treswina opened Cornwall's innings with Lieutenant Irwin, H. M. Hinde and Relf (R.), the old Sussex professional, sharing the attack. Cornwall scored fairly well until Dr. Woodburn took the ball from Relf. The new bowler clean bowled the Cornish captain with the last ball of his first over.

Scholefield came in, and drove Hawksworth along the ground to the off boundary before Woodburn got Irwin beautifully caught behind the wicket on the leg side. The 20 went up after just over an hour's play, but Scholefield did not stay long, hitting a ball from Woodburn into Palmer's hands at point. Woodburn's analysis at this stage read seven overs, three maidens, four runs, three wickets. Dr. Birks was soon taken at the wicket, and Cornwall were 54 runs for four wickets. With the arrival of Cory and W. S. Gilhespy, Cornwall's position began to improve. The bowling still had to be treated with the greatest respect, but Cory was more at home with Woodburn. Gilhespy was content to keep his end up, and Hinde came on again at the bottom end. His first over was a maiden, but in the next Cory hit three boundaries in succession, one on the leg side, the next past mid-off, and the third over cover-point's head to the rails of the grand stand. At the luncheon interval Cory and Gilhespy were still in possession, the pro's score being 33, and Gilhespy having been at the wicket for over half-an-hour without opening his account. After lunch Gilhespy was soon dismissed, caught from a mishit. Cory hit a beautiful six of Woodburn, which sent up the honky, but Bickford was never comfortable. Cory, with his score at 46, attempted a hard drive past mid-off to complete his half-century. The ball travelled at a great speed, but Hinde, at mid-on, got his hands to it and held a beautiful catch high above his head. It was hard lines on Cory, who had hit a six and six fours in a brilliant innings. He displayed a fine variety of strokes all round the wicket.

The Cornish tail gave a good account of itself, especially Mill, who was last out for an extremely useful 25. Dr. Woodburn, with six wickets for 48 runs, was the best Berkshire bowler, his swerve and break puzzling all the Cornish batsmen.

Berkshire's Sturdy Opening.

Berkshire opened with G. G. M. Bennett and J. W. Stokes, who faced B. Williams and Whiting. Williams clean bowled Bennett, who had scored a single, and the Relf joined Stokes. Runs now came freely, the first fifty going up in 40 minutes. Williams and Whiting changed ends, and Relf was clean bowled by the Truro pro. He had given a fine display of batting all round the wicket and hit five four's. Stokes continued to play soundly, but no other batsman could do anything with Williams, who kept a fine length and took a lot of playing. After Stokes had gone, completely beaten by Williams, wickets fell rapidly, and Berkshire were all out just before six p.m. for 111. Williams received an ovation as the players returned to the pavilion. He had bowled 25 overs, nine maidens, for 47 runs and six wickets. Bickford kept wicket in the style for Cornwall.

Cornwall failed to maintain their batting form on Saturday. With the score at 60, Hawksworth and Relf took the ball from Woodburn and Hinde, and, with the aid of exceedingly good catches by Relf, Cornwall were dismissed for 94. Cory was the only Cornish batsman to make any headway against the attack. His 27 included five 4's.

Berkshire, with only 139 to get for victory, appeared to have a fairly good chance of success, but the wiles of Beoder Williams and Whiting were too much for them, and except for Palmer's 43 and Bennett's 14, they fared badly. Whiting took seven wickets for 30 runs, and the whole side was dismissed for 76, Cornwall winning by 84 runs. Scores:-

### TRURO'S HUGE WIN.

Truro entertained the Cornish Choughs on Monday, and won handsomely by 113 runs. The weather was unpropitious, and the wicket favoured the batsmen. Truro had first knock, H. S. Prideaux and C. S. Creeper putting on 80 before the former was bowled by A. G. Adye. Creeper continued to bat carefully, and reached the century before he succumbed to Gilhespy. Other useful contributions were made by E. A. Grigg 34, G. Pentecost 27, C. E. S. T. Lutley 17, A. Lugg 12, and R. Choak 10. Truro passed the double century with only six wickets down, and declared at 217 for six wickets.
