SEASON'S PLAY REVIEWED.

BRIGHT PROMISE FOR THE FUTURE.

The narrow defeat at the hands of Bucks, which was enronced in our last issue, brought to a close the 1924 campaign of the Horts County Cricket Club in the Minor Counties Championship. Of the eight matches played, three were wen outright, three wen on the first innings, and two lost. The County thus achieves 24 points out of a possible 40, or a percentage of 60, which should leave Herts in about the lifth place in the Minor Counties table.

That is a improvement on hat year's record, and, although early hopes of winning the championship outright were not fulfilled, must be account and antislactory.

Looking hat we was a cason, there is justification for sa, ag the the County XI, was good enough to go to the top, for their failure to do so was due to two unaccountable lapses in batting, in which department they were exceptionally strong. Though these two failures in the second innings of the return matches against Norfolk and Bucks took place in the face of good bowlers bowling above their form, it is difficult to find adequate reasons why they occurred.

BATTING STRENGTH.

For in the rest of the matches the batting strength was clearly proved. Thus, a score of 53 lor 8 wickets was compiled against Bedfordshire at Stovenage, and one of 440 against the strong Norfolk howing on the same ground. Five centuries were compiled by Herts batsmen—two by Meyer and one each by Titchmarsh, Clarkson, and the captain, La. J. Reid, both the latter being against Norfolk.

The bowling this year was stronger than for many years past. Burton showed that he had lost none of his old form with the ball, and bowled untiringly, but frequently with bad luck. But the find of the year was the Cambridge Blue, R. J. O. Meyer, who, besides a brilliant batting record, proved as effective as Burton as a bowler.

Of the fielding, it is not possible to epeak with equal satisfaction, and there is much room for improvement in this department, especially in the slips.

The most satisfactory point about the season now closed is the promise it gives for the future. An abundance of youthful talent has been discovered and is being given every encouragement. Meyer, it is hoped, will be a mainstay for many years, while G. M. Crossman, of Cokenach (who deputised for Arthur Grimsdell as wicket-keeper), is a most promising batsman. J. G. Bland, cf St. Albans, and C. B. Fordham, of Bishop's Stortford, have shown both style and ability of a high order. In addition, first rate talent is coming in from the Public Schools, which the county authorities are watching.

NEXT YEAR'S JUBILEE.

Of the veterans, Titchmarsh, though playing several admirable innings, was not so consistent as in former years. R. B. Cowley showed his best form on many occasions, and Hylton-Stewart bowled extremely well at times, while L. A. Watson heads the batting averages, and was the most consistent batsman in the team. Arthur Grimdell was, unfortunately, an absentee, owing to an injured knee, and C. R. G. Hunter was on tour in America with the Corinthians.

Perhaps the greatest assets of the County Club is its present captain. Mr. Reid is a man of calm judgment and quick decision, and with it be possesses a most charming personality. It is due to him that such perfect harmony and good fellowship permeate the leven, and the excellent record of this season is, to a very large extent, due to his able direction.
