They captured 180 opponents' wickets for 2.098 runs, giving an average per wicket of 13.11, and per completed innings of 131.

Like his elder brother, who has this season assisted Derbyshire with a residential qualification, he learnt his cricket at Rossall School. With a beautifully free style, he drives with great power, and is a rapid scorer.

Staffordshire's batting has not been satisfactory, for the team crumpled up inexcusably on two or three occasions, even allowing for the difficulty of the wicket. Chenhire bundled them out at Porthill for 32, and Lancashire II. did likewise at Stoke for 41, both matches being lost. The other defeat was at the hands of Norfolk at Old Hill, when Staffordshire had the worse of the wicket, and M. Falcon was dangerous and unplayable for a time. There were no fewer than elever blank, or practically blank, days, and on two others there was no play before a quarter-past five in one instance, and only forty-five minutes' play, which began at four o'clock, in the other; and on seven other days there was considerable restriction of the hours of play by the weather. Financial loss, in these circumstances, was inevitable—the gate receipts show a decline, approximately, of £6,000, compared with 1921, when the weather was fine—and the misfortunes which have been suffered should commend the club to the practical sympathy of all who care for the maintenance of first-class cricket in the county.

From the playing point of view, the improvement expected at the beginning of the campaign has not been fully realised, but having regard to the wet weather the results are fairly satisfactory. Warwickshire, in both batting and bowling, are a fast wicket side, and in a year when soft wickets have been more or less the rule, they have done almost as well as was possible for a side so limited to win seven county championship matches and loss only siz.
