# DURHAM V. NORTHUMBER.

This Whitsuntide's annual fixture for a two-day match proved as popular as ever. The morning broke cloudy, but at 11 30, the hour for commencing, the light increased, and at about 12 o clock the sun broke through upon a large crowd of several thousand enthusiastic spectators. The committee generously de-cided to admit the unemployed at half price, upon production of their Umon cards. The amount taken at the gate on Monday was £289 1s. 6d., or £45 above that of last year (which was a record). This worked out at 3,475 being admitted at one shilling and 3,800 at expense—a total of 7,215.

First Day There was a change in the teams from the original selection. H. Brooks, the Durham County captain, was unable to play, through illness, and his place was taken by ttl. C. Ferens, was captain; and H. Gibon, of Eppleton, filled the vacancy in the team. F. T. Boadbent (South Northumberland) was also mable to play at I his place was a low mable. to play, and his place was taken by H. B. Pritchard.

Durham won the toss, and sent in H. C. Ferens and L. H. Weight, to the bowling of G. F. Milne and W. Hetherton. The first over was a mailen, played upon an excellent wicket, with a tendency to be on the soft side. Weight made the first boundary just before the end of the third over, through the slips, followed by singles which came slowly followed by singles, which came slowly during the first 20 minutes. After half an hour's play H. C. Fereas was clean bowled by G. T. Milne, who made 7. with a total score of 21. M. Nichol icined L. H. Weight, to the same bowlers, and runs come more freely, 50 being telegraphed after 50 minutes play. After this, soo ing slappe iet, and at 59 a change in the bowlers was made. Lloyd Baxter succeeded W. Hetherton, and at the other end I. McConachie in place of G. T. Mille, who had bowled 20 overs, including 14 maidens, for only 17 runs. Stumps were drawn at one o'clock, the score standing at 77, with the loss of one wicket, after 90 minutes' play.

#### RUN GETTING AS AN ART. Australians Delight 25,000. ANDREWS TOPS THE CENTURY.

Twenty-five thousand spectators—easily a record attendance for any match in the North-East-saw a full day's play at Ashbrooke, Sunderland, yesterday, and gave an enthusiastic welcome to the Australians, seven of whom are making a return visit to Wearside. The play, of course, strongly favoured the tourists, and at the close they held a lead of 127 runs on the first innings and had eight wickets in hand.

in hand.

They played nine possible Test men, and included both Oldfield and Ellis, the lastnamed keeping wicket.

The delightfully warm wenther which favoured the match allowed the Australians to enjoy the cricket under fairly natural conditions, and they entered upon the game with more zest than has been the case with them under less favourable circumstances. They entertained the huge crowd in pleasing style, and scored runs at a good rate without indulging in any spectacular hitting. Invariably they kept the ball on the ground, and very few mistakes were made.

T. J. E. Andrews, the best batsman in the present Australian side on an English

takes were made.

T. J. E. Andrews, the best batsman in the present Australian side on an English wicket, topped the century, and Collins, belieing his reputation for slow scoring, made 69 in excellent style. The tourists fielding was sound, and their bowling always troubled the Durbam batsmen, more so than it might have done if a little more enterprise had been shown. The placing of the Australian field chused many runs to be saved, and there was only one case of misfielding. Durbam's fielding by contrast was not good, and slackness crept in towards the end. Ferens was a notable exception, being always keen and alert.

The wicket was in fine condition, and looked good for many runs even at the close. That runs could be made on it the Australians soon showed, but they were not unduly troubled by the six howlers tried against them. They gave only two real chances in their innings, and both were accepted.

#### NICHOL'S BRIGHT BATTING.

NICHOL'S BRIGHT BATTING.

Durham batted first, and lost Weight at six, Macartney cleverly deceiving the professional to get him leg before. Kinch was beaten by the same bowler with the total unaltered, the ball nipping off the pitch very quickly and 'eping low, but the third partnership, between Ferens and Nichol, produced 32 in forty minutes. Nichol scored off the first ball he received from Macartney, and later he cut Grimmett for four. The same player on-drove the slow bowler for another boundary, and caused Grimmett to he relieved by Richardson. This slowed up the scoring, and at 38 Nichol made his first mistake, nibbling at an off ball from Mailey (who had taken over from Macartney at 21) to give Collins a catch at slip. There were four 4's in Nichol's innings, which was a very useful one. This may be his last match for Durham for some time, as he is shortly leaving for another trial with Surrey.

Ferens scored all the runs (14) made in

Ferens scored all the runs (14) made in the next partnership, which terminated when Romaines was bowled by Mailey's last ball before lunch in attempting a big hit. Mailey's first ball after the interval brought about Ferens's dismissal, the Durham man anicking one into the wicketham man saicking one into the wicket-keeper's hands. Batting for 90 minutes, Ferens rendered invuluable service to his side. Brooks and Dobson carried the total to 71, when Mailey tempted the left-hander to hit, with fatal results, and with the addition of eight runs Carr and Cook were dismissed.

The best stand came in the ninth partnership, Brooks and Howell adding 46 in 35 minutes before the professional was bowled in attempting to drive a tempting Mailey ball. For the second time in the innings Mailey took wickets with successive deliveries when he got Webster caught to close the innings at 125, leaving Brooks unbeaten and the top scorer. He made his 32 runs out of 70 and hit five 4's. The innings occupied two hours and 25 minutes, and Mailey claimed eight of the wicket at 6.5 runs each.

Collins and Macartney took commend almost from the start of the Australian innings, scoring 30 in a quarter of an hour and 60 in the teen more minutes. Two bowling changes were tried, but Cook proved very expensive, Collins scoring 20 from his leg halls in three overs. Just before tea, however, Macartney failed to get on top of a rising ball from Carr, and was caught at the wicket, the score being 73, the outgoing batsman having five 4's to his credit. At tea, Collins had scored 43 in as many minutes out of 77, and within seventeen minutes of the resumption he sent the 100 up, and reached his own 50 a few minutes lafer.

The total was taken to 143 before Collins was disposed of after batting for eighty-five minutes in faultless style and thring eleven 4's and two 3's. Cook, who bowled much better later in the afternoon, got the Australian captain's wicket, Nichol taking an easy catch

With Andrews and Bardsley together, the total mounted very quickly, both men scoring all round the wicket off various bowlers, and sending up the second century in an hour and fifty minutes. At the close the total stood at 252, and there seemed little prospect of getting either man out.

Andrews reached his 100 in two hours, and has so far hit a 6 and fifteen 4's. His

gross takings for the match were £2,250, a splendid indication of the support which the North-East affords to first-class cricket when it is played in a suitable centre.

Overnight the Australians had made 252 for the loss of Collins and Macartney, and the not outs, Andrews and Bardsley, carried this yesterday morning to 270 before Andrews was stumped off Cook's bowling after he had escaped a similar fate two balls earlier. Batting in all for two hours, Andrews made his 122 runs chiefly in front of the wicket with powerful driving and he was particularly strong on the off side. His best hits were a 6 and 16 4's. His partnership with Bardsley realized 127 in 78 minutes.

Bardsley reached 50 after batting an hour and three-quarters, and when the closure was applied his score stood at 63, his partner, Taylor, having made 26, and the fourth partnership realizing 52 in 42 minutes.
