The "glorious unvertainties" of cricket were once again demonstrated at Truto, on Friday, when Cornwall met Devon in a minor counties match. The day was fine with a strong breeze blowing across the pitch, following a night of heavy rain, and this caused a late start. Devon won the toss, and opened in a most careful manner. The spectators thought that Fulcher and Whitton were over-cautious, but either the pitch must have been tricky or the bowling was good. An hour was occupied in making 46 runs, and after lunch it took the same pair 25 minutes to add another dozen. Subsequent play, however, proved that the Devon batsmen were right, for when Fulcher, Whitton and Falding had been dismissed, and the other players took mere liberties, the Devon side cracked up. For the loss of three wickets, Devon had scored 97 runs, but here something approaching a "rot" set in, and the whole side were out for another 33 runs.

Cornwall's hopes ran high, but they were soon dashed. Bad as Devon's end had been, Cornwall's start was worse. It was one of the most disappointing displays Cornwall has ever given against their near neighbours.

Hence, it is, that when the bowler gets a pitch that really suits him and he triumphatover the batamen, as was the case at Truto on Friday, the public should not go away disappointed, but should realise that they have witnessed an outstanding feat of prowess. prowess.

Of Whiting, top much can hardly be said! Here is a man who has been playing in the county since most of the present generation can refember, and whose skill and vigour seem practically undiminished. Year atter year, Whiting has proved not only the most reliable, but the most dangerous bowler that Cornwall has possessed. Rarely has he failed to take wickets—frequently the bulk of them, and to-day he remains the most useful bowler in the county side, and one who is practically indespensable. Friday's feat is one which should crown his declining years—declining, in a cricket sense. Five wickets for 37 runs is a good analysis, the merit of which is heightened by the further information that of the 39 overs he bowled, no fewer than 20 were maidens.

Kendall's name is not so well known in Cornwall county cricket circles. He hails from Liskeard, and his presence was more than useful to the side. He shared with Whuting the bowling honours, his average reading 5 wickets for 43 runs, with 9 maidens out of 26 overs. All the strength that Cornwall ran obtain is to be welcomed.

Hats off therefore, to the bowlers, whose day it undoubtedly was.

Many would still liked to have seen J. E. Mill, the Caroborne bowler included (a. this year he is howling better than ever he has done), but the emerses of the Liskeard bowlers (Rendall and Whiting) cannot be overlooked, and the committee have done quite right in trying to strengthen up the batting. The passing over of two such players as H. Tresawna and Reecher Williams however, is to be regretted, as no one has acreed the county better than these two players have done, but even they cannot go on for ever!

The return of R. J. Holman is one of the most amazing things in Cornisherickat. Twenty years ago the Camborne player could chain a regular place in the County XI, without serious opposition, but having been out of county cricket for such a long period, and then to return to the side, and at the acc of 36 years, speaks volumes for hes ability and fitness.

At the beginning of the season in a conversation I had with Holman on cricket in general, and without the slightest idea of his then being selected to play for the county, he casually remarked that he was just as fit to day as he was 30 years ago, and his performances this season have fully justified his then optimism. In fact, Holman this season has been one of the great sucresses of the Camberne side. With G. Regers (will the Cornish captain please note) these two players have proved themselves to be a good (if not a little botter) a pair of opening bastmen in the county, and if the bost is to be got out of them they will do it if called upon to open an immiss.



FAMOUS CRICKETERS AT PENZANCE

VISIT OF MESSRS. HOBBS AND STRUDWICK

Hobbs and Strudwick were included in the Penzance side, whish Bridges played for the West Cornwall side, which also had the assistance of Frank Whiting, the popular Cornish bowler, and who for a number of years assisted Penzance.

Unfortunately, the weather proved most unkind. Itain fell throughout the greater part of Wednesday and also during the night, and Thursday dawned with heavy skies, and threats of rain, which were soon fulfilled, aithough the wind had veered round to the north.

Thus proved a great disappointment, as the fixture had been looked forward to with great interest throughout the locality, and there was no doubt that had the day turned out fine there would have been a record attendance, and that the spectators would have been treated to a nine all round display of cricket.

The game was timed to start at 11.20 a.m., and just at this period there was a slight break in the clouds, and there were spots of blue sky. But this was only temporary, and soon sgain rain was failing pittlessly, driving from the field all but the most ardeut supporters of the game and the officials.

The ground was rain-scaled, and there were pools of water close to the prepared pitch, where previous matches had been played.

The officials, however, had taken all the precautions they could to meet such a possible emergency, and the pitch itself was covered with a strip of matting.

It soon became apparent that there would be no play at least fetore lunch, and, to avoid any undue delay, it was needed that this should be pattaken of soon after mid-day inatead of at \$1.50, as arranged.

Just before 1 p.m., there was a fifthi glean of sunshine, which was quickly niotted out, rain again descended, and the sky became even more overcast.
