DURHAM DO WELL.

Bowlers on Top in Sunderland County Game.

The state of the game at the close of play last night in the opening day of the match between Durham County and Mr H. D. G. Leveson-Gower's XI., at Ash-brooke, Sunderland, was hardly in accord-ance with general anticipation, for whereas, no doubt, most people expected Durham to be faced to-day with the task of avoiding perhaps an innings defeat, they stand an excellent chance at least of gaining a lead on the first innings.

An Interesting Position.

Durham had the best of the weather conditions to a certain extent, but their first innings' total of 184 did not look formidable in face of the batting talent arrayed against them. So well did their bowlers perform, however, that at the drawing of stumps Mr Leveson-Gower's XI. had lost seven wickets for 125 runs, and thus require 60 to secure a first innings' lead.

The overnight rain and a sea-fret in the morning made the ground heavy, and though the wicket had been protected, the outfield was slow. As the day wore on, however, the ground dried and the light was extremely good for the last two hours' play.

Durham won the toss, and Ferens and Weight gave them a good start by scoring 63 in 80 minutes before the professional, with 21 to his credit, was beaten by a ball which broke in from the off. Ferens left two' runs later, caught at silly mid-off, after making 37, which included five 4's, in an innings featured by forcing shots in front of the wicket. He should have been caught at 19, but his only other bad stroke was a snick behind the wicket at 37.

With Woolley making the ball turn, Nichol and Kelsall were none too comfortable, but they were together at lunch, and subsequently took the score to 93 before Kelsall chopped a ball into Sandham's hands after batting half an hour. Woolley was the bowler, and he followed up this success by getting Nichol caught at mid-off at 104, Carr dismissed at the same total, and successfully appealing for leg before against Dobson a run later.

Six wickets were down for 105, but, thanks to sound batting by C. I., Adamson, who, with Gibbon, added 37 for the eighth wicket, the total was increased by 74 ere Cook, the last man, was dismissed. Adamson had the satisfaction of carrying out his bat and making the highest score of the fifth wicket and scored his runs out of 75 in eighty-four minutes, having a six, three 4's, and a three as his chief strokes. Slow to start, he later scored in good style with clever placing and an occasional late cut. late cut.

Woolley's Wickets.

He should have been caught at 46 by Hobbs, but otherwise kept the ball clear of the fieldsmen. He got his six by on-driving Shepherd, while Howell also cleared the ring in the same way, Woolley, the bowler in this instance, having previously puzzled the Shields player with his flighting. Gibbon drow well at times, and Nichol glanced the ball in finished style.

Woolley claimed the bowling honours with seven wickets for 53 runs, getting three of them for one run.

Hobbs and Sandham opened the visitors' maings to the bowling of Howell and Cook, and the famous England batsman soon helped himself to a six, a pull to the leg rails, and an on drive for four. Cook commanded respect and Howell's fast bowling had to be watched, but the half-century went up without mishap in as many minutes. Hobbs claimed 3t of the total, but thereafter the initiative rested with Sandham, who had been quiet up to this point.

When Carr took over the ball from Dobson at 64 he met with immediate success, clean bowling Hobbs with a ball that broke sharply in and was probably helped on its way by the batsman. It

is something of an achievement to bowl England's premier batsman, and the crowd of some five thousand strong voiced their appreciation of the fact.

First Wicket Feature.

First Wicket Feature.

The feature of the first wicket partnership, which lasted an hour, was the understanding displayed by the batsmen and the sharp running between wickets. Stimulated by his success, Carr proceeded to bowl Ashdown with only a run added. Woodey, in his usual graceful style, had helped to add 21 for the third wicket when he was out leg before to Weight, the ball straightening out in the last yard and keeping very low. The Kent man hit a 6 off Carr and a 4. With the total unnitered Carr brought off a magnificent catch from his own bowling to dismiss Sandham, who made his 32 runs in an hour and 28 minutes, and hit four 4's, while ten runs later MacBryan was well beaten by Weight. Then Ducat was caught at 105, and Shepherd aplendidly taken by Kelsall without any addition. addition.

Visions of the dismissal of the side before the close of play were dispelled by Peach, who hit hard to make 15 in seven minutes

who hit hard to make 10 in seven innuan-before the close.

Durham batted three hours and a half for their total, and Mr Leveson-Gower's XI. have so far been at the wickets five minutes under two hours.

DURHAM'S MORAL VICTORY.

Splendid Show Against First Class Eleven.

The spectators at Ashbrooke, last night, were torn between two desires when Hubert Brooks declared the Durham second innings closed with four wickets down, and left Mr Leveson-Gower's XI. two hours in which to get 201 runs for victory.

They wanted to enjoy some finished batting by the distinguished visitors, and yet they wanted to see Durham win. What they did get was twenty minutes of Woofley's effortless stroke production, a little each of Ashdown and MacBryan, a lot of Ducat's "defensive batsmanship reduced to a fine art," and the satisfaction of knowing that Durham—favoured by the best of the wicket during the match—were moral winners.

The closing stages were perhaps devoid of interest, but the cautious play of Ducat and Peach was justified by the state of the wicket, which was showing signs of wear, and the fact that Durham were very much on their toes.

There was a sensational opening to the second innings of Mr Leveson-Gower's XI, at 4.36, Ferens just failing to bring off what would have been a splendid catch behind the wicket to dispose of Hobbs from the first ball sent down. As a matter of fact, Hobbs did not long survive following this escape, for when he had scored two Howell got him caught at slip. Then, without any addition, Sandham, Surrey's other opening batsman, was out leg before to Cook.

A. Kent pair in Ashdown and Woolley became associated at this stage, and the England player delighted with some well placed shots before he was caught in the long field in attempting to drive Howell, J. W. C. MaeBryan, the Somerset batsman, was next in, and he helped Ashdown to add 35 in 25 minutes, hitting with power in front of the wicket to make 22, including three boundaries, ere falling to a slip catch off Dobson. The Whithurn man was bowling into the wind and making the ball swing away awkwardly to just outside the off stick, and all the batsmen who faced him were more or less troubled.

Shepherd did not inspire confidence when he joined Ashdown, and at 73 he was caught and bowled by Carr after he had invited such a mode of dismissal by poking about. Half the side were thus out in an hour, and an additional wicket fell three minutes later, with the score unchanged, when Ashdown was well taken at the wicket after batting 63 minutes for 19.

Worthington and Ducat looked like stopping the rot when in partnership for the seventh wicket, but at 85 Worthington was out to a good catch in the long field after scoring nine in 21 minutes, and with half an hour for play there were visions of a Durham victory. Ducat and Peach dispelled it, however, by playing out time, the first named being at the wickets 57 minutes for his 14 runs.

In the morning Durham gained a first innings lead of 19, disposing of the remaining three visiting wickets for 40 runs. Peach was batting thirty-five minutes for 28, made out of 54, and hit three 4's and five 2's; while Worthington scored his 27 runs in forty-eight minutes and reached the boundary on three occasions. Weight finished the innings by throwing down Strudwick's wicket when Leveson-Gower called for a sharp run.

Carr bowled splendidly to get six wickets for 21 runs in the innings. The other Durham bowlers rendered fine service and the fielding was always good.

MERRY NEW ZEALAND BATSMEN.

Durham Outplayed.

THE ART OF RUN-GETTING.

The New Zealanders certainly played up to their reputation for bright batting when they opposed Durham at Chester-le-Street on Saturday, although they owed almost everything to four individuals for the fact that they totalled 378 in three hours and thirty-two minutes, and more particularly to Dempster, whose 178 is the highest innings made so far in the tour.

From the point of average view the New Zealand batting is stronger than the bowlprobably been underrated. In any case, it was good enough to get rid of eight Durham batsmen for 58, a gallant ninth wicket stand by Hubert Brooks and Cook alone saving the Minor County Champions from the ignominy of an immediate follow-

on.
To-day, Durham resume at 11.30 in arrears of 262 with two first innings wickets to fall.

Much to Admire.

Much to Admire.

Dempster's great innings was, of course, the feature of the play on Saturday, but it would be wrong to say that it dwarfed everything else, for there was much to admire in the batting of Blunt, the Durham-born all-rounder with a charming personality; and that of Page and Dacre, together with the fine ground work of the Tourist outfielders.

There were three partnerships of note in the New Zealand innings. Blunt and Dempster made 64 runs in forty minutes for the first wicket; Dempster and Page put on 133 in eighty-one minutes for the second; while Dempster and Dacre added 104 in a particularly lively seventh wicket partnership of forty minutes' duration.

Dempster's Driving.

Dempster's Priving.

Dempster was at the wickets altogether for three hours and 12 minutes, scoring his 178 runs out of 332 actually made with the bat while he was in, and, first in and eighth to leave, actually made 108 by boundary bits—four 6's and 21 4's—his other scoring strokes other than singles being one three and ten 2's. His first four came from a very stresky stroke just over the heads of the wicket-keeper and first slip, but thereafter he rarely mistimed the ball, his footwork being admirable and his beautiful wrist work a delight to watch.

to watch.

He survised a very confident appeal, when 81, for leg before to Cook, and round about 135 should have been stumped, gave a sharp chance to slip, and was also appealed against for a catch at the wicket

appealed against for a catch at the wicket wide on the leg side.

But these were but minor blemishes in a splendid display, marked by powerful straight driving—which gave him three 6's and four 4's—hard cutting (three delightful late cut boundaries), forcing strokes to the off, and four huge pulls. He had some pretty leg shots early in his innings, but later on confined himself chiefly to hard hitting in front of the wicket, with a purtiality for the off side. His performance was enhanced by the fact that he was hit five times and was limping while making his last 60 or so. In fact, he was still limping when fielding.

Blunt's Graceful Batting.

Blunt's innings was a thing of beauty. He was the most graceful batsman on view, and combined with that quality the ability, by accurate placing, to send the bad length or loose ball skimming to the boundary. Leg hits, cuts and off shots gave him his 42 out of 64 in forty minutes, and he had seven 4's.

Duere, who captained the side, in the absence for the first time on the tour of T. C. Lowry, was, like, Page, not so strong on the offside, all but two boundaries, a cut and a drive, out of his 43 runs (made in 40 minutes) coming from straight drives, on drives and pulls. In addition to a six he hif seven 4's.

Page did not give a favourable impression at the start of his imnings, but later he scored well to collect 57 out of 133 in

81 minutes, hitting six 4's—three leg hits, two straight drives, and a square cut—and two 3's. Bernau, a hard hitting left hander (one of four), scored his 24 in 14 minutes, but he was let off thrice.

On paper Brooks and Carr had better bowling figures, but Cook got his four wickets for 61 actually, and had four 6's debited against him in that total. The work of Legg, the new wicket-keeper, was extremely good up to a point—that is in keeping the extras down—but he missed two chances of stumping and dropped a catch, Brooks actually suffering four times through "lives" being given from his bowling. The ground work of the Durham fieldsmen, too, was not good in certain cases.

Durham opened their innings very badly, Kelsall Weight, and Adamson going for 27, and although Maurice Nichol scored 19 in 40 minutes, hooking two 4's and straight driving for another, eight wickets were down in 70 minutes for 58. Then: Cook joined Brooks, and in 40 minutes the pair added 53, the first-named driving and pulling to excellent purpose and Brooks placing skiltully. Henderson, fast left-handed, with a style not unlike Webster, of Lancashire, caused the home batsmen so much concern that no one was comfortable against him. He had the wicket-keeper (Dacre) standing well back, two slips, a short slip, and a third man for his going away ball, which most of the batsmen attempted to snick. McGirr, medium-fast right hand, was not so difficult, but Blunt, slow right hand with a googly action, frequently puzzled with his flighting. Henderson so far has four wickets for 33 and Blunt two for 22.

Durham County put up a better fight against the New Scalanders at Chester-le-Street than was anticipated at the close of play on Saturday, when they and compiled 111 for the loss of eight wickets, against their opponents' 373. H. Brooks and Cook brought about a marked change

NEW ZEALANDERS' VISIT TO CHESTER-LE-STREET

Saturday's Match Attracts 6,000 Spectators.

About 2,500 people were present to witness the commencement of the cricket match between New Zealand and Durham County at Chester-le-Street on Saturday. Rain fell heavily for about half an hour before the start, but the wicket was prevented from being damaged by ground The sun eventually made its sheets. appearance and shone gloriously for the remainder of the day.

Although without their captain, T. C. Lowry, the Colonials fielded a strong side under the leadership of C. C. Dacre. This was the first engagement of their tour with a minor county. replaced T. K. Dobson on the Durham team, this being the only change from

the side originally chosen.

The New Zealanders won the toss and batted first, and it early became evident that their first two representatives, R. C. Blunt and C. S. Dempster were in for a lengthy spell. They made a promising start, Blunt getting a couple of leg boundaries off Howell's first two deliveries. Fourteen runs had been scored before Dempster opened what proved to be the brightest performance of the day with a well-judged leg stroke for a single. Although the next few overs produced nothing sensational, the total rose with pleasing rapidity. Cook, who shared the attack with Howell, was played fairly carefully, many delightful strokes being witnessed. At this stage of the partnership Blunt was mostly in the limelight, his bold strokes and unerring judgment being a real pleasure to watch. To the first 50, which went up after half an hour's play, he had contributed 36, which included seven 4's.

The first bowling change was made when another eight runs had been added. Carr displacing Howell, whose bowling was going "off" a little. The change brought success to the county team. Carr's first over was a maiden, but during his third over Blunt turned the ball to point where H. Brooks made a really smart single-handed catch. The partnership single-handed catch. had realised 64, and play had been in

progress 40 minutes.

M. L. Page had only been at the wicket a short time when he lifted a delivery by Cook right out of the ground with a lofty drive, and as Cook had now permitted 35 runs off 11 overs, a change was made, Weight being brought on in The batsmen continued to his place. score freely, however, and Dempster's 50 synchronised with the registering of the first century, which was reached after 58 minutes' play. The next two wickets-E. L. H. Bernau and W. Cunningham-only produced 28. and catches dismissed both of them.

County's 1st Innings.

Hopes ran high when Durham County commenced batting, but they were early dashed, and until the captain, H. Brooks, and Cook, the West Hartlepool "pro," came together, a collapse appeared certain. Durham had only managed to get 58 for seven, but before stumps were drawn the efforts of the two batsmen mentioned had advanced the total to 111, leaving the side with a leeway of 262 to make up on the Monday, with two

wickets to fall.

Weight and Kelsall opened the Durham innings to the bowling of McGirr and Henderson, and the latter was caught: at mid-off after having contributed a modest single to a score of 14. With the total unaltered Weight was clean bowled by McGirr, and M. Nichol and C. L. Adamson then became associated. The partnership was broken when Dacre caught Adamson behind the wicket, and a 'catch at slip by Dempster dismissed M. Nichol.

Carr and H. Gibbon were now representing the County, and something like a groan went up from the crowd when the Chester-le-Street "pro" was caught on the boundary, for great things had been expected of him. He gave a catch with the first ball delivered to him. Durham had been batting about an hour when Gibbon threw away a valuable wicket in attempting to turn what was obviously a single into a two.

Henderson found R. Nichol's middle stump with the score at 58, and Howell returned to the pavilion a few minutes later without having contributed a single run. It was then that Brooks and Cook became associated, and when the stumps were drawn they had been together for The century was registered 40 minutes. after the innings had lasted an hour and 40 minutes-an average of a run a minute.
