

## COUNTY CRICKET IN CORNWALL.

### ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of Cornwall County Cricket Club was held at Truro on Thursday, Mr. H. Tresawna presided.

The Hon. Treasurer (Mr. A. C. Polwhele) reported that the receipts were £684, including £250 from 317 subscribing members, £146 from match receipts, and £214 as share of profit on Test and trial matches. The expenditure included £65 in grants to clubs and £432 for match expenses, and the closing balance in hand was £128, as compared with £24 last year. There was a drop of £28 on subscriptions. The older and larger subscribers were falling off, and the younger people were not paying the same, if at all. Abnormal receipts during the year were £254. On normal expenditure he anticipated they would just be able to carry through next year because the normal expenditure over receipts would be about £140.

The Chairman said that 15 players received £216 11s. 10d. in expenses and loss of time, which in some cases was paid for.

### THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The report of the year stated that Cornwall were tenth in the Minor Counties competition, as against 21st the previous year—a very creditable performance. Young players were given a trial in each game, and at least two, Stoneman and Barnicoat, made a very good impression. Cory was the most consistent batsman, and put together the only century made. Baker was out of luck, and the county suffered accordingly. Rogers (G.) had not maintained his fine form, but it was delightful to see their captain (H. Tresawna) bat with all his well known skill and charm against Berkshire again. Taken as a whole, the batting had been disappointing. Whiting, Rogers (W.), and Ollerearnshaw had been very good. Whiting was a wonder. Although a veteran in the game, he was still a live wire, and had now the remarkable record of 850 runs for Cornwall in Minor County cricket. This was all the more noteworthy when it was remembered that during most of this time Cornwall only played eight matches, and never more than ten, in any season. Surely this could hardly be equalled in the country.

### ELECTIONS.

The Prince of Wales was re-elected patron, and Col. Sir Hugh Protheroe-Smith was appointed president in place of the late Viscount Clifden. Mr. H. Tresawna and Mr. Shaw Baker were again chosen as captain and vice-captain respectively.

Mr. A. C. Polwhele resigned the position of hon. treasurer after many years' service, and it was decided to place on record appreciation of his splendid work. Mr. N. Humphreys (Tywardreath) was appointed to fill the vacancy, with Mr. J. L. Prideaux (Penryn) as assistant treasurer, and Major G. T. Williams and Mr. Beecher Williams were re-elected secretaries.

### PAYMENT FOR LOST TIME.

In regard to 1932, Mr. Beecher Williams stated that Devon were uncertain as to whether they would enter the Minor Counties competition in that year, and Berkshire would like to drop out, but might consider it again if Cornwall wanted to get a quota. The Devon secretary wrote that they hoped to come in, but it depended on 1931, and hoped to avoid a necessity of dropping out by a successful appeal for financial support.

The meeting discussed in camera the question of payment to players for lost time, and unanimously decided to admit the principle in such cases where the Selection Committee considered it absolutely necessary.

Mr. L. T. Polglaze, Redruth, remarked that Cornwall was a democratic county, and had a balance in hand, while some strictly amateur counties were not paying their way.

## PLAYERS NEEDED

### COUNTY CRICKET CLUB'S PROSPECTS

#### HELP FOR SCHOOL BOYS

Cornwall County Cricket Club annual meeting, at Truro, on Thursday, was largely attended, and a strong desire was shown for the necessity of keeping up county cricket, and as a means to that end, of helping forward promising young players in the county schools, in their knowledge and practice of the game. Mr. Henry Tresawna presided.

The hon. treasurer (Mr. A. C. Polwhele) reported that subscriptions had amounted to £260, donations to £27 2s., match receipts (less tax) £146 6s. 4d., share from the M.C.C. of profits on the test and trial matches, £214 5s., making the total receipts £659 18s. 10d., which with the opening credit balance, made the total £684 16s. 9d. The expenditure included grants to clubs, £65; match expenses, £432 3s. 8d.; sundries, £58 19s. 10d., total, £550 13s. 2d., which with the closing credit balance of £128 13s. 2d., made the total of £684 16s. 9d. The Chairmen pointed out that but for the £214 from the M.C.C. there would have been a deficit. It was also pointed out that the subscriptions had fallen off. Last year there were 358 members contributing £288, this year 317 contributing £260.

The Chairman observed that the main source of expenditure was the payment for expenses connected with paid players. Last year they paid 15 players' expenses for loss of time, £219 11s. 10d.—The accounts were passed.

The report showed that Cornwall's record for 1930 was, played 10, won 3, lost 2, won on first innings 1, drawn 3, giving a percentage of 54.3, and enabling them to finish 10th in the Minor Counties competition, as against 21st last year, a very creditable performance. Young players were given a trial in all the games and at least two, H. S. Stoneman and S. Barnicoat, made a good impression. Cory had been the most consistent batsman, and put together the only century made. C. S. Baker was out of luck, and the county suffered accordingly. G. Rogers had not maintained his fine form of 1929, but it was delightful to see their captain, H. Tresawna, bat again, with his well-known skill and charm, against Berkshire, at Penzance. Taken as a whole, the batting had been disappointing. On the contrary, the bowling of Claude Carter, Whiting, W. Rogers and Ollerearnshaw, had been very good. Congratulations were due to C. P. Carter for his fine performance in his first season for Cornwall.

Whiting was a wonder. Although a veteran in the game, he was still a live wire and had now the remarkable record of some 850 wickets for Cornwall in Minor County Cricket. This was all the more noteworthy because during most of this time, Cornwall only played eight matches, and never more than ten, in any season. Surely his record could hardly be equalled in the country. Ollerearnshaw was very valuable all round, and had been a greater success than during the previous year.

#### Disappointing Gates

The County Club had now to put its house in order, financially, and it required all the public support that could be given it. The gates in the county had been rather disappointing, and it was to be hoped there would be a substantial increase during 1931.

As to the prospects, it was reported by Mr. Beecher Williams that most of last year's players were available, but that there were no new qualifications, or arrivals. A player might now qualify for a county, after 12 months' residence, providing he had not played for any Dominion or State. "We cannot deny the fact," the report continued, "that we are in a bad way for players, especially bowlers." C. P. Carter was leaving for South Africa, and would not be available this season. F. H. Kendall had joined the ground staff at the County Ground, Exeter. He had rendered excellent service to the County, and the club wished him the best of luck. J. L. Wills had also left for London. Unless they could get the secondary school boys under the Oxford movement, and allow them to receive competent instruction, the standard of cricket in the county would not improve, and their club would be doomed. They, as a county club and as individuals, must wake up and foster this movement.

It was felt that there must be many in the county who were upholders of cricket, but who had not yet joined the club. The hon. treasurer would be glad to send them a copy of the report and names of subscribers, if they forwarded him their names and addresses.

The Chairman considered, on the whole, it was not a bad record, to rise from 21st to 10th place, especially in the Minor Competition, as the club had not a great number of people to draw on. Many people said to him last season, "Well, you may not be a polished side, but you are a hard side to beat." They never gave the game away and made their opponents go "all out."

The officers elected were:—Patron, The Prince of Wales; president, Mr. H. Protheroe Smith; captain, Mr. H. Tresawna; vice captain, Mr. C. Shaw Baker; hon. treasurer, Mr. N. Humphrey; Tywardreath; assistant treasurer, Mr. J. L. Pridoux; hon. secretaries, Major G. T. Williams, Tredrea, and Mr. Beecher Williams, Falmouth; hon. auditor, Mr. W. H. Graham, Tywardreath.

The Chairman paid a fine tribute to the memory of the late Viscount Clifden, who had been many years president of the club, and who, he said, had been the pro of cricket in the county for a number of years. No one had the success of the club at heart more than their late president.—All stood as a silent tribute to his memory.

#### County Fixtures

Reference was also made to the valuable services of Mr. A. C. Polwhele, who had been hon. treasurer for years, but felt compelled to resign, owing to pressure of other engagements.—On the motion of Mr. Beecher Williams, seconded by Mr. J. A. Elliott, Mr. Polwhele was thanked, and a record of his services ordered to be entered in the minutes.

The Secretary reported the fixtures for the coming season as follow: July 3rd and 4th, Devon, Truro (College) School ground; July 31st and August 1st, Herkshire, Camborne; August 12th and 13th, Dorset, Camborne; August 24th and 25th, Surrey 2nd, Penzance; August 3rd and 4th, Dorset, Weymouth; August 5th and 6th, Surrey 2nd, Oval; August 7th and 8th, Berkshire, Reading; August 19th and 20th, Devon, Exeter; August 28th and 29th, Devon Colts, Liskeard; July 29th, Colts and Schools, Redruth County School; August 13th, Juniors and Kittiwakes, Troon.

Mr. Beecher Williams referred to a letter received from the Minor Counties Secretary, in regard to the Oxford movement, whereby arrangements might be made for coaching and matches, promising secondary and elementary school boys, under competent instruction, in club grounds. He thought they should do all they could to foster the idea.—Mr. Polwhele said there had been a move by the Cornwall Cricket League towards that end. The elementary schools were hardly so far advanced, and they might have more encouragement and help.—Mr. W. H. Pearce said that at Penzance for three seasons some promising school boys had had the use of their cricket ground, one morning and one afternoon a week, and were helped. One master must be in attendance.

Mr. W. A. McLean said Camborne, Redruth, and Illogan Elementary School League were doing something in the same way, and they were exhibiting some promising youngsters.

It was decided that the secretary prepare a circular, with a view to finding what fixed arrangements could be made for six or eight of the best boys of secondary schools, to play on club grounds, on certain days.

It was decided that payment for loss of time by players be made in such cases as were found by the committee to be necessary.



## CRICKET PROSPECTS

### A HIGHER STANDARD IN THE FALMOUTH DISTRICT

It is anticipated that in Falmouth and district, during the coming season, cricket will reach a standard even higher than previously.

Last year the Falmouth town club's play was not so successful as it might have been, and failure on the part of many players to attend practices was held largely responsible, but this, it is expected, will be remedied this year. The new professional is Mr. Harry Austin, of the Bolton League, formerly of Sheffield United C.C., and under his tuition many old and new players are expected to benefit. Practically all last year's players are available. The first eleven will take part in the County League competition, and the second team will compete in the Falmouth and District League. Mr. H. Hancock is the new captain of the first team, though Mr. Beecher Williams will probably assist the side frequently. During June, there will be a ladies' vs. gentlemen's match, and also a game between the Corporation and Tradesmen. Cricket Week will be from August 10th to 15th, and during July a Plymouth team will visit the town, when it is expected that Moulle, a former Falmouth professional, will be among the visitors.

Mawnan first team will take part in Cornwall Junior League matches, and the second team in the Falmouth and District League. In addition, many attractive friendly games have been arranged. Mr. A. Horton will captain the first eleven, with Mr. W. Pearce as vice-captain, and Messrs. W. Christophers and M. Sanderson will be captain and vice-captain, respectively, of the second team.

Constantine will be among the competitors in the Falmouth and District League, and the club has every prospect of a successful season. Mr. L. Vague will be the captain and Mr. A. Williams the vice-captain.

Falmouth Dock Athletic will have two teams in play, and will again use the Trescobens ground. The second eleven will take part in the Falmouth and District League, and the first team will play friendly games. Mr. Hentley is the secretary, and Mr. L. P. Johns, treasurer. Many of last season's players will assist the sides, but one notable absentee will be Mr. Kit Trevarthen.

Only one team, taking part in friendly matches, is being fielded by Penryn. This is due chiefly to the financial position, and to the laxity of the players in regard to practising. An appeal is made for better support from the public. Mr. T. P. Treloar is the captain, and Mr. J. Collins, vice-captain; Mr. J. Bennetts, secretary; and Mr. E. H. Hunt, treasurer. Outley and Bralley will not be playing, but the club's popular president, Dr. Noel Blamey, will assist the side.

Unfortunately, Gerrans were too late to enter the Falmouth and District League, and are playing only friendly matches. They have elected a young captain this year (Mr. H. Andain), and hope to have several young players. It is expected that the older members will rally and give the new captain their support. One of the club's best players has left—Mr. A. Nicholls, who has joined the London Police Force, but others in the team last season will take part.

Mylor Cricket Club, which is composed chiefly of youths, does not claim to be a flourishing club, but some pleasant games are being looked forward to. Only friendly matches will be played, and although several of last year's players will be absent, several new ones are forthcoming. Mr. F. Curnow will play again, and the team will be captained by Mr. N. Pearce, with Mr. J. Cole, vice-captain, and Mr. E. J. Beaton, hon. secretary, assisted by other officials.

Falmouth Y.M.C.A. is starting a team, and there should be some interesting games. Fixtures have been arranged with such elevens as the Falmouth seconds, etc. Mr. Hancock is the secretary.

#### Camborne

Camborne Cricket Club created a record last year by winning the county trophy for the fourth year in succession. The team did remarkably well under the captaincy of Mr. C. V. Paine, and practically the same players represented the first team in all the matches in the league. A splendid team spirit prevailed, and things worked harmoniously.

The annual meeting this year was well attended, and Mr. J. Cath Roberts was re-elected president; Mr. W. A. Maclean, secretary; Mr. W. C. C. Moss, treasurer; Mr. C. V. Paine, captain; and Mr. J. C. Colquhoun, vice-captain, all of whom have served the club well. Credit is also due to Mr. F. J. Gardener and Mr. James Negus, and to the strong ladies' committee.

The Hoskear ground was improved last year at a cost of £150, so that every facility is provided for players and spectators. George Rogers, the groundsmen and professional, has commenced his duties.

With regard to the team, there will probably be little change from last year. The club has sustained a great loss by the removal of James Wills, a young and promising batsman for his club and county, who has joined the Metropolitan Police Force. Harry D. Gardener, who is home on holiday from Africa, should prove of great assistance as a batsman and field. It is understood that J. C. Hare, of Turo, who is now resident in the town, will play for Camborne, and strengthen the attack. Dick Holman has rendered yeoman service to the club for many years, and there is no more popular player in the team.

The 2nd XI. last year did not produce many candidates for first team honours, but they may develop further this season. The School of Mines students were again outnumbered the local players in the team. For a few years the students have paid little attention to cricket, and last year only one figured in the first team. From him greater things are expected this season. There are at least fifteen eligible and capable players to be drawn from.

The opening game takes place at Turo, on Saturday, and the team will probably be chosen from—C. V. Paine (captain), J. C. Colquhoun (vice-captain), G. Rogers (pro.), W. Rogers, F. Rogers, W. B. Layan, J. E. Mill, H. Bond, B. D. Gardener, J. C. Hare, R. J. Holman, J. Peters, J. Littlejohn, W. Toms, and the two Hoskings.

A splendid list of fixtures has been arranged, and lovers of cricket may look forward to many enjoyable Saturday afternoons at Hoskear.

#### Redruth

The cricket season in Redruth, which opens on Saturday, is being anticipated with great interest, as there is every indication that the local club's playing prospects are distinctly brighter than last year.

A number of promising young players gained valuable experience last season, and this year the playing strength should be considerably augmented. It is pleasing to hear that W. E. Nicholls hopes to turn out regularly. He has been elected captain of the 1st XI, a position which formerly he held for a number of years. W. H. Pearce should make an enthusiastic vice-captain. He is a young player of great promise. Last season the club dispensed with the services of a full-time professional, but the members have again reverted to their former practice, and have engaged Sidney Reid, who spent three years on the Netts County ground staff at Trent Bridge. It is confidently hoped that this young all-rounder will render good service to the club. He has commenced his work on the ground at Trewirgie, which is in excellent condition. The very valuable assistance of W. D. Cory will again be a great asset to the side, for whom this will be his seventh playing season. With the exception of P. H. Kendall, who has secured a post on the Devon County ground staff at Exeter, all last season's players are available, and the side will be strengthened by the return of Roy Jennings, who was absent last season through being a tour in New Zealand and Australia with the British Rugby XV. New players, including a son of Bishop Auckland, who comes with a good reputation. Both sides have been entered in the Cornwall League Competitions.

The 2nd XI, with a wider choice of players, and under the captaincy of W. H. Griffin, with P. J. Herbert as vice-captain, should provide strong opposition to Western Junior League sides. In addition to full League programmes, the club has "friendly" matches arranged with Falmouth, Fowey, Penzance, Newquay, The Lizard, and Penryn. The Whiston week-end games are league fixtures with Camborne and Turo. Two other interesting fixtures at Trewirgie are those of May 20th and June 22nd, when Barmy vs. Barmy XI. play Lloyd's Park XI. (Cornwall). The opening match on Saturday is a "friendly" with Falmouth. The hon. secretary (Mr. Clifton Clark) will be pleased to hear from new members.

### BRIGHT OUTLOOK AT PENZANCE

Penzance prospects for the season are considered to be good, despite the fact that the club will not have the services of Claude Carter. He is in Africa, and his absence will be a serious loss to the county. Last season he was the most successful bowler, both for county and club. C. Shaw Baker is again captain, with Sid Rust as vice-captain. Except for Carter, last season's players are available, and a useful accession should be C. May, who is now living at Penzance. He previously played for Morvah, and last Saturday, in playing for the captain's team against the vice-captain's XI, showed fine form, both with bat and ball. May took seven wickets for 32 runs, and made 17 runs.

The club will again have the services of Ollerenshaw and Frank Whiting. Although in the veteran stage Whiting will be found to be a bowler to be reckoned with. On Saturday he obtained seven wickets for 57. A valuable accession to the batting strength will be the re-appearance of Orgao, who did not play last season, and has returned from Egypt.

## CRICKET.

### CORNWALL V. DEVON.

#### A DRAWN GAME.

The sky was overcast at Truro on Friday morning, when the game between Cornwall and Devon commenced. The ball was in fine condition. Sir J. H. Amory, the Devon skipper, won the toss and elected to bat first. Outram and Williamson opened the innings, the latter taking first over from Ollerenshaw, of Penzance. With only eight runs on the board, Outram was bowled by Whiting, also of Penzance. Williamson was now joined by Falding. Out of the first six overs Whiting had four runs. The Devonshire men were not comfortable, and merely decorated their wickets. So slow was the cricket, and of such superiority was the bowling, that Williamson took half an hour to make one run. J. E. Mill, of Camborne, now took on from Ollerenshaw, and with his second delivery, clean bowled Falding. Falding's place was taken by W. W. Hoare. G. Rogers, of Camborne, was fielding brilliantly. Williamson, who was eventually bowled by Mill, only made two runs after a 70 minutes' stay at the wicket. When Capt. Butler went in the score was 21 runs for three wickets. Hoare began to brighten things up a bit for Devon, and made some good leg strokes. Butler succumbed to an exceptionally good ball from Mill, who was in great form with the ball. He bowled Sir J. H. Amory before the latter could open his score. Hoare was playing by far the best innings as yet, hitting well on the leg side. Whiting, who had had only 34 runs scored off his 15 overs (seven of which were maidens) was taken off, and Ollerenshaw took over. The Penzance veteran had been bowling for an hour and 20 minutes. Organ received applause when he stopped a stinger from L. E. Goldie. Ollerenshaw replaced Mill at the top end, and the change was successful, for, with his first ball he shattered Hoare's wicket. Hoare's 39 considerably improved Devon's position. A. F. C. Kitchen had difficulty in dealing with Whiting, and a little later, Goldie's leg stump was knocked down by Ollerenshaw. Kitchen scored on the leg, but runs still came slowly. Price was out to a marvellous piece of fielding on the part of Ollerenshaw, who dropped full length on the ground. Just before lunch, Addicoat caught Kitchen, on Whiting's bowling, and the score stood at 80 runs for 5 wickets. Resuming after lunch, Warfield and French were facing the bowling of Ollerenshaw and Whiting. Devon's tail began to wag, when Warfield hit a nice 4—perhaps the best seen for the day. At this point, the first bye in the game was recorded. The Cornishmen were very keen on the field, Ollerenshaw stopping a stinger which Warfield had meant to cut through the slips. Mill now went on again at the top end in place of Ollerenshaw, and Devon's innings closed when Mill captured Warfield's wicket. The latter had been responsible for a fine innings of 21.

#### CORNWALL AT THE WICKETS.

Gary and Rogers opened the innings for Cornwall against the bowling of French and Amory, and, with the first ball of the second over, the Redruth man was cleaned bowled by French. His place was filled by P. C. Organ, who made some good hits, in particular a fine cut between cover point and the first slip, which went for 3. Falding was taken off and Warfield went on in his stead. Rain came on again at 5.45 and further play was impossible.

#### SATURDAY'S PLAY.

Goldie stopped a hit from Whiting nicely, and the Devon bowlers were doing well. At last Whiting was caught by Falding off Warfield, and his place was taken by Mill, who made a fine drive to the boundary. Mill was caught by Goldie off Warfield just after. The Cornish innings closed for 172. Devon in their second innings made 124 for eight wickets.

# CORNWALL LEAD DEVON ON FIRST INNINGS

The break in the weather held up the county match between Cornwall and Devon, at Truro, on Saturday, when play was not resumed until late in the afternoon. The prospect of a definite decision being obtained in the limited time was remote, and the game was destined to end in a draw. Cornwall taking major points for the first innings' lead. An excellent wicket had been prepared on the Truro School ground, thanks to Dr. E. H. Maxson, principal of the school, who, with his staff, made admirable arrangements for the comfort of the teams and spectators. There was a good attendance on Friday, and it was unfortunate that the weather was so unpropitious on Saturday, especially as the county club is badly in need of funds.

Devon made an inglorious start. Outram being clean bowled by Whiting, with only eight runs on the board, after nearly 20 minutes' play. Scoring was dead slow. Williamson batting very sedately, as will be gathered from the fact that he took 45 minutes to collect two runs. When Mill went on in place of Ollerearnshaw he got Williamson's wicket with the fourth ball of his first over. Two wickets had fallen for 17 runs, and at 24, Falding was bowled by Mill, whose effective bowling suggested further trouble for the Devon batsmen. Whiting also bowled a capital length, sending down five successive maiden overs. Capt. Buller and W. W. Hoare settled down prominently, but a separation was effected at 31, Mill beating Capt. Buller. The visiting captain, Sir J. H. Amory, succumbed to the same bowler's next delivery, half the side being out for 34. Then Goldie and Hoare stemmed the tide, putting on 31 runs before Ollerearnshaw disturbed Hoare's wicket after contributing a valuable 39 runs. Five runs later Addicoat smartly caught Kitchen behind the wicket, off Whiting. Just before the lunch interval Ollerearnshaw brought off a spectacular catch by falling and taking with one hand a sharp return from Price. Devon had nine wickets down for 30 runs at the interval, but Warfield and French made a valuable last wicket stand, carrying the score to 107 before Warfield fell a victim to Mill, who had been brought on again, in place of Ollerearnshaw. The Cornish bowling and fielding left nothing to be desired, the stumps being several times upset by well-judged returns by the fieldsmen. Addicoat shaped excellently as wicket-keeper, conceding only two byes. Mill made a successful return to the county side, claiming five wickets for 28 runs—at one period his analysis was four for eight—and Ollerearnshaw and the veteran Whiting also did creditably.

Cornwall received a setback on going in to bat, losing Cory for three runs. Organ (and Rogers, and the pair batted steadily, but at 23 the Lancashire pro. was bowled by Amory. Barnicoat became associated with his clubmate, and the pair batted enterprisingly. The spectators were just becoming expectant of a profitable stand, when Organ got in front of a ball from Amory, and was out for obstruction. The score was then 38 for three wickets. Organ having contributed 18. Cornwall was faring none too well. Barnicoat and Cunneen being sent back, and five wickets were down for 61. The home county's outlook was brightened by Addicoat and Stephens, who sparkled in a partnership that produced 62 runs, and Devon's total was passed before this pair was parted. Stephens was bowled by Price, after making 27, the total then being 123 for six wickets. For these two players to obtain these runs and gain for Cornwall a first innings' lead was a praiseworthy achievement. The spectators appreciated the sporting action of the Devon captain, who, when rain was falling heavily, insisted upon playing on until Cornwall got the necessary half-a-dozen runs to take the lead. Then followed a short stoppage of play, and Cornwall carried their score to 134 without further loss. Addicoat being 45 not out, and Ollerearnshaw 10 not out. Rain again stopped play for the day just before six o'clock. Cornwall then being 27 runs ahead, with four wickets in hand.

## CORNWALL V. BERKSHIRE.

### SENSATIONAL BOWLING BY PENANCE PRO.

#### CORNWALL'S BATTING FAILURE.

The sky was very overcast at Camborne on Friday morning, when play between Cornwall and Berkshire commenced. There had been some rain during the night, but the wicket was in a much better condition than might have been expected. Nevertheless, it looked as if it might crack in some places.

Cornwall batted first on an easy wicket, and W. D. Cory and J. C. Haye opened the innings, facing two fast bowlers in the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and H. L. Lewis.

Cory took the first over from Remnant, but it was a maiden.

Haye opened the scoring with a delightful late cut off Smith. Haye did all the scoring, and out of the first 10 he claimed 9, including a 4 over the bowler's head. Cory gratefully accepted a short ball from Smith and drove him to the left boundary. Two balls later, he was completely deceived by a ball that must have broke a foot from the off. Cory had only made 5 out of 17.

When W. J. Addicott joined Haye, Smith was turning the ball from the off in a remarkable fashion. With the score at 21, he tempted Haye to hit out, and he was nearly caught.

Addicott was never comfortable, and he was finally jerked by R. J. Remnant, when the score was 28.

Haye was still batting confidently, and had made 21. He had a summer life, however, at 30, when he was missed in the slips.

Rogers (16) started well with a 4, but at 44, Haye, in planning a ball from Remnant, turned it into the hands of P. F. Remnant, fielding at square leg. Haye had compiled a very useful 25.

After three-quarters of an hour's play Smith was taken off and W. Y. Whitburn went on.

Ollerearnshaw drove Whitburn to the boundary and just failed to do it again with the next ball.

After an hour's play, 60 runs were on the board and three men back in the Pavilion. Rogers had made 14 of these, but hit out at a ball from Whitburn and was caught by P. F. Remnant.

Just after 8, Barnicoat came in, Ollerearnshaw hit two beautiful 6's in the same over off Remnant, one of them going out of the field. He attempted another big hit off Whitburn, but fell a victim to a fine piece of stumping by D. W. Stokes. Ollerearnshaw had made a bright 21, and looked as if he was well set.

Half of the team were out for 77. H. S. Stoneman did not have a long stay, for when he had got 3, he was out lbw to Remnant.

A. Angwin (St. Just) came in, and began to score quickly, sending up the century after play had been in progress one and a half hours.

At 107 Woodburn gave way to Smith and Cottrell took over from Remnant. The change was successful, for Cottrell got Barnicoat caught by Sayles when the latter had reached 30. Barnicoat had batted very well, and he and Angwin had put on 36 runs. L. Lowry was soon out, being caught by Smith at mid-on from Woodburn's bowling, while Angwin was caught behind the wicket by Stokes, off the same bowler. Angwin's 23 was a very good effort. Beecher Williams, the last man, came in and stopped a six off his second ball. He hit a four from Cottrell, but was clean bowled by the next delivery. The Cornwall innings closed for 143.

R. J. Remnant and H. L. Lewis opened for Berkshire, facing J. E. Mill and H. S. Stoneman, the latter being hit for four off his first ball. Runs came freely, particularly off Stoneman, who gave way to Ollerearnshaw. The change had its effect, for with his second ball, the Penance "pro" got Remnant caught in the slips by J. C. Haye—a beautiful catch.

The score was 18 for one when P. Remnant went in, and when he was 32, Ollerearnshaw got Lewis to 100 out on off-ball, but two slip fielders were for the catch, and unfortunately collided. Beecher Williams put himself on in Mill's place, but P. Remnant hit him for six. The score mounted steadily, and 50 was reached without further loss. L. Lowry, who displaced Ollerearnshaw, and in his last over shattered Remnant's wicket.

Remnant had contributed 29 out of a total of 54. Major J. L. Carr went in next, and stayed until 73, but he was caught and bowled by Williams, after making eight.

Runs were coming very slowly, and the fourth wicket fell at 93. Norris being caught by J. E. Mill, of Ollerearnshaw. The 100 was reached after two hours' batting, and when 115 were up, Lewis had completed his half-century. Berkshire passed the Cornwall total with a four to the 1st boundary by Woodburn. Lewis and Woodburn took the total to 100, when Woodburn was run out after compiling an excellent 53. Stokes made 8 before he turned a ball from Williams into the hands of Stoneman, who was fielding close in. H. L. Lewis and A. H. Lewis continued to bat carefully sending up 200 after the innings had lasted 5 hours and 30 minutes.

#### SATURDAY'S PLAY.

On Saturday morning's play in the match between Cornwall and Berkshire was marked by a devastating over by Ollerearnshaw, of Penzance.

With four balls he took three wickets, and only had luck prevented him from getting the hat-trick.

When only 2 runs had been added to the overnight total, A. H. Lewis was clean bowled by Ollerearnshaw and off the next ball, G. Sayles was dismissed.

The next ball saw R. Smith missed by Addicott behind the stumps, and this destroyed all hopes of the hat-trick, but off the next delivery the Penance pro shattered Smith's wicket.

H. L. Cottrell joined H. L. Lewis, and they both batted steadily, bringing the total up to 265, when Cottrell snicked Ollerearnshaw, and J. E. Mill caught him in the slips. H. L. Lewis had carried his bat throughout the whole innings, taking four hours to score 62. His innings, though slow, was invaluable to Berkshire.

Ollerearnshaw's analysis was 5 wickets for 50, and Williams' 3 for 62.

#### CORNWALL'S SECOND INNINGS.

Cornwall were 123 runs behind when they started their second innings, and they met with an early disaster. With only 14 runs up, Haye was caught in the slips by R. F. Remnant off Smith's bowling. In Smith's next over, Cory turned ball to A. H. Lewis' hands, and two Cornish wickets had fallen for the meagre total of 15.

Worse was to come, for one run later Addicott was run out.

Smith was in irresistible form with the ball, and when only 19 had been scored, he knocked down Ollerearnshaw's stump.

Things were looking very serious for Cornwall. When Barnicoat came in four wickets had only produced 19 runs. Rogers and Barnicoat made a stand, however, and at 38 Remnant gave way to Woodburn, who eventually tempted Barnicoat and clean bowled him with an off-break.

Half of the side were out for 42, the last partnership having put on 23 runs.

G. Rogers hit more freely after lunch and with a lovely off-drive to the boundary sent up 70. At this point, however, Stokes caught Stoneman behind the wicket off Woodburn.

At 78, Angwin had a go at Woodburn, and was caught by P. F. Remnant in deep near before he had opened his score.

L. Lowry hit a victim to Smith, putting his leg in front of a straight one when the score was 83.

With 4 more added, Mill snicked a ball from Smith into Cottrell's hands.

Williams then joined Rogers, and the two hit merrily for a little while until, at 112, Williams was out lbw. to Woodburn after making 19.

Rogers, who had gone in second wicket down, was not out at the close with 40 to his credit, and this gallant stand saved Cornwall from an even bigger defeat.

## CORNWALL FARE BADLY

### INNINGS WIN FOR BERKSHIRE AT CAMBORNE

When Cornwall and Berkshire commenced their game at Camborne, on Friday, the sky was overcast, but play continued without any interruption, before a good "gate," on an easy, firm, wicket, Cornwall were without their three stalwart veterans, Messrs. H. Treawna, C. Shaw Baker, and Whiting. Beecher Williams returned to captain the side, and, on winning the toss, sent Cory and J. C. Haye (the old Truro man) to open the innings against the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and R. W. Smith. Haye opened the scoring with a late cut off the fast bowler (Smith), and in the next over drove Remnant to the pavilion railings for the first boundary. When the score had reached 10, Cory hooked a short ball from Smith to the leg boundary, but was bowled in the same over with a ball he made no attempt to play. W. J. Addicoot was clean bowled by a yorker from Remnant, with the score at 24 for two, which was not satisfactory on an easy wicket. Haye continued to score, thanks to a bad let off in the "gully" by the Hon. P. F. Remnant, who, however, atoned for the blunder by bagging him in the next over at short leg, off his brother's bowling. Rogers was joined by Ollerearnshaw, and both commenced to settle down quickly. Sixty was signalled after an hour. Ollerearnshaw lifted Remnant into the pavilion enclosure for two successive 6's, but was immediately afterwards smartly stumped by Stokes in attempting to repeat the stroke off Dr. Woodburn. Half the side was out for 77 runs. S. Barnicoat scored all around the wicket with some well-placed shots. Stoneman did not face the bowling at all well, and soon got in front of a straight one from Remnant. Barnicoat was joined by Andrew Angwin, of St. Just, and runs came at a good pace from both men. This stand added 36 runs, which was the best effort of the Cornish innings, and was beautiful of bright, clean, and crisp shots. Lawrey was soon caught in attempting to hit Woodburn, Beecher Williams, the last man in, immediately hit Dr. Woodburn for a six, and in his next over elicited Cottrell to the boundary for four, and in attempting to repeat the stroke with the next ball, was yorked. The innings closed for 142.

Berkshire opened with Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and H. L. Lewis, the attack being entrusted to J. E. Mill and H. S. Stoneman. Runs came freely, particularly off the left-hander (Stoneman), who was replaced by Ollerearnshaw, whose second delivery got Remnant to edge a fast one in the slips, which was well held by Haye. The Hon. P. F. Remnant commenced to score freely, and with the score at 31, Lewis nibbled at one of Ollerearnshaw's, which went to the slips, and Haye got his left hand to it, but failed to hold it. L. Lawrey, of Truro, replaced the Penzance man, and in his first over bowled Remnant, who had contributed 29 out of 54. Major J. L. Carr stayed until 73, when he was caught and bowled by Williams after making eight. Morris was caught at mid-off by Mill, off Williams' bowling, when 93 was signalled. Dr. Woodburn joined H. L. Lewis, and both men continued to bat carefully, and with the score at 164, Woodburn was run out, after making a very valuable 53, which included six 4's. This wicket yielded 71 runs. A. H. Lewis commenced to score all round the wicket immediately with delightful free shots and great power. H. L. Lewis sent up the 200 after the innings had lasted three hours and twenty minutes. The home captain changed his attack frequently, but without effect, and at the end of the day's play Berkshire had scored 222 for six wickets.

Berkshire resumed their innings on Saturday with H. L. Lewis (72 not out), and A. H. Lewis (33 not out). Ollerearnshaw, with the fifth ball of his first over, clean bowled A. H. Lewis with a beautiful length ball. G. Sayles was bowled with the last ball of the over. R. W. Smith, with the first ball of Ollerearnshaw's next over, offered a catch to Addicoot, who made a gallant effort to hold it, but failed to enable the Penzance professional to achieve the "hat trick." The next ball, however, Ollerearnshaw bowled Smith. H. L. Cottrell and H. L. Lewis batted steadily and accurately, bringing the score from 226 to 265, when Cottrell nicked Ollerearnshaw in the slips, and Mill brought off a good catch. H. L. Lewis carried his bat, taking over four hours to compile 92 not out. It was, though very slow, a great effort and invaluable to his side.

Cornwall commenced their second innings 123 runs behind. With only 14 runs recorded, they met with early disaster—Haye being nicely caught in the slips by R. J. F. Remnant off the fast bowler, Smith. With only another run scored, Cory was well caught by A. H. Lewis, off Smith. Further disaster followed immediately. Addicoot being out in trying to make an impossible run, Ollerearnshaw was clean bowled by Smith very quickly—the score being 10 for four wickets. Barnicoat and Rogers stopped the rot well, but, at 38, the Penzance man was bowled by Woodburn, the partnership having yielded 23. Rogers scored more freely after lunch, and with a beautiful shot through the covers, sent up 70. Stoneman was nicely caught by Stokes off Woodburn. Angwin had "a go" at the doctor, and was caught in the deep by P. F. Remnant for a "duck." Lawrey, of Truro, not in front of

a straight one in endeavouring to turn Smith to leg, and the score 83 for eight was recorded. When four further runs had been made, Mill edged Smith, and was well held by Cottrell in the slips. The skipper, R. Williams, joined Rogers when the score was 87 for nine, and the pair hit merrily, until at 112 Williams obstructed Dr. Woodburn's straight ball. ## CORNWALL COLLAPSE

### UNEVEN BATTING AGAINST SURREY II.

BY OUR OWN REPORTER.

Up to lunch time at the Oval yesterday, when they had 119 on the board for the loss of four wickets, Cornwall looked like making a fine show against the Surrey second eleven. A collapse set in, however, and by about 3 o'clock the visitors were all out for 153.

Surrey passed this total with four wickets in hand, and at the close of play had established a lead of 39 runs, with two wickets to fall.

The feature of the cricket was the splendid bowling of Lock and Geary for Surrey after lunch, and a long spell by Whiting for Cornwall.

Overnight rain did not delay the start, and on winning the toss Cornwall for a time did well on a soft pitch. Indeed, Tresawna and Cory forced the pace to such purpose that 57 runs were hit up in just over half an hour before Cory, who hit three 4's, was caught in the gully. Only a single had been added when Tresawna was lbw to a ball that kept low.

#### WELL-TIMED DRIVES.

The Cornwall captain, no doubt realizing that the pitch might become difficult, attacked the bowling in wholehearted fashion, and mainly by well-timed drives he hit six 4's in scoring 34 out of 58. Barnicoat stayed with Stoneman while 39 were put on for the third wicket, and when he was caught at mid-off three men were out for 97. Rogers soon fell to a slip catch, and it was after Stoneman and Wills had carried the total to 130 that Lock and Geary, in a destructive spell of bowling, finished off the Cornwall innings in half an hour, the last five wickets being surrendered with a palfrey 23 runs.

Stoneman, Addicoat, and Ollerearnshaw were all dismissed with the total 138, and with Whiting being stumped through overbalancing himself in playing forward, only Angwin showed real ability to cope with the medium-paced deliveries of Lock and Geary.

Stoneman, who went in third wicket down, was sixth to leave, just as he reached his half century. Making his runs out of 81 by cuts, drives, and pulls, Stoneman claimed half a dozen 4's, and apart from a chance to Geary in the gully when 33, his batting was quite free from fault. Keeping a splendid length and ably supported in the field, Lock took 5 wickets for just under 10 runs apiece, and in his last spell after lunch the Surrey man dismissed four batsmen for 18 runs.

When Surrey started batting at 3.15 Cook and Mobey hit up 21 in 8 minutes before the former was lbw, and in the next three-quarters of an hour Mobey and Barling added 50 runs for the second wicket. Mobey, who fell to a catch at square-leg, hit five 4's in his 35, while Barling, obtaining the same number of runs, claimed a 6 and five 4's, being out to a beautiful running catch by Rogers, who ran from long-off to long-on to judge a terrific skier perfectly.

#### HARD BATTING.

After this, when the pitch became obviously difficult, Wilson hit daringly and mainly by on-drives he got the ball to the boundary eight times in scoring a rapid 40. Fishlock, the Crystal Palace footballer, also hit with good effect, once driving a ball from Whiting out of the ground into the street. Nicely caught by Rogers at deep square-leg, Fishlock claimed a 6 and six 4's in his 48. So far Whiting, bowling unchanged, has in the course of 33 overs taken five wickets for 86 runs.

## CRICKET

### EXCITING FINISH TO CORNWALL'S MATCH

#### NARROW REVERSE ON STROKE OF TIME

BY OUR OWN REPORTER.

Few matches have produced a more intensely exciting finish than the one at the Oval yesterday, when the Surrey 2nd eleven on the stroke of 6.30 gained a narrow victory over Cornwall by one wicket.

Eighty-nine behind on the first innings, Cornwall, thanks to a splendid innings by Cory, set their opponents 91 to get to win, and with the pitch becoming difficult, after overnight rain, and Ollerearnshaw bowling with such marked success, Surrey were forced to make such an uphill fight that the winning hit was not made until the last two batsmen were together.

Both Ollerearnshaw and Whiting bowled magnificently on a pitch which gave them considerable help. Ollerearnshaw taking 5 wickets at the small cost of 39 runs, and Whiting 2 for 22, while Cornwall are deserving of great congratulations for the superb holding in an effort to try and force a win.

#### PROFITABLE WICKETS.

The Oval having escaped most of the overnight storm, Surrey entered upon the final stage of the game 39 runs ahead with two wickets to fall. Naturally the pitch was dead. Baldwin, who had gone in overnight, forced the game with such success that the two outstanding wickets put on 50 runs before the innings closed for 242.

Last out, Baldwin hit up his 45 out of 83, and among his figures were a 6 and four 4's. Bowling unchanged through an innings which extended to upwards of 4 hours, Whiting kept a splendid length, sending down 40 overs and taking half the Surrey wickets for 107.

#### CORNWALL'S SECOND VENTURE.

On Cornwall going in at noon the pitch certainly gave the bowlers a measure of assistance, and the total was only 15 when Tresawna was lbw to Geary for the second time in the match. However, Stoneman joined Cory in a second wicket stand that produced 30 runs, and at lunch time Cornwall were 5 runs behind with 8 wickets to fall.

Cory up to this stage had mastered a keen attack, and with Barnicoat timing his strokes well, he by bright cricket obtained 29 of the 50 runs added for the third wicket. A smart slip catch disposed of Rogers, and Angwin being out a run later, half the Cornwall side were out for 110. A stubborn stand between Cory and Wills, which yielded 40 runs, improved the visitors' prospects, but subsequently the batting broke down, the four outstanding wickets going down in about half an hour for 29 runs.

#### CORY'S FINE EFFORT.

Opening the innings, Cory was seventh to leave. He made his 72 out of 154 in, roughly, 2½ hours. Driving and hitting to leg with great certainty, Cory so far as could be seen did not give a chance, and included in his figures were six 4's and a 3.

Lock and Geary again bore the brunt of the bowling for Surrey, the former, by taking 5 for 61, bringing his record for the match to 10 wickets for 12 runs apiece, while Geary in the two innings claimed 7 for 116.

When Surrey went in at 20 minutes past 4 they made such a wretched start that Mobey, Cook, and Wilson were dismissed for 11 runs, Ollerearnshaw securing all the wickets in four overs for 2 runs, by bowling the two professionals and getting Cook taken behind the wickets. On Mill relieving Ollerearnshaw at 22 a dozen runs were obtained in the new bowler's first over, Addingham hitting a 4, and Barling a 6. The amateur left at 5.3, and Barling, having batted sedately for 90 minutes for 30, out of 61, was beaten by a splendid ball from Ollerearnshaw.

In this way half the Surrey side were out before 6 o'clock for 67. Wellings was run out 4 runs later, and when the eighth wicket fell at 78 Surrey still required 13 for victory. Baldwin out Whiting square for 4, but when Lock, the last man, came in 8 runs were still wanted, and he and Baldwin knocked them off amid great excitement.

## ABANDONED THROUGH RAIN

### CORNWALL'S GOOD START AGAINST BERKSHIRE

Cornwall's match with Berkshire, at Reading, opened on Friday, when mainly as a result of a splendid third-wicket stand between K. S. Stoneman and S. Barnicoat, who between them were responsible for 137 runs, Cornwall finished up the day's play in an excellent position. At the outset matters went badly for Cornwall, two players being dismissed for five runs. From this point, however, Stoneman and Barnicoat took command, and carried the total to 127 by lunch time. Subsequently, with the total at 138, Stoneman snicked a ball into the wicket-keeper's hands. He made a faultless 72. Barnicoat was eighth to leave, and during a stay of over three hours, he obtained 65 out of 102. Cornwall totalled 203. Before stumps were drawn for the day half the Berkshire side were out for 82.

### BRILLIANT INNINGS FOR CORNWALL

#### DORSET BOWLERS DEIFIED BY ROGERS

Although the Camborne wicket appeared to be easy-paced, Dorset found runs difficult to make against Cornwall yesterday in dull weather, and Cornwall gained a substantial lead.

In 15 minutes Dorset had lost three wickets for but 11 runs, and at lunch time seven wickets had fallen for 97. Ollerearnshaw was one of the chief factors in Cornwall's success, for the wickets which he took in his first short spell put Cornwall definitely on top. He opened the Cornish attack with Whiting, who in his second over bowled Morgan. An uneventful over from each followed, when Ollerearnshaw sent two batsmen back to the pavilion with successive balls. His fourth ball caught the edge of Freeman's bat and was caught by Stoneman in the gully. His next ball completely beat Tovey, but Brockway, a left-hander, prevented the "hat-trick."

#### JUDICIOUS BOWLING CHANGE.

Brockway and Tabor batted steadily, and gave the appearance of making a resolute stand, but a judicious bowling change, in which Mill took the place of Ollerearnshaw, however, had immediate results, Tabor being beaten by a fast off-break. Busk, the incoming batsman, was obviously uneasy with many of Mill's deliveries, though the bowler was not keeping such a consistent length as Ollerearnshaw.

Brockway eventually was out, being beaten by a ball which kicked up, Cory taking a catch at short leg off Mill. Stoneman relieved Whiting, and was responsible for the dismissal of Busk, but Hunt and Fookes defied the attack until lunch.

After lunch Ollerearnshaw resumed at the top end, and after two overs placed one of his slips in the "deep." It was Whiting, however, who had the first success when he bowled Hunt, who essayed a big hit. Weld made runs quickly, but Fookes only scored off loose deliveries. Weld's career came abruptly to a conclusion when, after a few wild attempts to hit, Ollerearnshaw took his leg ball. Harrison, who bats with one hand, combined with Fookes to make a last wicket stand, and carefully they batted to take the score to 149 before Fookes played inside the ball from Mill to be caught at the wicket. Harrison made some beautiful late cuts off Whiting. The innings concluded at 3.10.

#### CORNWALL'S REPLY.

The opening Cornish batsmen, like their opponents, started badly. Cory scored a 3 off Busk's third ball, and Stoneman reached the boundary with his first stroke. Disaster followed quickly in the steps of this triumph, for Stoneman was completely beaten by a short-pitched but fast off-break in Busk's second over, and soon after Barnicoat walked in front of his wicket to a well- pitched ball from the same bowler. Cory was unable to cope with one of Harrison's deliveries, and was bowled, and Holman was caught behind the wicket off the same bowler. Rogers, the Camborne professional, and Tresawna took the score from 9 to 45, when tea was taken at 4.15. Rogers hit three 4's off Busk in one over, resulting in Harrison changing ends.

After tea Tresawna was the first to go, playing inside a ball from Brockway and being caught in slip. With the score approaching 60 Busk took the place of Harrison at the top end. Rogers hit his first ball for a 3, but the change was beneficial, for Ollerearnshaw, in attempting to pull an off-break, was bowled. Rust in the next over was caught by Morgan after the ball had bounced from his hand.

It was with a lucky 4 through the slips that Rogers completed his 50, and later with a fine off-drive he sent up the 100 at 5.15. After Brockway had relieved Busk at the top end Lawry was missed by Busk at mid-off, and later, with a glorious 6 off Harrison, Rogers gave Cornwall the lead. Two balls later Lawry was bowled, and with a neat cut Rogers completed his century at 5.45. Mill was soon caught, but Rogers judiciously managed the bowling and scored freely.

#### ROGERS TO THE RESCUE.

Once more Rogers had come to the rescue of Cornwall, and his innings, apart from the number of runs he made, was of peerless value. His cutting and off-driving was superb, and it was not until after he had completed his 50 did he raise the ball. Towards the end of the innings he drove fearlessly, strengthening Cornwall's position with every stroke, treating each bowler with scant respect. He was "chaired" as he came into the pavilion. ### CORNWALL'S FINE VICTORY

#### INNINGS DEFEAT FOR DORSET

#### BY OUR OWN REPORTER.

Thrusting home the advantage gained by the last-wicket stand of Rogers and Whiting, Cornwall beat Dorset by an innings and 14 runs at Camborne yesterday. Apart from Tabor and Busk the Dorset batsmen showed little enterprise against the steady Cornish attack.

It was just on 3.30 when Weld skied a ball to Cory at cover point, and Cornwall left the field victorious. But until Rogers began his great innings of 151 Dorset appeared to have the upper hand. Rogers continued merrily on his way when play was resumed at 11 o'clock. His first run enabled him to pass his own record total of 153 (the highest made for Cornwall in county cricket), and it was not long before the score of 166 was passed, which was the highest ever made at Camborne; this was made by Silverlock, a Monmouth professional. Shortly before Rogers was bowled, when he played over a well pitched-up ball from Harrison, he was twice beaten by two beautiful deliveries from Busk which "came back."

He contributed just 99 short of the whole Cornish side's total in actual runs. His chief asset, however, was that he bound the side together. If he had failed there is no doubt Cornwall would have collapsed. With all attention focussed upon Rogers, Whiting was almost neglected. Every moment, almost, was expected to be his last, but rarely did he seem at loss with the bowling. He exploited some forcing drives when opportunity was granted, but generally he left the scoring to Rogers.

#### MILL'S WICKETS.

Dorset appeared to start comfortably. Morgan and Fookes took no risks, but never neglected to punish a loose ball. Ollerearnshaw and Whiting again opened the attack, but the latter was soon taken off and Lawry substituted. The slow bowler had an immediate success, for with two appeals for lb w against Fookes the second was allowed. Shortly after, Morgan, who had made some delightful leg strokes off Ollerearnshaw, put his leg in front of the wicket.

Disaster which turned into immediate triumph overtook Cornwall. Ollerearnshaw in fielding split his third finger nail badly on his bowling hand, and Mill took his place.

In four overs Mill disposed of three batsmen for four runs—a boundary hit. The first over was a maiden, with the last ball of his next he bowled Freeman, in the next Tovey hit a four and was then bowled, and in the fourth over Rust took Brockway low down at the wicket.

After the lunch interval Mill and Stoneman resumed the attack. The latter, bowling left arm round, had only a square-leg and mid-on on the leg side, with Rogers in the deep. Two slips were in close, and Tabor fell into the trap. He chopped a ball into Ollerearnshaw's hands, but to the consternation of the crowd the catch was dropped.

#### BOWLING CHANGES.

Tresawna made repeated bowling changes. Whiting went on in place of Mill, and Lawry took Stoneman's place. The field gradually encroached during Whiting's bowling. Two slips, a gully, and two short legs were all eager to take any catch which might be offered them. When Busk had come in the board showed 42 runs for the loss of five wickets, and it was after he had sent up the 100 with a single that he stepped in front of his wicket in playing Whiting and was out lb w. He had played a true captain's innings at a critical period.

It was Whiting who captured the next wicket, Tindall failing to get on top of a good length ball, and giving a catch to Mill low down at mid-on. The catch over, Stoneman having replaced Lawry at the bottom end, Rust cleverly stumped Tabor, who had reached forward.

Dorset were now fighting to make the necessary runs to save an innings defeat. Weld was obviously uneasy with Stoneman's bowling. Hunt, trying to turn Stoneman to leg, was caught at short leg by Cory, and Harrison came in with 25 runs to make to save the innings defeat. This did not happen, for Weld, after a few off-drives, mistimed his hit and was caught. Scores:—

## DUCHY INDEBTED TO OLLEREARNSHAW

### GREAT PERFORMANCE AGAINST SURREY II.

Cornwall are indeed fortunate in their players. When they are in danger of collapsing one batsman or another comes to the rescue and averts a catastrophe.

At Camborne recently it was Rogers, and yesterday at Penzance it might be said that Ollerearnshaw, the local professional, won the first innings points for Cornwall. In batting he prevented a collapse, and in bowling he accounted for eight of the Surrey II. batsmen.

Six Cornish wickets fell for but 38 runs when Ollerearnshaw and Baker came together, but this pair made a great stand. Lock was a destructive factor in the Surrey attack. He was responsible for the dismissal of the majority of the earlier Cornish batsmen, and after lunch took four wickets in seven balls for no runs.

Play commenced at 11 o'clock, the weather being in direct contrast to that of Monday, the sun shining gloriously. Cornwall batted first, but Cory was sent back to the pavilion without a run on the board. Rogers started brightly, but did not stay long, returning a ball into Lock's hands. Barnicoat skied a ball to deep mid-off and was out without scoring. After a few good strokes Stoneman appeared to be completely beaten by a fast leg break from Stroud, and was bowled middle stump.

#### OLLEREARNSHAW HITS OUT.

That the bowling could be hit was soon proved by Ollerearnshaw. He punished Geary before lunch when matters appeared to be black for the home county, hitting a 6 and a 4, and he then commenced to do his utmost to knock Lock off his length.

At one stage Lock had had 19 overs with only 20 runs scored off him, and although Ollerearnshaw hit him for a 4 and a 2 in his 20th over he was not to be denied.

Collins had played a valuable part in stopping the rot, and he took almost 70 minutes to make his five. In a true captain's manner Baker came to the rescue of Cornwall. Ollerearnshaw was by no means certain in his tactics, and many an intended straight or off drive went to fine leg. But it proved to be a case of fortune favouring the brave. After his brief spell of hitting Ollerearnshaw made his runs mostly by singles and 2's.

The Surrey fielding was consistent, a notable feature being the quick returns to the wicket.

The Surrey innings made one wonder as to the state of the wicket. Yet the ball did not seem to kick in the slightest, and each batsman who went in did not appear to be in difficulties, although they treated the bowling with utmost respect.

#### THREE QUICK WICKETS.

Wickets fell quickly, and after Ollerearnshaw and Whiting had changed ends the former got three quick wickets. Barling batted steadily with Haddington, but Whiting's perseverance was rewarded when Haddington got under a ball to give an easy catch to Stephens. Fishlock hit two 4's off Baker, and Barling was missed by Whiting, but in the next over Fishlock skied a ball to Rogers.

Ollerearnshaw resumed from the top end after tea, and in a few overs Baldwin's stumps were just touched with sufficient strength to dislodge a ball, and Barling was clean bowled with a " Yorker." An in-swinging must have accounted for Stroud, for he stepped across his wicket to be bowled middle stump.

Geary collected a six in each of Ollerearnshaw's next two overs. Mill took the place of Whiting, and Ollerearnshaw missed Geary in the slips off his first over. Geary continued to hit merrily, the scoreboard showing 106 when he was bowled off his pads by Ollerearnshaw. He and Whitfield had put on a valuable 50, and it almost appeared as if Surrey II. would be able to knock off the required runs. The very next ball of Ollerearnshaw's, however, accounted for Lock, and Cornwall gained the first innings points.

The game was most keen and the teams were very well matched. Had two days' play been possible there is no doubt a definite result would have evolved. The most notable performance of the day was that of Ollerenshaw, who saved Cornwall with a splendid innings of 64, and skittled out eight of the Surrey men for the modest total of 48 runs.

## AN UPHILL BATTLE

### CORNWALL BEAT SURREY 2nd XL ON FIRST INNINGS

Cornwall's concluding match with Surrey 2nd XL, champions of the Minor Counties Competition, was limited to one day. Owing to rain, play was impossible on Monday, but when the game was commenced, at Penzance, on Tuesday, the weather was fine, and an absorbing day's cricket was provided. The game was destined to end in a draw, as little short of a miracle could have brought about a definite result, and the objective of both sides was to obtain major points for the first innings' lead. There was a stern battle, not without critical periods for both teams, and the outcome was a meritorious triumph for Cornwall on the first innings. The hero for Cornwall was Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance professional, who excelled both with the bat and the ball. Going in to bat at a time when Cornwall's prospects were gloomy, he attacked the Surrey bowling, in partnership with Shaw Baker, and knocked up 64 out of a total of 126. He followed up that by taking eight Surrey wickets for 38 runs. Surrey were not without outstanding performers, Lock taking eight wickets for 36 runs, and Geary, who knocked up 47 runs.

Winning the toss, Cornwall batted first on a wicket that did not turn out to be easy for the batsmen, and for considerable periods the rate of scoring proved rather tedious. Things went badly for Cornwall from the start, Cory being bowled before a run was scored, and at 15 Rogers was caught and bowled by Lock. Without any addition to the score, Barnicoat was sent back. Collins, of Falmouth, and Stoneman batted steadily, but runs were difficult to get, the Surrey fieldsmen being well placed, and after 45 minutes' play only 20 runs were on the board. When the score reached 26, after one hour's batting, Stoneman fell a victim to Stroud, Ollerearnshaw joined Collins, the latter showing a wonderful defence at a time when steadiness was invaluable. He was at the wicket for over an hour, making five runs, before being bowled by Lock. Half the side was out for 34, after 75 minutes. Stephens was out four runs later, and then followed a transformation. With Ollerearnshaw and Shaw Baker together, the rate of scoring improved, Ollerearnshaw living up things by hitting Geary into the Cemetery for six, and in the same over he twice hit the same bowler to the boundary. This caused the Surrey fielders to be spread out for the first time, and when 50 was registered, there was a double change in the bowling. Stroud and Lock coming on. ## CORNWALL COUNTY CLUB'S RECORD

### PERFORMANCES WITH BAT AND BALL

The result of the season's play in the Minor Counties' competition may be considered satisfactory by Cornwall County Cricket Club.

Rain seriously interfered with the programme. The game with Devon at Exeter could not be started, and that with Surrey II. at Penzance was confined to one day. In addition, other games, both at home and away, were handicapped by the weather conditions. Further, the county were not favoured by any undue share of luck in several cases. First innings points were lost to Dorset by four runs, and the game at the Oval might quite well have been a win instead of a loss.

Perhaps the best performances were those against Surrey II. At the Oval the game was exceedingly close, whilst at Penzance Cornwall obtained the first innings points. The latter was largely due to Ollerearnshaw's fine all-round form. In addition to a valuable innings of 64, he bowled so well as to get eight wickets for 38 runs. The two games lost were against Berkshire and Surrey II.

The record is—Matches played, 8; won, 1; lost, 2; won on first innings, 3; lost on first innings, 1; no result, 1; position on the Minor Counties table, 17th out of 23, with a percentage of 40.

Of the counties met by Cornwall, Surrey II. finished second, with a percentage of 76; Berkshire 14th, percentage 42.85; Dorset 15th, percentage 42.85; and Devon 23rd, percentage 17.14.

#### BEST ALL-ROUND PLAYER.

The batting records are not so impressive as in some seasons, but that is partly accounted for by the absence of fast scoring wickets this season. Rogers (G.) and Cory have been the main scorers, whilst Stoneman and Barnicoat are establishing themselves as regular members of the side. O. S. Baker has been unable to play except in one game, in which he gave valuable assistance.

The bowling has been shared by Ollerearnshaw, Whiting, and J. E. Mill, and the first-named 40 wickets for an average of 10 runs per wicket is a wonderfully good performance. Ollerearnshaw is the outstanding all-round cricketer in the county for 1931, and is re-engaged by Penzance for next season.

Whiting and Mill have ably seconded his efforts. The latter has had his first extended trial for Cornwall, and has done reasonably well. Several young players—Angwin, Hays, Holman, Stevens, Lawry, and Collins—have had a trial, but have not yet obtained a real footing in county cricket. Collins, however, appears to have the right temperament, and should prove himself of considerable value in the next few seasons.

The Colts made a very good showing in the game with Devon Colts at Liskeard. Harry (Redruth), Barnes (Truro), and Carlyon (Winchester) are all-rounders of considerable promise, whilst Heath (Clifton) is a very attractive young batsman.

#### FIXTURES DIFFICULTY.

Cornwall may experience considerable difficulty in the matter of fixtures for 1932. The unexpected announcement of the curtailing of fixtures by Surrey II. and the uncertainty in the case of Berkshire are a distinct embarrassment to Cornwall. It is to be hoped that a county with such a long association as Cornwall has had with the Minor Counties' competition will not have to drop out through inability to get the required minimum of four home and away fixtures. This could be obviated and considerable expense saved if the group Devon, Wilts, Dorset, Monmouth, and Cornwall could be set up as a minimum arrangement. It would be interesting to hear the views of cricket interests in Devon on such a proposal.

The financial position in Cornwall is causing the treasurers some anxiety. The present arrangements for fixtures are very costly, and this year the side has had to make two journeys away. If the four away fixtures could be arranged in one tour it would work out greatly to the advantage of the clubs financially. The Cornwall County Club is very much alive, and anxious and ready to take its part in the competition in 1932, and looks to the other counties to facilitate its arrangements as far as possible to that end.
