The New Zealanders, thanks to a century by Cromb and splendid batting on the offside by Blunt, were able to pass this score with two wickets down. Finally they wound up 71 runs ahead for the loss of six wickets, having scored 216 in 155 minutes.

Had Ellis, however, held a catch, low down at first slip, when Cromb was four and the total 12, we might have seen more of a real struggle, as the early bowling of Howell and Ellis did not show the arst three Tourist batsmen at ease.

first three Tourist batsmen at ease. Cromb, the medium-last bowler who "shocked" the early English batsmen in the Lord's Test last month, was promoted in the batting order to first wicket down, and he showed his appreciation by scoring 105 out of 182 in two hours and 25 minutes. Eather cautious to start with, but scoring neatly and safely by singles and an occasional shot for two to cover and fine leg, he sent the 50 up with the first of the Tourists' boundaries, to square leg, and went on to reach his own 50 out of 105 in 95 minutes, having made another four with a lofted shot to long on.

COUNTY CRICKET.

Innings and Nine Runs Victory for Durham.

Northumberland's Best Effort Comes Too Late.

The Minor Counties Championship match between Durham and Northumberland, at Chester-le-Street, on Monday and Tuesday, proved a real holiday attraction, all the available seating accommodation being occupied on the first day.

Durham were on top throughout, except for the last few hours on Tucsday, and deservedly won by an innings and nine runs a match which was productive

of some very stylish cricket.

Winning the toss, Durham had the first use of a soft wicket, and though they opened cautiously, once they had got the measure of the Northumberland bowling the score rose quickly, the home county finishing the day in a very strong position. In an imnings which lasted 4 hours and 25 minutes they scored 292 runs, leaving Northumberland with 95

minutes to bat before close of play. In that time the visitors lost six wickets for only 65 runs.

From the opening until lunch-time on Monday, the game was slow. Gibbon and C. L. Adamson. Durham's first pair, took no risks with the bowling, scoring only 20 runs off the first 18 overs sens down by the Tynedale pair, Allan and Graham. Indeed, Adamson was at the creese 170 minutes for his 50. Novertheless they laid a solid foundation for Durham's ultimate success, compiling, 106 before they were dismissed.

Carr's Merry Hitting.

Thereafter runs come freely, Jack Carr, Chester-le-Street's former "pro" and now of Blackhall, treating the crowd to some merry hitting, and increasing the score by 36 in 20 minutes. There were five fours in his 27. The fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh wickets fell for 40 runs, a fact which materially reduced Durham's advantage, but the last three put on 44.

Six For 42.

Howell was in deadly form, taking three of the wickets at a cost of only five runs, and returning the excellent analysis of six for 42.

He met with instant success on Tuesday, taking Graham's wicket with the first ball of the day, and getting Atkinson

caught off his fourth.

Northumberland were 216 behind when they opened their second venture—having failed to avert a follow-on—and they met with early disaster, half the side being out for 69 runs. Bruce and Mackay were doing well, having put on 34, when Carr had the latter caught by Hammond. Ord was caught behind the wicket at 35, but 23 was put on by the third wicket pair, Mutch and Bruce. Only three runs were added for the loss of three wickets, making half the visiting side out for 61.

From this point Northumberland made a gallant but unsuccessful effort to avert an innings defeat. Maconachie and March, the sixth wicket pair, defied repeated bowling changes and added 57 before they were separated. Graham and Jeffrey valiantly continued the effort, which would probably have been successful had not the former been unlucky enough to be stumped by James at the wicket-keeper's second attempt. An error of judgment by Jeffrey ended the innings, the batsman being run out following a smart return by Gibbons.

DURHAM'S GREAT WIN AT WOLVERHAMPTON.

Durham gained a brilliant, if unexpected, victory over Steffordshire in the return game at Wolverhampton by six wickets yesterday. Overnight Durham had made 88 for six in reply to Staffordshire's 78, but they actually gained a lead of 12 on the first innings, the last four wickets adding 52, and then dismissed Staffordshire a second time for 63. Requiring only 51 to win Durham secured these to win as stated.

Durhenr have now won four games out of a possible six—there was "no result" the Staffordshire match at West

to the Staffordshire match at West Hartlepool—so that they have a percentage of 66.66. If they beat Lencashire II, this week they will finish up with over 70.00, so that they have not yet lost the Minor Counties' title secured in 1930.
