LEICESTERSHIRE 2nd XI. v. NOTTS. 2nd XI.

The All England Ground at Melton Mowbray was the venue of the Minor Counties Championship match between Leicestershire 2nd XI. and Notts. 2nd XI., the game being played on Whit Monday and Tuesday, before a fair number of spectators. So splendid a recovery did the ground make after the torrential rain of Saturday and Sunday that it was possible to start punctually on Monday. The wicket favoured the bowlers and run making was a matter of considerable difficulty. The only change in the selected teams was that Moult substituted for Shipston on the visiting side.

Winning the toss, Notts, decided to bat first, T. N. Knight and Gunn, the opening pair, being opposed by Bowley (F. G.) and Smuth. Before the score had been opened Knight stopped a straight ball from Bowley with his pads, and so difficult were runs to obtain that the first half hour's play only yielded ten. When Gunn had made 12 out of 17 he hit his wicket in playing back to Bowley, and six runs later Smith clean bowled Knowles and R. D. F. Bland.

An hour's play had only produced 23 runs for four wickets, Smith at that period claiming two for seven and Bowley two for 14. Harris and Copley were then associated in a us fol partnership and the first bowling change vest made at 37. Bishop relieving Smith who h. I sent down 19 overs for 12. Eight runs later Riddington replaced Bowley. When the stand had realised 35 Bishop got Harris Ibw. and the luncheon interval was tal an at 58 for five wickets, two hours having been occupied in obtaining them.

When the game was resumed Bowley and Smith soon finished off the innings, the last five batsmen only collecting 15 runs between them, Moult, the substitute, being responsible for ten of this number. Copley, who added seven to his total after luncheon, was top scorer with 27. Bowley bowled 28 overs for 39 runs and five wickets, Smith 25.2 overs for 27 runs and four wickets, and Bishop six overs for ten runs and one wicket.

Leicestershire made an even more disastrous start, the first three wickets falling when the total stood at five. Bland and Robinson total stood at five. sl:ared the attack and the latter's first four overs yielded two wickets for no runs, then Bland was run out. Bishop and H. T. Sharp, however, gradually pulled the game round in Leicestershire's favour and at 29 Moult came on for Bland, Bishop being missed off him at square leg when he had ten to his credit. Robinson had sent down eleven overs for 13 Roddish, then Oates replaced Moult at 53 and bowled Bishop when the partnership had yielded 56. Riddington and W. H. Bradshaw left at 79 and 76 respectively, but Sharp and Wiggington ways they associated Sharp and Wiggington were then associated in a splendid stand which yielded 82. The former did most of the scoring and obtained a splendid century, marred only by a chance to Moult when he had made 73. When stumps were drawn for the day the total stood at 163 for seven wickets

More rain fell during Monday night, but the ground quickly recovered under the influence of Tuesday morning's sunshine and it was found possible to resume at the advertised time. The three outstanding Leicestershire wickets soon fell to Oates and Robinson, the total reaching 176. Robinson took four wickets for 44, Oates three for 23, Gunn one for nine and Bland one for 26.

Notts, again made a very moderate start in their second venture. Knight and Gunn opened to the bowling of Bowley and Smith and both were out with only ten on the board, and Knowles was sent back at 26. Harris and Bland improved matters somewhat by adding 34, but at the luncheon interval there were six out for 72, so that 20 runs were still required to avoid a single minings defeat. On resuming, Reddish and Oates made a timely stand and had added 45 before the latter stopped a straight ball with his pad. When joined by Wheat, Reddish continued to bat well until

he was unfortunately run out and the innings closed for 135, leaving Leicestershire with only 42 needed for victory. Smith took four wickets for 38 runs, Bowley three for 64, and Bishop two for 27.

Leicestershire fared so disastrously at the outset of their second venture that there were three out for eleven, and when rain caused an adjournment five runs later there was a chance that Notts, might save the game. After a brief delay play was resumed and when Bowley and Wiggington had placed their side within nine runs of victory the tea interval was taken. The required runs were subsequently knocked off without further loss, leaving Leicestershire victorious by seven wickets. Robinson took two for 13 and Oates one for eleven. Score—

HARRY BRADSHAW MAKES THE HIGHEST SCORE.

A Brilliant Innings of 64.

In connection with the Minor Counties Tourney Leicestershire 2nd XI. met Cambridgeshire on the Oakham Town Combridgeshire on the Oakham Town ground on Friday and Saturday, and won by 159 runs. It was the first county cricket match played at Oakham, the capital of the smallest county in England, and there is no doubt that if fine weather had prevailed it would have been very well supported.

Both days were hitterly cold and stormy.

Both days were bitterly cold and stormy, however, and on Friday only a handful of spectators, wearing their winter overcoats, were present. There was a slightly improved attendance on Saturday, but a heavy shower of rain early in the after-noon sent a number of them hurrying homewards.

Admiral arrangements for the match Admiral arrangements for the match were made by the Leicestershire County Club, in conjunction with the Oakham Town Club, and, included among their equipment, Leicestershire brought a large, up-to-date scoring board, which enabled spectators in all parts of the ground to follow the course of the game with ease. Of the twenty-two players taking part chief interest centred on Harry Bradshaw, of Leicestershire, who learned his cricket

of Leicestershire, who learned his cricket at Stamford School, and who occasionally plays for Oakham and Burghley Park. In his first innings Bradshaw was dismissed after scoring 4 runs, but at his second turn at the wickets he gave a magnificent display, hitting up 64, including, seven 4's—the highest score of the match. Bradshaw also saved a number of runs by his splendid fielding.

To some extent Leicestershire owed their victory to Coleman and Smith (right-arm fast bowlers), both of whom were in tip-top form.

In Cambridgeshire's first innings Coleman claimed 6 wickets for 56 runs, and Smith was even more deadly in the second innings. In the course of 18 overs (5 maidens) he obtained 7 wickets for 19 runs—a remarkable performance. after scoring 4 runs, but at his second turn

ALL OUT FOR 61.

At 3.45 o'clock on Saturday afternoon Cambridgeshire commenced their second innings, needing 211 runs to win. Ninety minutes later they were all out for 61! The first day's play was productive of some excellent cricket. Batting first on a wicket which gave
