Further Loss of £130 Last

HOW TOWNSPEOPLE CAN HELP.

Hockey on Ground Next Winter.

What was described as "a most disastrous year" was experienced by the Skegness Cricket and Lawn Tennie Club last season, a loss of £130 being sustained.

This unpleasant fact emerged from the statement of accounts submitted to the annual general meeting of the Club, held at the Lumley Hotel on Thursday evening last, when a further appeal was made to townspeople generally to support the Club better, and an incentive to this is being given by the issue of 10s. season tickets (non-transferable), to admit the holder to all ordinary matches throughout the sesson just commenc-

Mr. C. T. Jessap, M.B.E. (President of the club) presided over a representative standance, this including Mr. Arthur Black (hon. treasurer), Mesdames R. E. Frearson and W. R. Willoock, Dr. A. Wallan, Messrs. A. E. Cheales, B. H. Foster, R. E. Frearson, J. E. Searby, H. R. Searby, Kanrick Monyan, G. H. Randall, W. J. Ridout, W. H. Mackinder H. E. Witty, C. W. Jepson, W. D. Hall, G. Lewin, F. A. Roberts, G. C. Dutton, A. F. Bamber, R. W. Hindhaugh, H. W. S. Osborne, E. H. Heaton, S. Astle, G. H. Black, R. J. G. Dutton, W. R. Willcock, and others. An epology for enforced absence was sent by Mrs. W. D. Hall.

After reading the minutes of the previous meeting, which were confirmed, the Chairman made reference to the proposal to increase the membership fee, which was carried last year. Although this appeared in the minutes it had subsequently to be ruled out, as sufficient notice had not been given in accordance with rule. Those present would have a further opportunity of voting on the matter that evening.

The accounts, which had been duly aud-the by Mr. Kenrick Morgan, were then submitted. The expenditure totalled £568 15a, 3d., the chief items including:—Wages of groundsman and assistant, and State insurances, £225 13a, 6d.; rent, rates and water, £206 16s, 10d.; maintenance of grass and court surfaces, £8 2s, 2d.; cricket and tannis requisites and replacements, £18 2s, 3d.; printing, stationery and advertising, £28 2s, 4d.; secretary's honorarium, £30;

On the income side, subscriptions totalled \$151 16s. 6d.; receipts from grass courts were £98 16s. 9d., and hard courts £57 7s., and the street money brought in £52 0s. 9d., ground lettings £43 5s., and proceeds from Mr. W. Butlin's benefit night £7 6s. 5d.

The balance sheet as at 1st November has showed assets amounting to £224 19s., this including a bank balance of £130 16s.

The Catering Committee had an income £237 6s. 1d., the surplus on the year's working being £40 6s. 5d. The assets total £157 13s. 5d.

Mr. Black, commenting upon the accounts, said he could not say that it gave him pleasure to bring the statement before the meeting. He regretted to say that the substant had had a most disastrous year. On the expenses side, wages showed an increase of £28, but the rent and rates item was down by £21. There was a decrease of £36 or repairs and replacements and also a

decrease of 222 on the purchase of requisites. The printing and advertising bill was 55 in excess of the previous year. The total decrease was £38, and he did not see where further economies could be effected if the ground was to be maintained in proper condition.

So far as income was concerned, subscriptions showed an increase of £16. The Chairman said it was desirable once again to call the attention of townspeeple to the parlous position of the club, which had been such an asset to the town for many years. Residents generally should be implored to come to the assistance of the club and co-operate in maintaining it in the interests of the town. In this connection it had been the practice to send round for subscriptions at the end of the season, and for several years it had struck him that this procedure was wrong; and to meet the case the Committee had decided to issue non-transferable, non-playing members' season tickets at 10s. each. These would admit the holder to all matches excepting County matches, groundsman's benefit and festival games.

Dr. Allan proposed that the town be divided into sections for the purpose of selling these tickets. He felt sure that if the thing were done systematically, benefit would accrue to the club.

Mr. Astle, seconding, said he thought that several people could be persuaded to buy a season ticket.

It was agreed that the Committee get out a scheme on the lines suggested.

Mr. Hall enquired whether something could not be done to improve the entrance to the cricket ground.

The Chairman said the directors of the Cricket Ground Company had refrained from doing anything pending the acquisition of the corner property, which was now settled. The Company had throughout made it a sine qua non that the entrance to the ground shoul be thrown into the Lumley Square, and that would be achieved. Mr. Jeessep informed the meeting that the Cricket Ground Company offered the ground at the same rent as previously, mamely, £180, but when the usual dividend of 5 percent. was paid shareholders were asked if they would help the club by foregoing thoir dividend or returning part of it. He was pleased to state that they had got £21 towards the relief of rent for the current year.

The President said that for several years there had been repeated requests from the Skegness Hockey Club for the use of the cricket ground for matches. Hitherto these requests had been refused, but on the previous Monday the directors received a deputation from the Hockey Club, the outcome of which was that, subject to Lord Scar. brough's concurrence and subject to proper safeguards, they had agreed to let the club the ground for the season 1931-32. They proposed to let it direct to the Hockey Club and that would have a reflection on the rent paid by the Cricket Club the following year.



This week we start what we hope will be a pleasing series of thumbnail sketches, with Mr. A. C. Burton, who is well to the forefront of the alphabet, so to speak, and certainly well in the vanguard of local cricketers.

Coaching may do a good deal, applied to any sport, but for the most part cricketers are born rather than made, and any amount of coach cramming cannot make good the lack of natural gifts.

Mr. A. C. Burton is a talented amateur batsman who has made good use of natural gifts, but it must be said that his success with the bat has not affected his modesty. He is delightfully unassuming. There is not the slightest trace of selfishness in his play, and he possesses the correct temperament, is cool and patient, but seldom fails to severely punish the loose ball and take advantage of slackness on the part of the opposing side. And in addition "Abs" is a thorough sport, both off and on the field.

He commenced his cricketing career while at the Boston Grammar School, and even in his young days made a name for himself. Altogether he played for the School XI, five sensons, and for two of the sensons was Captain. His batting was the outstanding feature of his prowess, and during one year compiled a century—to be precise, 120. Since that time, the only player to pass the hundred mark has been E. Cox, who accomplished this performance two years ago.

Leaving school, "Abs" secured the post as Sports Master at Pannal Ash College, Harrogate, where he stayed for two years, afterwards going to Borough College, London. He was here two years, during which time he played cricket regularly, averaging 36 and 40 per cent. for the respective seasons, which was quite good in view of what strong opposition his side met with. Subsequently leaving London, he went as a member of the scholastic

with. Subsequently leaving London, he went as a member of the scholastic profession, to Beykin-avenue Senior profession, to Beykin-avenue Senior School, Birmingham, and during his six years' stay here, held a prominent position in the batting averages,

assisting the Erdington C.C. with this team, he spent a holiday at Gillingham, and for the Gillingham Danes Hall Club scored over 600 runs, including his second century, 138 not out.

Since that time he has been back in Boston, and a member of the Old Bostonians' C.C., who compete in the Boston League competition, while, in addition, for the past two seasons, he has also assisted Woodhall Spa. For both clubs he has been a prolific rungetter, and for Woodhall last year registered 101 not out against Horncastle. In the return game with the same team, he scored 63.

In the inter-divisional competition, "Abs" has enjoyed the privilege of being a member of the Holland side ever since these game, were inaugurated, and in the match played against East Lindsey last week, he scored 19 out of 73, but for those runs he batted judiciously for over an hour. In the first year of the competition, when Holland won the trophy, he contributed 46 runs.

So far this season, he has done exceedingly well, possessing an average of between 30 and 40 per cent.

Chatting about the sport, he expressed the desirability of seeing something done concerning the re-forming of the old Boston Cricket Club. "There is no reason," he said, "why a first class club should not be formed in the town in the near future, even though ground difficulties are apparently almost insuperable."

Before concluding our brief story of A. C. Burton's sporting career, we would mention that he has been successful in several other spheres. He is a well-known billiards player, being a member of the Conservative Club, while a few years ago he played football, commencing his association with Soccer at school.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE BEATEN BY EIGHT WICKETS.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

Lincolnshire played Cambridgeshire in the Minor Counties Championship at Cambridge on Wednesday and Thursday last. The Lincolnshire team, beating Cambridgeshire easily by eight wickets, won their third successive match in the tourney. This is the best beginning that Lincolnshire has made for many years, and augurs well for their success during the season.

Scholey knocked up 39, at which figure he was held by Hobbs, a nephew of Jack Hobbs, who has appeared in Minor Counties matches on the Skegness Cricket Ground. Lincolnshire were all out for 252, Major Wilson carrying his bat.

FOLLOW-ON FORCED.

Cambridgeshire opened inauspiciously with the dismissal of Hart for 4, and only four of the home players reached double figures, Ayres making the highest contribution of 26 not out. The Cambridge side were all dismissed for 100, Lincolnshire thereby forcing them to follow on 152 in arrears.

NORFOLK FAR TOO GOOD FOR LINCS.

AN INNINGS DEFEAT.

SIXTEEN WICKETS FALL FOR 86 RUNS

For several years Skegness has been chosen as the venue of one of the matches in the Minor Counties' Championship, and county elevens' once again occupied the Cricket Ground last Wednesday and Thursday when Lincolnshire entertained Norfolk.

Scott-Chad and Cant stayed at the wickets for the last 55 minutes and the first day's play ended with Norfolk in a very good position, i.e. 57 runs ahead and six wickets still to go.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

Lincolnshire's position was not exactly favourable when play resumed with Norfolk already 57 runs in hand and six wickets still to fall in their first innings. Scott-Chad and Cant resumed to the bowling of Sutton and Lloyd. The start was sensational, for in Sutton's second over he got Scott-Chad taken at mid-on, while Lloyd proceeded to beat the other overnight not-out with but four runs added to the overnight score. Nichola and R. C. Rought-Rought added 14 for the seventh wicket, but then the Cambridge Blue provided his long 6ft. 6in. vis-a-vis with another wicket. Daley also left one run later, and a sensational incident brought about the dismissal of Nichols, the visiting wicketkeeper. He esayed a hard drive to leg, Dods-fielding at short leg-receiving the full force of the shot on his head. From there the ball ricochetted to Martin fielding ten yards away, at forward mid-on. He made the catch but the ball had cracked Dods' cranium sufficiently hard to necessitate his retirement, along with the outgoing batsman, for medical attention. The remaining wickets fell speedily and the first 35 minutes' play had seen Norfolk's remaining six wkts surrendered for a beggarly 22 runs. Both Sutton and Lloyd bowled very steadily. Seaside wickets are notoriously "peculiar" the dew has worn off, and doubtless the ball turned more quickly than on the previous day's slower wicket.

SEVENTY-NINE RUNS IN ARREAR.

This was a distinctly better position for Lincolnshire than had appeared possible at the close of play the previous evening. It gave Lincolnshire a good opportunity to avoid the major defeat, the system of reckoning Minor Championship points being that an outright win gains the full eight points for the victorious side. If a first innings decision only is reached the side scoring the greater number of runs receives five points and the opposing County three points. The start was auspicious, Walter turning the first ball of the innings from Beadsmore to the leg boundary. It has unfortunately to be recorded that that stroke was the only auspicious incident of the innings. Woodhall Spa batsman was clean bowled by R. C. Rought-Rought with the score at seven, and the innings then developed into a regular "rought" though Rought-Rought did not claim all the wickets! Martin, the old Stamford schoolboy, now installed at the Skegness branch of Barclay's Bank, was missed first ball at the wicket. He stopped in half-an-hour for 12, and the Rev. H. Mack, the ex-Winthorpe Vicar, batted an hour for 17. The two hours during which the innings lasted actually produced 64 runs. Naturally, Rought-Rought, Utting and Falcon did all the flattening bowling figures. The day's play had actually seen 86 runs scored

in 2 hours and 40 minutes, for the loss of sixteen wickets, an average stand of just over five runs per wicket! It was indeed all very disappointing especially as Skegness and District were represented by four players. The game finished at 2.35 p.m. and the spectators who had paid one shilling gradually dribbled off the ground when they realised that no more "county" cricket was to be produced. SKEGNESS CRICKET SEASON.

R. E. Frearson an Outstanding Baisman.

CLUB'S "CURATE'S EGG" ACHIEVEMENTS.

We are again indebted to a well-known local sportsman for the following season's retrospect and the compilation of the averages in connection with the Skegness and District Cricket Club.

Season 1931 at Skegness has not been record-breaking in any direction, except in the number of times the ground has been flooded by heavy rain. Several matches have had to be cancelled, and even more have been played in such wretched conditions that it has affected the quality and brightness of the cricket.

Evidently Skegness do not shine at mudlarking, as the season's record of 10 matches won, 10 drawn, and 10 lost is by far the worst since the present statiscian of the club took over in 1923. The inferior skill shown by the club is well demonstrated by the fact that in the 1930 season 19.2 runs were scored for each Skegness wicket which fell whereas opponents only scored 13.3 runs per wicket. This season the figures are 18.8 and 16.5 respectively.

R. E. Frearson, who was again chosen to play for the Minor Counties—on this occasion against the New Zealanders—has again shown himself to be in a class by himself as a batsman. This was well demonstrated in the last match of the season against the Notts, bowlers. Perhaps the club's bad record is chiefly due to the infrequency of his appearances. H. W. Martin, a stylish bat with very good strokes on the off side, has proved a very useful addition to the club's batting strength.

There have been two centuries scored for the club, both by R. E. Frearson, 128 not out v. The Druids, and 100 not out versus a Notts. County XI. No century has been two partnerships of three figures for the club, manely: R. E. Frearson and H. W. Martin 121 v. The Druids; and A. E. Cheales and J. E. Searby 115 v. Crauwell Command. Flight-Lieut. A. J. Holmes and Leading Aircrattsman Hudson scored 122 for Cranwell in the only three-figure partnership against

craftsman Hudson scored 122 for Cranwell in the only three-figure partnership against the club.

In bowling H. E. Witty heads the list and has certainly lowled up to his very best form again this season. Nixon again has good figures, but has had too much heavy work to do on the ground to do feal justice to himself. G. E. Wharmby and C. W. Jepson have also done useful work. Frearson, for some reason, probably lack of practice, is not the force he used to be with the ball, and it would be interesting to learn who was the batsman opposed to him when he bowled his one maiden over in 1931. It would be fair to assume that the batsman did not display any Jessopian tendencies! The rumour that one of the club's leading batsmen obliged by playing for the other side on this occasion is not founded on fact!

And now, what can be said on the subject of the game's most important branch—the fielding?

On second thoughts, perhaps it would be better—and it would certainly be more polite—if we just said that the fielding has not been worse than usual.

THE FIRST ELÉVEN.

The cricket season, which has been greatly affected by unfavourable weather conditions, having come to an end, an account of the performances of the Grantham C.C. is now due, and by way of an introduction it may be said that the Club has not had quite be said that the Club has not had quite so successful a time as in some previous years, for, compared with last season, when the Club had a total aggregate which gave them more than a three-runs-per-wicket advantage over the opponents, this year they are more than one run per wicket behind. Many good games have been seen, however, and though for the first time for several seasons there is no century-maker to be mentioned. J. T. C. Golding, who has the distinction of making the highest score, 97 not out, would probably have accomplished the feat had time permitted.

Nearly 7,700 runs have been scored, with

Nearly 7,700 runs have been scored, with a difference of 45 in favour of the Club's opponents, Grantham's total being 831 less than a year ago and 2,788 less than in the 1929 season.

Good wins have been obtained against Oakham, Burghley Park, Egerton Park, Wigston P.M., and Digby R.A.F., gmongst others, and defeats sustained at the hands of Peterborough, Notts. Forest, Old Stamfordians, Notts. Banks, and Leicester.

The batting figures in some respects are not so good as last year, when eighteen players came out with double-figure averages, against fourteen this season, the highest aggregate of runs being 537 by M.W. Appleby, compared with the 698 total of F. Parker a year ago.

With regard to the howling figures, there is an outstanding feat to record, M. W. Appleby's achievement in again capturing over 100 wickets. To do this for a fraction over eight runs per wicket is a really remarkable effort, and exceeds the merit of his last season's figures by the capture of 32 more wickets at a cost of one run less per victim. He received excellent support from other members of the side, E. L. Parker and G. E. C. Tipping both proving effective at times, the former's figures showing great improvement on these of last season, when his 'bag' of 21 worked cut a cost of 29.23, against his 52 wickets this season for, the much less expensive rate of 12.76 runs per wicket.

The fickleness of the weather is mirrored in the increased number of undecided matchessurely lamong cricket's greatest bugbears, Indeed; the elements can be said to have ruined to a great extent the 1931 programme.

In comparing the season's figures with the 1930 returns it will be seen five fewer games were changed in; the wins decreased by 8 (from 16 to 8), and losses dropped from 16 to 14. Drawn games jumped from 3 to 8.

A young player of great promise, S. F. Musson, leads a batch of familiar names in the batting honours. His return of 27.11 for nine innings would seem to merit higher recognition than occasional appearances in the second team. A pleasing unfinished knock of 78 runs was lergely instrumental in raising D. W. Maule to the second rung on the ladder. He has the fine average of 20.14. He played in all Thursday matches.

It is gratifying to note that the names of several youngsters which were last year emong the "also batted," have now crept into the the list proper. J. W. Massey, who emerges from 12 games with an average of 6.25, is a case in point.

C. Watson just secures the premier berth in the bowling averages with figures which hospeak ability and consistency. He was run very close by Sellors, Curry, and Wild. Soventy-four catches, of which Hanson claimed 11, testify to the vigilance of the teams in the field.
