

C. J. ("CLIFF") LLOYD, who is keeping wicket for Pontypool for the fifth season, is one of the most popular players in the side, and although he has run into a patch of bad luck with the bat during the last few games he has some remarkably good records to his credit, for his prowess is by no means confined to his "keeping."

Cliff comes of cricketing stock. His father, Mr J. E. Lloyd, who is a regular grandstand patron at the Park, kept wicket for the Garndiffaith Cricket Club for thirty years—from the age of 15 until he retired from the game. His hands bear eloquent testimony to the "hot ones" he has stopped, and he has broken a finger more than once as the cost of a bye saved.



His best performances this season have been 87 against Briton Ferry Steelworks and 100 not out against Abertillery. Both these games were played at Panteg.



In many cases Monmouthshire have hit the ball quite as hard and frequently as their opponents, but often it was the case that a shot which would have reslised three or four, had Monmouthshire fielded their own batting, was stopped for one by their alert rivals. Fortunately this trouble can easily be overcome by next season.

Monmouthshire have included many promising young players in the County Eleven, and one comparatively young player with a future is B. Oliver, the Ebbw Vale player. In his first county match against a strong Oxfordshire attack, Oliver scored 45 in the first innings, and he heads the Monmouthshire batting with an average of 25. Eleven, with a ver. In
