Barnes Difficult to Play at Werneth

SCORING SLOW

There were fewer than a hundred spectators present when the Minor Counties Championship match between Lancashire second and Staffordshire was begun on the Werneth Cricket Club's ground on the Coppice this morning.

There were several familiar faces to be seen, the Lancashire side including Malcolm Taylor, formerly of Werneth, Norman Bowers, who has played for Middleton and Werneth, H. R. W. Butterworth, the Little orough cap-tain, and J. Wilson, formerly of Middleton, while Aaron Lockett, the Oldham professional, and S. F. Barnes appeared in the Staffordshire

Early morning rain had made the outfield soft, but the wicket had been covered during the night and Malcolm Taylor, and Hawkwood opened the Lancashire innings promptly at half-past eleven.

The weather was dull but fine when Taylor took the first over from Barnes, Lockett sharing the attack at the other end,

Deceived By Barnes

Neither batsman was inclined to take any risks and Taylor was never at his ease against Barnes. It occasioned little surprise when, with Lancashire's total only at 6, he was completely deceived and bowled "all over the place" by the veteran professional before he had opened his account.

F. D. Beattie filled the breach and the slowness of play was emphasised by the fact that the scoring of the first ten runs occupied thirty minutes.

Then Hawkwood livened up matters somewhat by making a neat cut off Barnes to record the first boundary of the game. Immediately afterwards the former Lancashire League amateur opened his shoulders to Lockett and it was only the deadened outfield that prevented his securing another four. Both batsmen were, for the main part, playing with considerable caution and at 15 Crump was put on in place of Lockett. After forty minutes play Lancashire had taken their total to 24.

Caught in Two Minds

Hawkwood continued to monopolise the bowling and showed sound judgment in picking out the right ball to hit. The rate of scoring increased with Beattie finding his form but a well placed and keen field saved many runs. At 36, Beattie, who had been hitting hard, seemed to be caught in two minds by a spinner from Barnes and he tipped the ball into the wicketkeeper's hands. This was three overs after he had given a difficult chance to Fitton at coverpoint.

Any hopes Lancashire had of a re-covery seemed to be dispelled when, five minutes after the dismissal of Higson, minutes after the dismissal of Higson, Bowers was beaten by a ball from Burnes which swerved and upset his off-stump. Lancashire II Lead By 152

TASK FOR STAFFS.

Lancashire II finished the first day's play in their match with Staffordshire at Werneth yesterday with a first innings lead of 54, thanks to a fine bowling performance by H. R. W. Butterworth, who, on a wicket which helped the bowlers, took six wickets for 29. Lancashire scored 137 after a splendid rally by the "tail," and Staffordshire were dismissed in an hour and a quarter for

Ideal weather conditions prevailed when Taylor and Hawkwood opened Lancashire's second innings this morning, but there was only a mere handful of spectators.

After a fair start there was a bad collapse and five wickets were down for 45 runs, Barnes claiming three of the victims.

Lancashire's opening pair seemed prepared to take a little more liberty with the bowling, and several amart singles were stolen. Hawkwood was the first to go, Barnes breaking up the partnership with the score at nineteen. Taylor lasted only a few minutes longer, a ball from Welch, who had charge of the attack at the other end, getting him off his pads. The score then stood at 21 and four runs later Horrocks made a brilliant cut, but was dismissed by Lockett, who made an equally brilliant catch, at second alip. Welch was the bowler.

Stubborn Defence

F. D. Beattie, who had gone in at the fall of the first wicket, was defending stubbornly, but Rowers, who had been playing Barnes confidently, made a bad stroke and was beaten by the eteran when he had scored nine and had helped to put on seventeen runs for the fourth wicket.

Play proceeded at the same leisurely rate after lunch, but the end quickly came. After surviving an appeal for legbefore off Barnes, Higson, in the veteran professional's next over, was well beaten. One run later Butterworth was completely deceived by Barnes and was out legbefore, the innings closing for 88 runs.
