MONMOUTH CRICKET CLUB.

Improved Financial Position.

ONLY ONE ELEVEN THIS SEASON.

Appeal for Co-operation among Members.

At the annual meeting of the Monmouth Cricket Club held at the King's Head Hotel, on Wednesday evening, it was decided to run only one team during the coming season. Consequently there will be no Saturday 2nd XI, or Thursday team.

Prior to the commencement of the business of the meeting, the Chairman (Mr. G. M. Gibbs) referred to the death of Mr. E E. Hill, a vice-President of the Club and a playing member, and also to Mr. Francis Hobbs, a vice-President. Those present stood in silence as a token of nspect.

Presenting the balance sheet Mr. L. V. McEwen said it would be noted that the total habilities incurred on behalf of the club during the past season, amounted to £99 14s. 10d. which together with the debit of the previous season of £41 9s. 9d. made a total liability of £141 4s. 7d. Against that, their receipts for the season showed a gross total of £123 11s. 11d., leaving a debit on the season's working of £17 12s. 8d.

It would be noted that the transport costs to the club were £10 15s, 10d, in excass of receipts from that source. Profits on teas amounted to the satisfactory receipt of the sum of £9 4s, 11d, and he felt special mention should be made of the wonderful work in that connection by Mrs L. Manns and her help-mate, Miss Roma Cox who undertook the provision of teas at every home match for the first eleven, Her efforts resulted in an income of over £3 10s, to the club and also to Mrs. R. E. Webb and Miss Jones, who discharged the task on behalf of the second eleven, likewise for every home match. That resulted in a further amount of £3 10s, revenue. To Mrs. Howard Bowen, Rosser, Mrs. Colwell and Mrs. H. Lewis they were also deeply indebted for the splendid work in that direction and to all those who so willingly gave of their services The ground collections fell very short of anything approaching a satisfactory amount, and that was a matter that had for years now, been one of keen disappointment to the committee.

GRATITUDE AND APPRECIATION.

The most pleasing item appearing on the receipts side of the accounts was without doubt, that shown under the entertainments accounts of £45 8s. 2d. As they were all undoubtedly aware, Mr. R. E. Webb undertook charge of affairs in that matter at the commencement of the sea son his programme consisting in the organising of a dance, the Derby draw and the knock-out)completition. Of the results of those efforts, the amount realised made its own recommendation and he felt they could not under-estimate his splendid work or sufficiently give expression or their gratitude and appreciation to him ic. all he had done

In conclusion Mr. McEwen said it was a source of satisfaction to note there was an increased income of £11 15s, o memsubscribers. On behalf of the club he extended an expression of appreciation to all the vice presidents etc. for their most welcome and kind assistance in that direction, trusting they might do them the honour of a continuance of their valued support.

After the adoption of the balance sheet. Mr. Colwell proposed and the Chairman seconded a vote of thanks to Mr. Well which was unanimously carried.

Before submitting his report Mr. L. V. McEwen (hon. sec.) further referred to loss the club sustained last year in the tragio decease of one of its greate t supporters and friends, Mr. E. E. Hill.

PESSIMISM STILL REMAINS

In preparing his fourth annual report, Mr. McEwen said he ha occasion to refer to that of last year, in which he found that he had touched on somewhat of a pessimistic note of the Club's prospects for the ensuing season, owing chiefly to reasons of finance. From the finance report it would be noted that the difficulty in that repect still remained although partially overcome. It was with regret that he again had to report that for reasons ou

Club's control and which would also effect the Club's finances the continuance of the Club as at present constituted left that feeling if pessimism remaining. He appealed to the members to give the matter their most earnest and unbiassed consideration.

Dealing with lats season's records, it was as all were aware, a season of "spoil sport" fro mthe point of view of weather conditions, rain being responsible on 18 occasions for the abandonment or cancellation of matches. The premier XI were the sufferers on eight occasions, the 2nd XI on seven occasions, the Thursday XI being the most fortunate in that respect, weather conditions affecting their matches on only three occasions.

The match results were as follows;__ Saturday 1st XI, played 14, won 6, drawn 3, lost 5; Saturday 2nd XI, played 16, won 8, drawn 2, lost 6; Thursday XI. played 15, won 4, drawn 6, lost 5; making a total of 45 matches played, 18 won, 11 drawn, 16 lost., That was a very fair and improved record on the previous season when the results were: played 53, won 16, drawn 14, lost 23. All the matches were contested in a keen, cricketing and ambitious spirit. It was pleasing to the committee to again note the spirit of harmoney and comradeship existing among the members of the Club last season, and so materially assisting the work of the committee.

For the first time in the Club's history, a series of knock-out competitions were played on the ground during the evenings for the Lady Shelley-Rolls Challenge Bowl all three teams being represented. In that connection their thanks were again due to Mr. R. E. Webb for his wonderful organisation of the events. The competition an increased moome of £11 108 bership fees over last year and a further ing matches being played both from the bership fees over tast year cannot increase of £5 from vice-presidents and point of view of spectators and players.

Also to the chairman (Mr. G. M. Gibbs), the vice-capt, (Mr. E. W. Colwell), the captains of the Thursday and Saturday second eleven (Mr. S. H. Bowen and Mr. R. E. Webb) their vice-captains (Mr. B. R. Rosser and Mr. H. J. Lewis), to whom they owed a great dept of gratitude. Further, to Mr. R. E. Colwell who so kindly undertook the duties of match and fixture secretary, a task requiring untold patience and a deal of time, they owed special thanks, and to Mr. A. W. Smith and all those who placed their cars at the disposal of the the club. They were also extremely grateful, to the Trust House for the use of committee room at the Angel Hotel and to all those who assisted in any possible manner to the successful discharge of season's programme.

Referring again to the finance statement, he stated the club, as a whole, still had a liability to discharge to their creditors. That liability concerned every member of the club and not to their committee alone, being transactions conducted by the committee on their behalf to enable the discharge of a season's obligation. As cooperation was one of the main secrets of success, he appealed in that connection to every member of the club, past, and present and future, to make the matter their individual responsibility and endeavour to assist in every possible manner to the club's discharge of its financial respons sibilities.

The secretary's report was unanimously adopted,

The Chairman stated that from the treasurer's report it would be noted that whereas the club's debt at the end of 1931 season was £41, it was now £18. position might appear to be satisfactory but he reminded them that when last senson it was decided to carry on for another year, it was agreed to make a special effort to pay off the debt. Through the untiring efforts of Mr. R. E. Webb. some £45 was raised. That sum had been drawn upon to the extent of £23 to meet current expenses. Consequentily scheme to wipe off the outstanding lightle ity had fallen short by that amount, It was very disappointing to the committee, particularly when last season's expenses were cut to the very minimum and all items under that heading were carefully scrutinised and a financial statement issued month by month 2 month by month,

Looking to the future, Mr. Gibbs said that to balance their accounts, their expenses had to be cut down or income increased. He was afraid that during the coming year their income would have to suffer reduction, having lost several vice-Presidents, and a number of members who were giving up the game.

COMMITTEE'S RECOMMENDATION.

The committee had given the financial position and the future of the club every consideration and had come to the conclusion, that they should recommend the club to run only one team during the coming season. Provisional estimates had been made on that basis and they believed that with one team the expenses could be covered by income. The club had been only too pleased in the past to gove games to many young men who could not wholly pay their way, but such facilities they regretted, must be restricted until times were better and the club was able to regain its financial position.

PROVIDING FOR MONMOUTH.

The Rev. Owen Jones: I think it would be an awful shame to deprive the younger people of their game of cricket. Our object is to provide for Monmouth and not just an eleven.

When the questin was put to the vote it was decided that only one team should be run this coming season.

Lady Shelley Rolls was re-elected President, while the vice-Presidents were re-elected en bloc. Mr. W. H. L. Cook was re-appointed captain, Mr. Eric Smith vice-captain, Mr. P. W. Colwell, match secretary (pro tem), Mr. L. V. McEwen, hon, secretary and treasurer.

A vote of thanks to the Chairman, concluded the business of the meeting.

He was appointed to Alexandra Boys' School, Newport, in August, 1912, and remained there until

the outbreak of war.

He joined the 1st Battalion Monmouthshire Regiment in September, 1914, and served in the Army until the end of January, 1919, when he returned to the staff of Alexandra School. Here he remained until August, 1922.

Transferred to Maindee Schools in 1922, he spent three years on the staff of that school, and was then appointed to Hatherleigh Central School, where he was an assistant from August, 1925, to August, 1930.

Since 1930, Mr. Jones has been Superintendent of the Instruction Centre for Unemployed Boys.

Memorable Games

Pontypool Matches that will Live

Although Pontypool's record (seven games lost and six drawn out of 26) is probably one of the worst in the history of the club, there has been no deterioration in the class of cricket played, and the season has produced some memorable games, both in the Park and away.

The club again arranged a Cricket Week in the Park, and this year took over the Devon tour previously run by the East Monmouthshire Touring Club. Both maintained the high standard set, and were thoroughly enjoyed by players and spectators alike.

FAILURE IN ATTACK.

The only game lost while on tour was that with Plymouth, and staleness probably had something to do with that. Both games with Cwmbran were drawn, and Garndiffaith were only narrowly defeated. A GOOD TERM EXPERIENCED.

Looking back over the cricket season just terminated, Cwmbran Cricket Club can be truthfully said to have experienced one of if not their most successful season in more respects than one.

Opening the season with a comfortable bank balance, it is belived that by the time the statement of accounts is presented at the annual meeting in February this figure will have been considerably augmented. The Club is in a more flourishing financial position than ever before, and this despite several disappointments in attractive games being abandoned

The severest disappointment in this respect was, of course, the abandonment of respect was, or course, the abandonment of the game v. Glamorgan County Club and Ground on September 1st, and it is safe to assume that this lost the Cwmbran Club a large sum. But "hope springs eternal" and members and supporters are looking forward to the visit promised next year by forward to the visit promised next year hy Mr Maurice J. Turnbuil, the County skipper.

In a playing sense, too, a successful season was accomplished, despite a disastrous start. for in the first game at Cwmbran Rhiwbina dismissed the side for the smallest total ever recorded, and won handsomely.

POETIC JUSTICE.

Poetic justice, however, was meted out when Cwmbran gave Rhiwbina a severe trouncing at Cardiff, for 177 for 5 wickets was registered before Rhiwbina were sent back for 75 runs.

The entire record for the season is: Played, 20; won, 8; lost, 7; drawn, 5; runs for, 2,463 (an average of 14 per wicket); against, 1,810 (an average of 10.8 per wicket). When it is remembered that two games were lost by a single run against Tredegar Park and Whitchurch, it will be appreciated that the record is more presentable than actually appears in the first instance.

The highest scoring game was against Pontypool at Cymbran, when only 11 wickets fell for an aggregate of 326 runs, but probably the most exciting were against Caroiff H.S.O.B. and Whitchurch, both at Cwmhran. The victory gained over the former club was in all probability the best win of the season. Set to get 142 runs Cumbran had lost 8 wickets for 84 runs when W. H. Salt and G. E. Lewis came together in a very bad light. Their partnership resulted in an unbroken stand of 77 runs and a thrilling victory was registered

against big odds.
