

The arrival of Collin, brother to the Derby County full-back, brought about an acceleration in the rate of scoring. Collin's first thirteen runs comprised three fours following a single, which was indicative of the liveliness which he infused into the play. Soon the first hundred went up on the board at almost the identical time that Hill, who was collecting runs stendily, reached his half-century. Later Collin got three fours with

successive balls from Major C. Wilson, whose analysis was thereby very much affected. In his previous 14 overs he had had only 15 scored against him, but in this, his 15th over, he conceded 12 runs.
