## SAXON'S CENTURY

Cambs. commenced their Minor Counties' fixtures on Monday and Tuesday, when they entertained Surrey II. at Fenner's. The match was left drawn, Cambs. taking points for first innings lead.

Mobey and McMurray opened for Surrey and were opposed by Smith and Covill. Smith's first over was a maiden, but in his second he clean bowled Mobey with a beautiful ball which kept low. The scoreboard then read 10-1-1.

The first bowling changes were made at 45, when Rose was brought on for Smith and Wilkinson for Covill. Both McMurray and Wilson were now well set and runs had been coming at slightly over one a minute. With this bowling change the rate was increased to nearly two a minute. McMurray was the brighter of the two and reached his 50 with a nice four through the slips which also sent up the 70.

Wilkinson was employing six men on the leg side, three deep and three close in while Rose had two men on the off boundary and two on the leg.

At the end of an hour's play the score stood at 99 and Rose was displaced by Saxon. When 61, McMurray survived a bat chance to run him out, but undaunted hit a nice four to leg to send up the 100.

With the score at 110, Smith was again brought on at the Pavilion end. The change did not, however, immediately affect McMurray, who scored with delightful freedom all round the wicket. With his score at 78, however, Smith put down a low ball which clean bowled him. The total was 127, the second wicket having added 117.

Covill was brought on next over at the other end and only four runs were added when he bowled Wilson for 41.

Cook took most of the bowling, but Harrison broke his duck with a nice four through the slips. In the next over Cook was out l.b.w. to Smith.

After Crouch had joined Harrison scoring was slow for a time until they began to snatch some quick runs. Just before the lunch interval the pair sent up 150. In the last over before lunch Wilkinson was brought on for Covill. At lunch the score was 158 for four.

Wilkinson and Smith resumed bowling after the interval, but both batsmen were quickly off the mark again. Wilkinson soon changed ends, his place being taken by Whewell, who had Crouch in difficulties with practically every ball of his first over. In his second over Harrison faced him and he hit over a straight one to be clean bowled.

## 200 UP.

The 200 was sent up half an hour after the restart and Crouch began to hit out. Smith and Covill were now brought on to make use of the new ball. Maxwell, who was suffering from the effects of a hit on the leg, soon began to open out and sent several nice fours to the leg boundary.

After an hour's play the 250 went up, and Whewell displaced Smith and Wilkinson came on for Covill. Soon afterwards both Crouch and Maxwell got their fifties with Maxwell scoring the quicker.

Whewell and Rose were put on again and Whewell broke up a partnership which had added 101 by getting Crouch l.b.w. Crouch had scored 52 in about an hour and a half including four fours.

Parker, who joined Maxwell, soon broke his duck, but Whewell again trapped the batsman into getting in front of his wicket. No addition was made to the total before Maxwell was snatched by Rose in the slips off Smith, who had displaced Wilkinson. Maxwell had compiled 72 in an hour and 20 minutes, including 10 fours.

Oliver and Owen were now in, and with the latter doing the majority of the scoring, runs came at a fair pace until Owen was clean bowled by a leg-break from Whewell. Pierpoint joined Oliver, and the pair made a good last wicket stand, the total reaching 336. Whewell took five wickets for 56 runs—a creditable debut.

The Cambs. innings commenced at 4.40. Coote facing Parker, with Saxon at the other end. Coote took a four off the first over, but disaster overtook him in the third over, when Mobey accepted a catch behind the wicket. Rose, next man in, took a single off his first ball. Saxon followed with a four and a steady partnership took the total to 50 before Rose was caught.

When Covill joined Saxon another good stand resulted. The pair defied all bowling changes and took the total to 163 before the drawing of stumps, Saxon being undefeated for 75 and Covill for 38.

## TUESDAY'S PLAY

Parker and Maxwell opened the bowling when play was resumed on Tuesday, and from the first ball of the third over Covill sent up the 170 with a four through the slips. He continued to score the quicker and reached his 50 12 minutes after the resumption. When Owen was brought on for Parker the rate of scoring increased and 200 went up after half-an-hour's play.

Saxon, after 15 minutes, reached his 150 with two successive fours. In the next over Covill had his stumps knocked back by Parker. He had scored 77 in an hour and a half. His best hits were 11 fours, and the partnership realised nearly 180.

Parker now joined Saxon and the pair had a bright little partnership until Parker had the misfortune to play on to his leg stump. Next in was Taylor and he only stayed long enough to score four before being caught behind the wicket.

## SAXON'S FINE INNINGS.

Smith now joined Saxon and soon got 200. Off one ball of Crouch's he hooked a glorious six to square leg which landed on the outer track. Both men continued to score fairly quickly and Saxon reached his 150 at 1.10. At 3.20 Smith, attempting another six, missed and was well caught in the deep. Wilkinson was next man, but ten minutes before lunch Maxwell broke the partnership by lifting Saxon's middle stump out of the ground. Saxon had scored 160 in four hours and a quarter, including 16 fours and 19 threes. The total score was 328.

Whewell joined Wilkinson and soon scored a single which put Cambs. ahead in the first innings. The total was 312 for seven at lunch.

Immediately after lunch Cambs. lost Wilkinson, who was caught off Parker's first ball. Hart joined Whewell, and the pair had a merry knock until Whewell was caught at mid-off after making 16. Covill, last man in, took a single off his first ball and played confidently, but Parker took a fine one-handed catch when he edged one from Crouch. The innings closed at 3.58, giving Cambs. a lead of 42 on the 1st innings.

## TWO QUICK WICKETS.

Smith, at the far end, and Covill opened the bowling for Cambs. Mobey and McMurray were quickly off the mark, but found difficulty in scoring quickly. With the total at 18, McMurray stepped across to a ball from Smith and had his leg stump knocked back.

Mobey was now joined by Wilson, and the pair settled down to score at a rate of over two a minute. At 35, Whewell was brought on and Smith changed ends. A change soon resulted, as Smith clean bowled Wilson with his fourth ball. The total was 37 when Cook joined Mobey.

With the score in the 70s Covill replaced Smith, but the two batsmen had now settled down. At 92, however, Cook was magnificently caught by Taylor off Whewell.

After the tea interval Mobey quickly reached his 50 with a single, while Harrison played steadily.

Harrison was the first of the pair to leave, being bowled by Wilkinson. Crouch had a bright knock for 16 before being dismissed, meanwhile Mobey got within striking distance of his 100.

Maxwell was soon off the mark, but Mobey hit his 100 and then succumbed two balls later to Whewell. Parker was next man in, and he and Maxwell hit out time in a merry little partnership.

## INNINGS WIN FOR CAMBS.

### Covill's Hat Trick at Fenner's

## LINCS. FORCED TO FOLLOW-ON

Cambs. beat Lincolnshire by an innings and 72 runs in a Minor Counties' championship match at Fenner's yesterday. Cambs. fielded the same side that took first innings points from Surrey 11.

Winning the toss, Cambs. batted first on Wednesday. After a quiet start, Coots and Saxon scored steadily, sending up 100 before Coots was caught. Saxon was dismissed after making 76 out of 130. He hit a six and eight fours. Covill and Parfitt had a bright stand of 50, and the former reached his century before tea. Taylor gave him good support for the fifth wicket. Covill had batted 3 hours 10 minutes when he was dismissed. His fine 146 included a six and 15 fours. The remaining batsmen went for runs quickly and the innings closed for 392.

Lincolnshire met with some early reverses and three wickets were down for 63 at the close of play on Wednesday.

#### A HAT TRICK.

Wickets fell quickly on the resumption yesterday, and Covill accomplished the hat trick by dismissing Bennett, Eaton-Evans and Drakes with successive balls. The innings closed at 114, Covill returning the fine analysis of six for 33.

Lincs. followed on with arrears of 278 and made rather a better start, but Whewell secured three quick wickets just before lunch, the total at the interval being 87 for 4.

Wilkinson and Eaton-Evans subsequently made something of a stand, but the best effort was that of Drakes and Wilson, who added 71 for the eighth wicket. Then Smith finished off the innings, having a final analysis of five wickets for 40 runs.

## MAJOR POINTS FOR CAMBS.

## CUP SEMI-FINAL COMPLAINT.

On Monday I received the following letter from "An Onlooker":

"The second evening's play in the British Legion Cup semi-final between Sawston and Grantchester was spoilt by unsatisfactory umpiring, and the indiscriminate 'appealing' through the Sawston innings.

"There were at least two very bad decisions—the dismissal of Hurry 'caught and bowled' off an obvious 'hump ball,' and Crutchley's 'run out,' after the wicket had been broken. The Grantchester team were quite good enough to have won comfortably without undesirable assistance of this kind.

"The 'cup-tie' spirit displayed was much to be deprecated, on such an occasion, and it spoilt what should have been a sporting contest, played in the spirit of 'Fair's fair,' and according to the highest traditions of English cricket.

"This competition has very much deteriorated in quality since the introduction of evening matches. Fortunately, neutral

and efficient umpires are guaranteed for the final."

After the above letter had appeared in the "Cambridge Daily News" I received the following reply from Mr. L. Spiller, the hon. secretary of the Grantchester branch:

"I would not trouble to reply to an anonymous letter were it not for the fact that a grave injustice has been done to us as fair and impartial an umpire as ever stepped on to a cricket field. My branch has always been most careful in selecting an umpire for our cup matches, to secure the services of an efficient official and one who can be relied upon to act impartially. On this occasion it was Mr. 'Steve' Johnson, a well-known Cambs. League umpire, and the fact that he was 'standing' for us I personally communicated to the Sawston Branch several days before the match. He is, it is true, a member of our Branch, but when I say that in the previous round, when we had as tight a struggle as ever there was (we scraped through by one run), he gave two of our own batsmen out lbw, it shows, does it not, his absolute impartiality?

"As one keenly interested and for many years taking an active part in sport, I am amazed at anyone deprecating the 'cup-tie' spirit. Where would any game be without the spirit of keen rivalry, and is there any difference between the 'cup-tie spirit' and the spirit encendered by a league or even a friendly contest? It can only exist in the minds of those who totally fail to appreciate the 'highest traditions of English sport, which 'Onlooker' talks about.

"We have a keen team, consisting for the most part of old crooks. Every member of my Branch, seventy odd strong, served in H.M. Forces during the Great War, and with about four exceptions saw service overseas. They are some of the finest 'lads' that ever breathed—I knew them before the war, I met several of them in France, and we have been closely associated in the ups and downs of life since.

"The reflection which 'Onlooker' has cast upon the sportsmanship of these fine fellows is as stupid as it is undeserved. Should 'Onlooker' still have any doubt on the matter, may I extend to him a cordial invitation to our celebration—(Bottisham consenting!)—of winning 'their cup'—By the way, was 'Onlooker' by any chance the Sportsman so imbued with the spirit of 'Fair's fair' and having so much at heart 'the highest traditions of English cricket' that he spent an hour or so on the boundary line on Friday barracking the fieldsmen?"

### A NOT OUT CENTURY

Ratcliffe is one of the select band who have scored two separate hundreds in the inter-Varsity match, his 201 in 1931 being followed by 124 in 1932. In the latter year he also had the distinction of scoring two centuries in one match against Surrey.

**BRITISH LEGION CUP SEMI-FINAL.**

I have received a further letter from "An Onlooker," who in a recent issue commented upon the British Legion Cup semi-final, Grantchester v. Sawston and Pumpstord. He says:

"It was never my intention to make any accusation of deliberate unfairness against either the Grantchester umpire or the Grantchester XI. I had spent much of the first evening's play in the company of Mr. Spiller (as I have since discovered), and we thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.

"For the greater part of the second innings' play, I was occupied in 'smoothing down' those members of our team, who felt they had a grievance. In the end, assisted by other incidents of quite a trifling character, I became rather nettled. Instead of shaking hands all round and hearty congratulations being extended, as you might have expected, the match ended in gloom in more ways than one.

"That is my only excuse for unwisely rushing into print.

"The irresponsible back-chat from the boundary came to my notice shortly before the close, and I was personally responsible for stopping it.

"This, and appeals for lbw decisions from 'third man' are examples of the 'cup tie' spirit which I deprecated. On the other hand, some people really enjoy this, and see no harm in it. Anyhow, whatever the decision, the umpire is the sole arbiter, and that is something which I allowed myself to forget.

"I am also quite confident that the good name of Grantchester Legion cricket is quite safe with Mr. Spiller in charge, and that its success only reflects his capable work as secretary of a very fine branch. I feel that full retraction which the occasion demands, to him and to the umpire, has not been made until I have disclosed my identity.

"A any further censure which may be forthcoming, I hope Mr. Spiller will be as unanimous as he thinks I deserve. I wish him, his team, and his branch all the best.—Yours, etc., T. F. Teversham."

**CAMBS. SAVE THE GAME.**

## CAMBS. BRING OFF A DOUBLE

### Beds. Beaten by Eight Wickets

### SMITH AND WILKINSON DO WELL

Cambs. brought off a Minor Counties' championship "double" over Bedfordshire yesterday, winning the return match on St. John's College ground by eight wickets.

Cambs. won the toss on Wednesday and sent Beds. in to bat. Rawlins and Smith were opposed by Smith and Wilkinson. The latter soon met with success as in his third over he induced Rawlins to return him a catch. Cliff Rawlins was next man in, but the pitch was aiding the bowlers considerably and he stayed to make only five before Smith bowled him. The total was then 21.

#### SLOW SCORING.

Play continued to be very slow until Wilkinson had eight taken off one over. He was then replaced by Rose. Smith, who had been bowling very consistently, got his second wicket at 41, when his namesake, who had compiled 21, played an off-ball into Whewell's hands at forward point. Southgate was joined by Milman, who received a trial for the 'Varsity this year. The next over Southgate was clean-bowled by Rose. The total was 45. One run later Poole edged a ball of Smith's and Wilkinson took a nice catch at arm's length above his head. After an hour and a quarter's play the 80 went was sent up by Sime.

With the total at 61, Smith, who had bowled 16 overs unchanged, was replaced by Gumbrell. Another change was made in the seventies, when Covill came on for Rose. Sime and Milman, however, scored at a faster rate than any other pair, and after 1 hour and 50 minutes sent up the 100. Next over Whewell came on for Wilkinson. When the pair had put on 56 Milman was smartly caught by Cockell. His 18 came in a time of need. In the same over Covill bowled Sime neck and crop. His 34 included four fours and three threes. The total at lunch was 103 for 7 wickets.

The Beds. innings quickly closed after lunch, as for the addition of only 14 runs Covill and Smith disposed of the last three men. Smith took five wickets for 25 runs and Covill three for 12.

#### CAMBS. START WELL.

Cambs. opened with Coote and Covill and they were opposed by C. W. Rawlins and Power. From the start the rate of scoring was faster than that of Beds. and at 29 Sime went on for Power. He had 10 knocked off his first over, however, and brought on Milman. Off the fourth ball of that over Covill drove one with all his might at Milman, but the latter luckily attempted to hold it. After about 10 minutes' play Coote sent up the 50. Four runs later Power clean bowled Covill with a lovely ball, which kept lower than the majority. Saxon now joined Coote, and the rate of scoring became slower. Rawlins and Power were now bowling much more effectively. At 66 the second wicket fell, when Saxon was well caught by Howard at silly mid-on. He had made six. Rose now joined Coote.

With 70 on the board, C. W. Rawlins, who had bowled unchanged, was replaced by Milman. In the first ball of his second over Rose gave a catch to Power. Wilkinson joined Coote, but Milman captured his wicket after he had scored only one.

It was now the reign of the left-handers as Smith joined Coote. After the innings had lasted an hour and 35 minutes Smith hoisted the 100 with a lovely off-drive. Two balls later he mis-hit one back into Rawlins' hands for the third caught and bowled of the day. When Coote was in his late forties Sime went on and off him Coote reached his half-century in an hour and 45 minutes. By tea-time Cambs. wanted two to establish a first innings' lead, with five wickets to fall. First ball after tea Sime got Coote out lbw.

Coote's 55 included ten fours. Hart was next in. First ball of Rawlins' over Cambs. took the lead, from four byes, but in the same over Taylor was caught behind the wicket—122 for seven.

#### A BRIGHT STAND.

Whewell joined Hart and the pair scored at a bright pace. At 170 C. Rawlins was brought on for the first time, but the pair continued merrily until the total stood at 196, when Whewell was clean bowled by a beauty from Power. After three hours, Gumbrell, playing in his first match for Cambs., sent up the 200 with a lovely drive. When a further 50 runs had been added Gumbrell was clean bowled, and Cockell joined Hart. He only lasted while the total was carried to 255. Hart had batted well for 64 not out, hitting nine fours. Beds. facing arrears of 138, opened with Poole and Smith, but they had to face only one over, from which Poole scored one run.

Covill and Smith were the opening bowlers on the resumption yesterday. The wicket was in good condition, and from the start runs came at the rate of one a minute. At 35 the first bowling change was made when Wilkinson and Whewell were brought on for Covill and Smith. After 48 minutes the 50 was sent up, and next ball Smith was bowled by Wilkinson. C. Rawlins joined Poole, but the second partnership had realised only five runs when Poole was caught behind the wicket by Cockell. This wicket again fell to Wilkinson.

Rawlins and Southgate were now together, and although Rawlins was soon off the mark and seemed particularly at home to Whewell, Southgate was not so comfortable and was nicely caught by Covill after he had made a half-hearted stroke.

#### RUN A MINUTE.

With the total in the 90's, Whewell, who had been treated rather roughly, was replaced by Smith. Wilkinson now received the attention of the batsmen, and with two consecutive fours to square leg Rawlins hoisted the 100 after an hour and 30 minutes. Wilkinson, however, had his revenge, as in the same over he induced Rawlins to leave the crease for Cockell to whip the balls off.

F. Rawlins was next in, but he soon had a fresh partner, as Milman was clean bowled by Smith with a "scorcher." Sime, the captain, now joined him, but Whewell, coming on for Smith after a couple of overs, had him out lbw. second ball. Smith was now tried at the other end. F. Rawlins soon summed up Whewell, and in one over took 14 off him, including one glorious six. Next over Covill was brought on, and the change had immediate result, as Covill caught and bowled him first ball. He had made 33 and the total now was 113.

Thevenard, who had not yet broke his duck, was joined by Howard, who soon opened his score by "crumping" Smith for two fours in succession. The pair soon appeared to be in the mood for a good stand, and Gumbrell was brought on at Covill's end for the first time in an endeavour to separate them. Next over Thevenard edged a fast delivery of Smith's and was well caught by Cockell. Power now joined Howard with the total at 171. He soon opened his account with two fours and a three, and the partnership took the total to 190 before lunch.

#### END OF THE INNINGS.

Chances of a substantial stand soon disappeared after the interval. Power was bowled by Smith with his first attempt with the new ball, and Howard, who had had a glorious knock, was bowled by Smith with the total 213.

Smith took four wickets for 52 and Wilkinson four for 54.

Cambs., with 76 needed to win, sent in Coote and Saxon, and the former was nearly caught off Sime before he had scored. C. W. Rawlins was the other bowler. After this error Coote got going and quickly reached double figures. Saxon in one over took nine off Sime and Coote four. Thirty runs were soon on the board, and Power was brought on for Sime. In his first over Saxon, instead of taking a four, mis-hit back into Power's hands for a simple c. and b.

Taylor now joined Coote and the latter quickly sent up 40 with a nice drive for four, and with two more fours and a single consecutively the half century was

reached. Next over Coote was bowled by Power when trying to glide straight ball. C. Rawlins was now brought on in place of his brother to face Taylor and Covill, but the pair soon knocked off the required runs, and Cambs. won by eight wickets.

## First Innings Points for Norfolk

### EXPENSIVE MISSED CATCH

Taking three points for first innings lead against Cambs. at Fenner's on Monday and Tuesday, Norfolk finished head of the Minor Counties championship table with a percentage of 72.00, and will meet Yorkshire 11. in the challenge match at Norwich next week.

Following a shaky start, Norfolk recovered, thanks largely to J. C. Thistleton-Smith.

Following a shaky start against Cambs. at Fenner's to-day, Norfolk, the undefeated leaders in the Minor Counties Championship recovered, thanks largely to J. C. Thistleton-Smith.

Falcon, the Norfolk captain, won the toss, thereby completing a rather unusual series. During the season he has named the right side of the coin for Norfolk in every away match, and called the wrong side in every home game.

Norfolk elected to bat, and opened with B. W. Rought-Rought and J. L. Thistleton-Smith, who were opposed by Smith and Cockell. Runs came fairly steadily, Thistleton-Smith scoring faster than his left-handed companion. After 20 minutes' play, Rought-Rought was out lbw to Smith when the total was at 22. The new-comer was Edrich, and he opened with a single and a four on the leg side. He obtained two more, and then Covill removed the middle stump from the ground. Norfolk had now obtained 31.

#### THISTLETON-SMITH DROPPED.

Falcon joined Thistleton-Smith, and the latter player, when 33, was dropped by Cockell on offering a chance behind the wicket on the off-side. Smith was the unfortunate bowler. The total had then reached 53, after 40 minutes' play.

At 61 Wilkinson relieved Smith and Whewell took over at the other end in place of Covill. The double change had its effect during the next over, Wilkinson getting Falcon's wicket after the latter had knocked up eight. With three wickets down, the Norfolk total now stood at 65.

When Theobald became associated with Thistleton-Smith the rate of scoring slowed up slightly. After about 65 minutes' play Smith reached his 50.

Wilkinson was replaced by Smith at the pavilion end when the score was 89. Shortly before one o'clock Theobald sent up the hundred on hitting Whewell to leg for four. Covill came on again at the orchard end.

The next over saw another bowling change, Morton taking the ball at the orchard end. The Smith-Theobald partnership continued to flourish in spite of this, and another change was made, Gumbrell going on in place of Smith.

#### PARTNERSHIP BROKEN.

Smith and Theobald were separated at 115, Theobald being well caught in the slips by Taylor off Morton. Taylor fell in taking the catch, but held the ball clear of the ground.

After D. C. Rought-Rought had joined Thistleton-Smith, with the score at 128, Gumbrell was taken off and Covill called upon again.

Thistleton-Smith reached three figures after lunch with a four behind the wicket. After two overs by Covill a new bowler was tried, K. R. J. Saxon, Morton re-appearing at the other end. Saxon had five overs and then Wilkinson took the ball over from him. Neither batsmen seemed to be greatly troubled by any change. Rought-Rought had now settled down better, and played with more confidence. However, when he was 22, Morton induced him to get his leg in the way of a straight one. The association had produced 68 runs, the Norfolk total now being 196.

Cunliffe now joined Thistleton-Smith and opened his score with a five—a single and a boundary four overthrown. This brought Norfolk past the two hundred, play having now been in progress 24 hours.

Thistleton-Smith continued to score steadily all round the wicket in spite of bowling changes. Though singles and twos were his chief means of adding to his score, he once obtained a five through a single and an overthrown. He had been batting just under three hours when, with a four off Gumbrell, he obtained his 150.

When the 250 was raised at 3.10 Cunliffe had made second highest score with 50. He continued to hit strongly, and was responsible for one or two pretty shots to leg. An effort in that direction finally proved his undoing, for he cocked the ball up a little and it was taken by Morton in the slips. Cunliffe, who was then six short of his half-century, had hit four 4's in the course of his 44. He and Thistleton-Smith had added 80 runs, the score having been raised to 276.

#### THE FIRST SIX.

Whewell was tried again at the orchard end, and had Rought-Rought, the next man in, guessing once or twice. The batsman had his revenge, for he hit a beautiful six off the leg-break bowler from his belt delivery before tea. The hit, which was to square leg, landed in the tennis courts near the score board. The score continued to mount on Low joining Rought-Rought. When 22 the latter batsman was missed by Morton at mid-on. He drove the ball hard off Whewell, but though the fieldman managed to get his hands to it he could not bid it.

Rought-Rought celebrated his escape by hitting a subsequent delivery from Whewell into the tennis courts—the second of his innings. Low left shortly afterwards, falling a victim to a catch by Cockell.

Wood, the next man in, had obtained one when Wilkinson bowled him off his pads. Ballance, the last man, survived the remaining half of the over. The innings closed the next ball, Rought-Rought being clean bowled in making an attempt to hit hard a ball from Morton. He missed it entirely. He had then made 42, and Cambs. were faced with a total of 349. Morton took four wickets for 76 runs, Wilkinson three for 37, Smith two for 65, and Covill one for 68.

#### TWO QUICK WICKETS.

Covill and Coote were Cambs. opening batsmen, the ball being in charge of the two Rought-Roughts, D. C. and R. C. With the score at 14 there came the first bowling change, Edrich coming on for D. C. Rought-Rought. Before any addition had been made to the total Covill was bowled by the third ball of the new-comer's second over. In attempting to hit Edrich to leg he missed. The ball took the leg stump after striking his pads.

A further setback awaited Cambs. Before Saxon had scored he was out lbw, to R. C. Rought-Rought. The total was 19. **NORFOLK TOP THE TABLE.**

Norfolk's hopes of gaining a first innings lead over Cambs. and so being able to play Yorks II in the challenge match at Norwich were realised on Fenner's on Tuesday. The visiting county now remain at the top of the Minor Counties tables with a percentage of 72.00. Cambs. are bracketed eighth with Warwick II, with a percentage of 52.50. Had Norfolk lost innings points they would have dropped to third place, below Yorks. II and Wiltshire. After a weak start, Cambs. made a fighting reply to the Norfolk total. They followed the motto "Digged does it," and got within 125 of the Norfolk total after five hours' steady batting. The outstanding feature of the first day's play was the fine innings for Norfolk of J. C. Thistleton-Smith, who knocked up 174, after being missed behind the wicket when 33. Cockell made no mistake on the second occasion on which the century-maker offered a chance. Thistleton-Smith scored his runs all round the wicket, and seemed entirely untroubled by any of the frequent bowling changes. It was largely owing to his score that Norfolk were placed in such a satisfactory position.

Wilkinson, with three for 37, was most successful with the ball. Morton was responsible for sending back four Norfolk men, and came out with the analysis—24.1 overs, 6 maidens, 76 runs, 4 wickets. Smith was the bowler who was worked hardest, taking 31 overs. He took 2 for 65. Whewell appeared to trouble several of the batsmen with his leg-breaks, but he did not succeed in getting a wicket, and had two sixes knocked off his bowling. Cambs. started their innings in even worse manner than Norfolk, and both Corvill (R. J.) and Saxon were dismissed before 20 were on the board.

Cooté and Wilkinson were responsible for starting the revival, and then Hart came in seventh wicket down and played another real captain's innings. He was only one short of his half-century when dismissed, while the other two named each topped the fifty mark. Wilkinson was the most patient of the Cambs. batsmen, taking four hours to get his 65. He executed some nice cuts. Edrich, a fast bowler, proved most troublesome to the Cambs. batsmen. Bowling 22.2 overs, included among which were eight maidens, he obtained five wickets at a cost of 46 runs. He kept a good length throughout, and all the last three Cambs. wickets fell to him. There being practically no chance of a finish, the Norfolk captain apparently decided that his men had spent quite long enough in the broiling sun, for he did not enforce the follow-on. Norfolk scored 121 for 5 wickets in the second innings. Whewell this time dismissed two Norfolk players, both of whom he bowled. He had 10.1 overs, and runs scored off him amounted to 31. Morton, with two for 30, and Gumbrell with one for 17 were the others successful with the ball.

**HISTON AND ST. GILES' DRAW.**

St. Giles' entertained Histon Institute on Saturday, when the wicket on St. John's ground was a batsman's paradise. Histon met with an early success, Marriott being bowled by R. A. Taylor for eight runs. This was the only success Histon had for a very long time. H. E. Percival and P. Langford putting on some 200 runs before Percival was bowled for a splendid 138. At this juncture Langford had secured 81 not out, and the closure was applied with the score at 229 for two wickets.

Histon, on taking their knock, found little difficulty in meeting the excellent bowling of the home side. The first wicket partnership, H. W. F. Taylor and R. A. Taylor, put on 68 runs before the latter was caught and bowled by Barker. The score mounted gradually, and at the end of the day Histon had secured 141 for three wickets, H. W. F. ## ANOTHER GOOD SEASON

### Cambs. County Cricket Review

## THE AVERAGES

The playing members of the Cambs. County Cricket Club have given practical appreciation during the past season of the public's effort to save the club from extinction. When the R.O.S. was sent out last year it was pointed out that it would be a regrettable state of affairs if the club was allowed to die at a time when it had experienced its best playing season for a quarter of a century.

During that campaign the club collected 23 out of a possible 40 Minor Counties' Championship points, which gave it a percentage of 55.00 and earned it ninth place in the table.

This season the percentage is only fractionally lower, viz., 52.50, but the position in the final chart is slightly better, as the club is bracketted eighth with Warwick II.

#### ONLY ONE DEFEAT.

Last season two defeats were sustained; this year there has been only one reverse, and they have met stronger batting sides than in 1932.

Much of the continued success is due to the fact that the matches are played late in the season, when the County is in a position to call upon a really representative side. The more or less youthful side of a few seasons ago has developed on the right lines. One or two newcomers have been introduced, among them W. T. Whewell, the England, Corinthian and University footballer, and there is no reason why, with the playing talent available and continued support from the public, higher honours should not be achieved.

The usual eight matches were played, although fixtures with Surrey II. and Norfolk replaced those with Leicestershire II. and Staffordshire. Three matches were won, four drawn (one won on first innings, three lost on first innings, and one lost. Runs scored for totalled 2,660 for 110 wickets (an average of 24.18) and runs against 3,125 for 129 wickets (average 24.22).

An encouraging start was made to the season, when after Surrey II. had built up the impressive total of 336, Cambs. took first innings points with a reply of 378. Full marks were obtained from the next match with a victory over Lincolnshire, but the return game at Lincoln saw Cambs. suffer its only defeat of the season.

Loss of first innings points at the Oval and Hunstanton to Surrey II. and Norfolk respectively, was followed by a "double" over Bedfordshire. The final match was left drawn, Norfolk, by gaining first innings lead, topping the table, although losing the championship challenge match.
