BIG CRICKET CROWD

Keen Duel Watched With Interest

"BUDDING LARWOODS" KEEP THE BATSMEN GUESSING

One of the largest crowds ever seen on the Chester-le-Street Cricket Ground was that which witnessed the "Derby" game between Durham and Northumberland on Whit Monday. The weather was ideal and the ground being situated in ideal surroundings, the scene was one of splendour. Visitors began to arrive in the town in large numbers long before the hour of commencing the game, and there was every indication that there was going to be a good "gate." The receipts totalled £189 6s. 9d., which included a sixpenny "gate" put on for the benefit of the unemployed.

Among those who were present at the game on Monday were several well-known personalities connected with cricket both in Durham and Northumberland. The crowd thoroughly enjoyed Monday's programme, which was full of excitement right up to the drawing of stumps. The players and officials of both teams were entertained to lunch at the Lambton Arms Hotel (Mr. A. Gowland's) by Sir Arthur N. L. Wood, Bart.

From the very commencement of the game it was evident that the bowlers were going to be masters of the situation. Batting first. Durham opened disastrously, two wickets being down for 13 runs, and before lunch half of the side was out for 81. The stendy Northumberhald attack, backed up by a smart field, had the batsmen in trouble all the time.

Apart from T. K. Dobson, who played a captain's part to save his side from complete rout, none of the batsmen seemed capable of mastering the visitors' bowling. T.K." made more than half his side's toud, and in doing so gave a masterly exhibition. In his total of 77, which included six 4's, he was the only batsman to "set about" the bowling at a critical time. Going in at the fall of the second wicket, he was last to leave, and he received a great ovation on returning to the pavilion.

Durham would indeed have been in sore straits had Lee accepted the difficult chance given by Dobson before the captain had secred. He got his lands to the ball, but could not hold it. The Durham innings lasted five minutes short of three hours. Northumberland were dismissed for 83 in just under two hours.

Milne and Ellis were mainly responsible fro the fall, the Whitburn fast bowler making a really impressive dobut in county oricket.

The batsmen were completely subdued by the fast bowlers, who got a tremendous

MILNE'S DESTRUCTION

Rain overnight, followed by further showers yesterday morning, delayed the start of the match at Ashbrooke, Sunderland. It was found possible, however, to commence by 2.15, and the visiting country took first knock on a freshly-prepared wicket. Play continued with-out further interruption by the weather and at the close of the day Lancashire had lost seven wickets in scoring 130 runs.

For this total they were at the wickets for four hours, and with the turf lifeless and giving little of no assistance to the bowlers, their rate of scoring cannot be commended. It would hardly have been slower at times had these Lancashire colts been facing a Yorkshire eleven at Old

There was little variety in the Durham attack, yet in turn the bowlers were treated at times with an exaggerated respect.

Milne, the Whitburn professional, was easily the most successful of the six men who were tried. He bowled at a good speed, and although it was seldom that the ball lifted, yet his direction was so accurate that no one played him easily. So far he has five of the seven wickets which have fallen for 22 runs.

He bowled well, but without success before tea, but afterwards, if not quite unplayable, yet he was certainly in destructive mood. He opened by clean-bowling Oldfield middle stump, with the last ball of his first over. Horrocks and Hawkwood he dismissed with the last balls of his eighth and ninth overs and then proceeded to bowl Latchford and get Hyson leg-before with the second and third balls of his 10th over

In that way he had got rid of three men in four balls, and his post-tea figures gave him the return at that stage of five for nine. Altogether, after tea he had five for 14 in 14 overs in a bowling spell of 100 minutes.

Howell, who did not have much good fortune in his earlier spell, had the satisfaction of getting the wicket of Farrimond in the last half-hour. The South Shields man found difficulty in keeping his teet and this consequently interfered with his length and direction, Oldfield in particular taking advantage of quite a number of half-volleys to hook them behind the square-leg umpire.

Ellis opened with a succession of three maidens and a wicket in his fourth over, but after tea the batsmen found him much casier to play, and runs came more freely

easier to play, and runs came more freely off his bowling.

DOBSON MISSED

The home county must often have yearned for Dobson's presence at Ashbrook, for in his absence they had no slow bowler of any type. Carr, with his medium and occasionally a faster ball was useful for keeping the runs down, as II runs in seven overs showed, but any and all of the others were allowed to do that. A man with the ability to spin and flight the ball might have fuckened the scoring rate, but equally as probable is it that Lancashire would have been out before the end of the day in consequence of having been forced to play the ball more trequently.

Doggart, the Darlington amateur, was given a spell with the ball after tea. At first his short length caused the ball to rear awkwardly on occasion, but he quickly found a length and although the Lancashire men could not get him away their wickets never looked in dauger of falling.

Hawkwood had several "streaky" shots, but his new purtner, Oldfield, met the ball in a much more confident manner. He soon left Hawkwood well behind in the scoring process, and when tea was taken he had 46 of the 80 runs added. The

scoring rate had gradually quickened, but 12 runs in the first half-hour, 16 in the second, and 22 in the next indicate how slowly the board was moving, and it seemed unnaturally rapid when 33 runs came in the last half-hour before tea. Oldfield was well beaten by Milne in the first over after tea. Horrocks, who followed, showed ability to pick out the right ball to hit and more the willingness to hit it. Together with Hawkwood he took the score to 113 in half an hour, but it was at that step that Milne proved most destructive. destructive.

DURHAM BEATEN ON-FIRST INNINGS

Pedestrian Scoring Rate

The weather was perfect for the second day at Ashbrooke yesterday, but the cricket was little, if any, brighter than on the previous day, and putient batting produced a drawn game.

Lancashire took their overnight score of 139 for seven wickets to 208, Durham were dismissed for 184, thus giving the visitors first innings points with a lead of 24 runs, and Lancashire's second visit produced 63 runs in the final 90 minutes of the day.

In the morning the Durham bowlers were no more difficult than on the day before, but the visitors maintained their

were no more difficult than on the day before, but the visitors maintained their pedestrian scoring rate and occupied another 95 minutes in adding 69 runs. No attempt was made at any time to force the pace, although the Durham fielding was slack.

The 200 was signalled at 12.20, after having taken 320 minutes altogether. Gibbon, who was bowling, got the new ball and met with inimediate success. With the third delivery in his next over he beat Parkin, and had him given out leg-before when the ball went through to break his wicket also. Hodgson, the newcomer, was soon taken at the wicket off Gibbon, who two balls later got his third wicket in two overs.

Milne had not met with any further success and the five wickets which he had obtained after the the day before cost altogether 37 runs.

Gibbon and Adamson had scored 35 for Durham's first innings when Gibbon got in front of a straight one from Parkin. Randle stayed with Adamson for a partner-ship of 22 runs, but his share was only a single. Five minutes later Adamson followed Randle, given out leg-before to Wilson, who, like Parkin, was bowling round the wicket, with four men fairly close in on the leg side.

This means, however, that he will be batting to-day, and as Barrow is likely to be in a while, spectators may have the opportunty of seeing a big partnership between these two, who put on 200 for the West Indies second wicket at Manchester in the second Test.

So far as Durham's players are concerned no effort will be spared to make a match of it, and there is likely to be a keen fight for first innings lead; in which case we will see some lively cricket as distinct from exhibition play. We already know how the West Indies batsmen can force the pace, and they are all pretty useful hitters

The fact that Durham were in from 11.30 to 5.50 for 256 runs—which, excluding the two normal intervals, plus 20 minutes extra on to the tea break owing to rain, made an actual playing period of 290 minutes—suggests that the cricket was slow on Saturday. But actually, apart from Charles Adamson's very careful methods, the batting was quite bright, from lunch onwards at anyrate, while there was always something about the West Indies bowling and fielding to claim attention.

Considering that they lost their first two wickets for 15 runs and that the last five fell for 47, Durham, against an attack including five of the second Test bowlers and first-class fielding, did well to get 255 runs. They would not have got them but for Charles Adamson's ability to stay four hours five minutes, and the value of the Durham City's player's innings cannot be judged by his own rate of scoring. It would have been more satisfactory if he had reached three figures, as he deserved to do, but it must be said that he had opportunity to get the hundred before tea. HEADLEY TWICE OUT

The position was this. West Indies, 15 for one on Saturday night, against Durham's first innings total of 256, yesterday morning lost their remaining nine wickets for 125 runs in 100 minutes.

Woodhouse, the Burnmoor professional, and former Staffordshire player, was in a good way responsible for the West Indies having to follow on. Excellent catching was another big factor.

Bowling into a cross wind from the pavilion end he became very difficult to play after the first 15 minutes, all the earlier batsmen being troubled by his in swinger. And an occasional yorker proved profitable.

Not until the last three batsmen took to hitting was he scored from at all freely. His most useful spell got him the wickets of Headley, Wiles and Da Costa for 19 runs in the space of six overs.

Both Woodhouse and Howell were kept on too long, more so the last named, and it seemed that Dobson was anxious to gain the distinction for Durham of dismissing the West Indies with an unchanged attack.
