

Outstanding throughout the whole season was the magnificent bowling of V. Lund, who heads the bowling averages for the fifth time. Lund failed by only 11 to achieve the feat of taking 100 wickets in Saturday afternoon cricket, but to take 89 wickets for 8.91 runs cach, against such opposition as Slough meet. each, against such opposition as Slough meet, was a wonderful achievement. His reputation was greatly enhanced during the season, and he is now recognised as one of the most consistent and dangerous bowlers in London

and district club cricket.
