Hickman, not out 166, was at the wicket for nearly three and a half hours. He was in irresistible form, seldom, if ever, making a faulty stroke, and, after a cautions start, began to hit both fast and slow bowlers all round the wicket.

He took two and a half hours for his century, which included eleven 4's; got his 150 forty minutes later, and was scoring rapidly at the end. So far he has 18 4's.

Adamson's defence and restraint have never served Durham so well, and when,

never served Durham so well, and when, wanting only six for his century, he was out to a fine leg-side catch by Barker, the crowd gave him a great ovation as he returned to the pavilion.

Earlier in the day, A. E. Elsdon, the Medomsley slow bowler, had taken six wickets for 11 runs. The Yorkshiremen could make nothing of him, and in two overs he captured three wickets without conceding a run.
