EXCITING CRICKET

In a dramatic finish at Corfton-road yesterday, Middlesex II. beat Surrey II. by 64 runs in the Minor Counties Championship match. Surrey made a magnificent effort to force the pace for a win, but a deadly spell of bowling by Jack Durston, who at one time took 4 for 13 in four overs, completely turned the game in favour of Middlesex when Surrey seemed set for victory. victory.

Middlesex included four local players in their team, R. Felton, the Ealing C.C. captain, and L. A. Smith and C. W. C. Poore, of Mill Hill Park, and W. R. Watkins, of Ealing Dean.

A good crowd turned up to watch the first day's play, and they were rewarded with cricket of a high standard, although ungentful Middlesey.

IDDLESEX II. have won the Minor Counties Championship at their first attempt.
