Buffolk gained a big advantage over Lin-coinshire yesterday in the first stage of their Minor Counties championship engagement, at Dene's Oval, Lowestoft. Gaining some assist-ance from a rain-affected pitch, the Buffolk bowlers dismissed the visitors for the modest total of 118. The home side passed this score with only one wicket down, and, when stumps were drawn at 7 p.m. the Suffolk total stood at 162, with three batsmen out. About an hour's play was lost through rain. The effect of the early-morning thunderstorms was to delay the start till noon, while further rain during the afternoon caused a stoppage for half-an-hour.

There was a little carefree hitting by the last batsmen, and the innings totalled 173; so that Suffolk were left to get 26 runs to win.

Catchpole bowled remarkably well, his breakbacks having all the batsmen in difficulties. He took five of the Liucolnshire wickets for 27 runs.

Porter and Darvill knocked off the runs in ten minutes, Suffolk thus recording their first win outright in the Minor Counties competition by ten wickets.

It was a victory that was very well deserved. Under the shrewd captaincy of H. P. Waugh they completely outplayed their opponents.
