"OLD SCHOOL TIE" CRICKET

Critics of the County Side

"League Game Just Knock About Cricket"

The Dorset County, Cricket team have not stilled the critics by the wonderful displays this summer which have given Dorset a high place in the Minor Counties championship table. Started by a correspondent who wrote last week complaining about the way in which the Dorset & Dorsen match last week complaining about the way in which the Dorset v. Devon match at Dorchester was allowed to peter out into a dull draw—which was no fault of the Dorset captain—our correspondents this week write frankly about the state of Dorset county cricket and we quote an editorial on the subject from our companion newspaper "The Southern Times."

"OUT OF TOUCH WITH THE GAME"
"The Southern Times" stated:—
"Minor Counties cricket this week in "Minor Counties cricket this week in the territorial group that we are mainly concerned about is about as far away from Weymouth as it can be—down near Land's End, but no one has missed anything, and if what a correspondent says about the Devon match at Dorchester last week-end is true we did not miss much there either. The Dorset County Cricket Club has not paid Weymouth the compliment of giving us one of its matches this year. We are not complaining about that either for the simple reason that the Dorset County Cricket Club is quite an unrepresentative body, it is completely out of touch with club cricket, and is regarded as a sort of traditional and congenital apanage of the M.C.C. with all the hide-bound exclusiveness—we had almost said bound exclusiveness—we had almost said snobbishness—that the term implies. The heart of the game in Dorset is sound enough but not because of any stimulant from the county executive. Evening enough but not because of any stimulant from the county executive. Evening cricket is undoubtedly flourishing but in our judgment nothing has ever taken the place of the old challenge cup competition of thirty or forty years ago when a good dozen senior clubs could all field very fine tearns. And so far as Minor Counties cricket goes cricketing opinion inclines to the view that there is a little too much of the old school tie about the selection of Dorset elevens."

"SNOBBISHNESS"

Sir,-

I want to support everything that Mr. Arthur wrote last week about the county ricket match at Dorchester - that is every thing, except his quite unnecessarily "smooty" jibe at Yorkshire in which he reveals the southerner's myopic conception that sporting and bright cricket are played only in the south.

Heaven save the game if the only brightness it is to have is to come from counties

ness it is to have is to come from counties like Dorset, where apparently the forms of the game that draw most attention are county cricket and league cricket! Neither

of these present cricket at its best.

County cricket is hidden away from the vast majority of the population on school grounds, and it seems every effort is made to keep it as one of the last resorts of snob-bishness and cricket nepotism. Its quality, too, is not high; it lacks that fine con-ception which marks the battle between bowler and batsmen in a first class match.

The spirit of high endeavour is missing. With all due respect to bowlers who have toiled for years with great success, I must assert that thebowling in these minor counties matches is not of such a high standard as the batting, which sometimes has that air of carelessness that would bring immediate disaster in a first class side.

Please, county cricketers, do not think I want batting to be stodgy; we want to see you achieve something of that "first fine careless rapture" that marks a Hammond. But too often, the minor points of technique, Dorset's batting is just careless carelessness without the rapture.

As for the type of game that is played in the Dorset league that, too, is frequently not cricket. I admire the leagues because they are getting hundreds of fellows to play who would otherwise swell the great host of non-playing spectators. But officials should not delude themselves that this hit as many runs assyou-can-in-as-shortatime-as-possible-or-get-out is cricket. In the same way that footballers, loosening up for the season say "Let's have a kickabout," evening league cricket is but a knock-about. No, the game in Dorset flourishes among

No, the game in Dorset flourishes among the senior Saturday afternoon clubs, when players are not in a hurry to be done with the match, but linger over it as befits "the meadow game with the beautiful name."
Yet it is the cricketers from this school of the game who are ignored by the county.
