AUSTRALIAN CENTURIES TWO **ASH BROOKE** AT

POOR START RECOVERY **AFTER** UP PLAY **FOG** HOLDS

About 6,500 people saw the Australians put on 380 runs from 2.30 to 6.30 yesterday in a game which was in two definite phases, the first when Durham looked like making a very fine show and the second in which the Australians pulled themselves together and knocked up 380 for five wickets after having been as poor as three for 97.

The start was delayed owing to fog. which made it impossible to see across the ground and, even during the game there were wisps of mist constantly coming

The brightest spot in the match was magnificent hitting by C. L. Badcock. who in 81 minutes scored 100, Which included one Jx, ten 4's and some extraordinarily long hit singles.

Prior to that S. G. Barnes had reached Prior to that S. G. Barnes had reached his century in 113 minutes which included 12 fours, but he piled many more up afterwirds in reaching 140 not out. Barnes ready stepped the good work of the Durham bowlers, but he was very shaky indeed at the start against Grigor. Badcock, however, never put a foot wrong, and in his compact, workmanlike style was really delightful to watch, his drives through the covers and dainty placings just short of leg for well run singles being features.

Barnes was also strong on the leg side having developed this part of his game by assiduous practice while recovering from his injury. He became so enthusiastic towards the end that he actually threw his bat after one ball.

actually threw his bat after one ball.

McCabe, who captained the side in the absence of Bradman—an absence which, to put it very mildly caused much disappointment—decided to open the batting himself with Brown. Herbert bowled the first over promisingly, a good maiden with plenty of fire, and Grigor showed in his first over that McCabe was vulnerable to spinners. Brown got going first with some nive shots to the covers and occasional glides, but McCabe was never quite at home, and soon both players could truthfully be said to be fighting for runs. runs.

McCABE'S FALL

McCabe played several rather peculiar cuts off Grigor, and after getting a four in this way tried another, missed, and hit his wicket with the score at 66.

Hassett came in and looked aggressive at once, but when he saw Brown, only two short of his 50 and the score at 93, play a ball lamely into Carr's hands from Grigor's bowling, he scemed to close up with White as pertner.

Neither was comfortable and Hassett

Neither was comfortable and Hassett was next to go with only three runs added, Grigor getting him caught and bowled with a really peculiar ball which had both the batsman and the wicketkeeper groping for it.

Then came Barnes to join White, and together they put up the 100. Barnes might have been run out when he was in the singles, a wide throw-in destroying the fine chance Austin would have had had he got the ball.

Next ball he nibbled round the sticks from Carr, was Jeaten by the next and altogether was so uncomfortable that a century was the last thing he appeared likely to get.

Itkely to get.

At 107 Cerr successfully appealed for l.b.w. against White and Waite came in to join Barnes. Waite was painfully slow and pokey, especially against Grigor, but Barnes had really got going by now and some of his leg side shots were certain boundaries as they left the bat.

Durham's fielding at this stage was

patchy, some brilliant and some very poer. The infield was extremely fast, and with Barnes keeping the ball on the bottom the impetus was tremendous as he hit viciously all round the wicket. Gradually the score rose and a real stand was being made. In 54 minutes Barnes reached his 50 and Waite was still plodding along. At 210 Townsend brought back Herbert with the shine still on the new ball, and with the first delivery he got Waite. Adamson making a line catch at short stip. Waite had contributed an invaluable 34, which looked slow against the strong play of Barnes. Badcock joined him and the rest of the play became something of slaughter.

BADCOCK AGGRESSIVE

With the coming of Badcock there was a change in the whole atmosphere: it was charged with aggression and even

The little fellow began steadily to everhaul Barnes, and when the latter had got his 100 in 118 minutes Badcock had been with him only half an hour and had passed his own half century.

He picked his shots so coolly, moved his feet without any effort, and drove with such precision that no one grudged him the epportunity of making such a line century at the home county's expense. Indeed, towards the end the chief juterest was in whether he would heat the clock to it. In the very last over he reached three figures with a finely executed on drive for two. two.

It was interesting cricket all day, but, obviously, after the success of Grigor and Carr. Durham needed bowlers of the same type rather than the fast stuff with which the Australians seem so much more at home.

It was equally obvious that to try some tempting want-to-he-hit bowling from Parnaby is no use against this class of batsmen. They thrived on it.

Grigor had the greatest success, but Carr bowled equally well with less reward. At one period Carr was almost unplayable and most of his runs were

knocked off towards the end by men who had already consolidated themselves and hit everything.

AUSTRALIANS PUT DURHAM OUT TWICE IN DAY

BATTING BRIGHT **FEATURE** CARR'S TWO BOWLERS SHARE 20 WICKETS

At Sunderland yesterday the Australians, as anticipated, declared at their overnight score of 380 for five wickets and proceeded to put Durham out twice in about three hours' play and win by an innings and 179 runs.

Those who like to see big hitting would be disappointed, excepting when Jack Carr was in, but to those who can enjoy

Carr was in, but to those who can enjoy subtle bowling by first-class men they would find much to admire in the wiles of Fleetwood-Smith and O'Reilly, who took all the wickets between them—ten each in the match.

It only needed a careful watch through the glasses to see that Durham batsmen were playing bowling which has skittled out better sides than they are supposed to be, although it must be said that there were occasions when the batsmen did not realize that a loose ball from an Australian is very much like a loose ball from anyone else. from anyone else.

Too many p'ayed back to the ball instead of going out at it and very often after they had played two or three similar balls with confidence. Still, it is good bowling which makes them do it.

Townsend and Parnaby opened the first innings and both played McCormick and Waite verv incely, the fast bowler looking verv innocuous indeed. It seemed to confirm this view when McCabe made

precisely the same change in his second innings, taking them off for O'Reilly and Fleetwood-Smith when again the opening bats played them casily enough, in this case Parnaby and Beresford.

With Fleetwood-Smith at the other end the game altered entirely and soon the expected happened, Parnaby getting in front of one of Fleetwood-Smith's fairly straight ones after dodging a succession of amazing breaks both ways.
